ON THE TEXTILE INDUSTRIES OF CANADA

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The production of textiles and textile products constitutes an important branch of Canadian manufacture. In gross value of products the textile group ranked third with 13 per cent of the production for all industries, in number of employees it stood second with 21 per cent, and in salaries and wages paid it came second also, with 17 per cent, while in the amount of capital invested it ranked only fifth with 7 per cent. It is interesting to note that the textile industries provide employment for a large number of female workers. Out of a total of 128,488 female employees engaged in the manufacturing industries of Canada, 61,213 or 48 per cent were found in this group.

In 1934 reports were received from 2,234 establishments with a capital investment in fixed and current assets of \$328,362,816. They furnished employment to 115,695 persons who were paid \$90,796,601 in salaries and wages, and produced goods with a selling value at the factory of \$342,054,536. The materials used cost \$174,532,597 and the value added by manufacture totalled \$160,723,494. The leading industries of this group with the number of employees and the value of production are given in the table below.

According to table 2, which gives the principal statistics of the group as a whole, it will be observed that in 1920, during a period of inflated values of raw materials and manufacturing costs, the value of production reached its peak. A considerable decline occurred the following year, but from then on the industry slowly and steadily resumed its upward climb until it reached its second peak in 1929, when the items in the principal statistics, other than cost of materials, gross value of production and the number of employees, attained the highest level in the history of the industry. It may be pointed out here that 1929 held the record for employment until 1934 in which year a new high was recorded for that item. Following 1929, the depression of 1930 created a downward trend in both volume and value of production, the low point being reached in 1932. In 1933 a slight recovery took place, and 1934 shows a continued improvement, with employment as noted above.

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Principal statistics for 1934 compared with 1933. - For the group as a whole there were increases of \$47,339,288 or 16.1 per cent in the gross value of production, \$6,050,569 or 1.9 per cent in the capital invested, \$29,948,090 or 20.7 per cent in the cost of materials used, \$16,732,886 or 11.6 per cent in the value added by manufacture, 9,460 or 8.9 per cent in the number of persons employed, and \$10,100,788 or 12.5 per cent in salaries and wages paid.

As shown in the table below, gains were made in all items of the principal statistics by the cotton textiles, silk and miscellaneous textile industries and the garment trades. Woollen textiles, dyeing and finishing of textiles and knitted goods showed increases in all items with the exception of capital invested, and dyeing, cleaning and laundry work advanced in all items except employment.

For the Dominion as a whole, the textile group of industries experienced a measure of recovery in 1934. This was not, however, shared by all provinces. The province of Quebec made the greatest advance, the value of production increasing by \$26,154,918 and the number of employees by 6,288. Ontario reported an increase of \$18,720,360 in the value of production and 2,927 in the number employed. Advances were also made by Nova Scotia

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and New Brunswick. Although decreases were shown in various items, Manitoba, Alberta and British Columbia each gained in gross value of production. Saskatchewan, however, declined in all items.

Variations in the principal statistics, by provinces, are shown in the table below.

Provincial Distribution of the Textile Industries. - The 2,234 establishments engaged in the production of textiles and textile products were located by provinces as follows: Prince Edward Island 3, Nova Scotia 44, New Brunswick 34, Quebec 941, Ontario 951, Manitoba 95, Saskatchewan 18, Alberta 40, British Columbia and Yukon Territory 108. The table following shows the percentage distribution for 1933 and 1934 of the capital invested, number of employees and gross value of production. It will be observed that in 1934, 91.8 per cent of the capital, 91.2 per cent of the employees and 92.4 per cent of the value of products were reported by firms in Ontario and Quebec, with Quebec leading Ontario to some extent. The dyeing, cleaning and laundry industry is included in the textile group, and if this were omitted concentration of the textile industries in Ontario and Quebec would be even more marked.

Table 5 shows the principal statistics for 1934 by economic areas. In the Maritime Provinces, the production of cotton yarn and cloth, with an output valued at \$4,008,363, was the leading industry. This was followed by hosiery and knitted goods with a production valued at \$2,367,654. These two industries accounted for 67 per cent of the output and 61 per cent of the employees.

In Quebec, the total value of the output was \$169,967,389. Cotton yarn and cloth headed the list with an output valued at \$42,463,877. Next in order of production was women's factory clothing \$30,868,071, followed by men's factory clothing \$20,835,234, natural and artificial silk \$18,092,687, and hosiery and knitted goods \$12,589,655. The aggregate value of production of these five industries was \$124,849,524 or 73 per cent of the total for the province and they employed 68 per cent of the total number of employees.

In Ontario, the production of hosiery and knitted goods was the dominant textile industry in 1934 on the basis of both the value of production and number of employees, for the output was valued at \$29,232,684 and the employees totalled 11,492. Next in order came women's factory clothing with a value of production of \$18,208,209, cotton yarn and cloth \$14,834,250, woollen cloth \$13,327,514 and men's factory clothing \$11,866,558. These five leading industries accounted for \$87,469,215 or 60 per cent of the Ontario total, and also employed 62 per cent of the total employees.

In the Prairie Provinces, the cotton and jute bag industry was the most important one in 1934, the output being valued at \$2,928,992. This was closely followed by the men's furnishing goods industry which had a production of \$2,871,479. Dyeing, cleaning and laundry work came third with an output of \$2,338,509, while women's factory clothing came fourth with \$1,924,325. The output of these four industries amounted to \$10,063,305 or 85 per cent of the total for the three provinces.

The dyeing, cleaning and laundry industry is the most important in British Columbia and the Yukon Territory with a value of work performed amounting to \$1,782,054 or 38 per cent of the total production of the province. The output of men's

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furnishing goods amounted to \$578,468, and of women's factory clothing \$475,453.

Value of Production. - By referring to table 4(b) it will be observed that in 1934 as in 1933 the cotton yarn and cloth industry had the highest value of production. This table also gives the principal statistics for all industries.

Since the main items of production in some industries are also produced as secondary ones in others, it is not always possible in reviewing a report on an industry to obtain the complete Canadian production of specific articles. In the women's factory clothing industry, for instance, the report for which is compiled from the statistics of firms whose principal production consists of factory clothing and ready-to-wear apparel for women, articles of men's wear, men's furnishings, etc., are also manufactured as by-products. Similarly, articles of women's apparel will be found to be important, though secondary articles of production, in the men's factory clothing, the men's furnishing goods, hosiery and knitted goods, silk and other industries.

A separate table (No. 6) has been compiled showing the total Canadian production of the articles produced by all manufacturers of textiles and textile products. This is excepted, of course, in instances where the publishing of these figures would disclose the operations of individual establishments.

Volume of Production. - The index of the physical volume of production of textiles and textile products shows an increase of 39.1 per cent since 1923, and stands at a new high of 139.1, 3.8 higher than the previous peak of 135.3 in 1928. The following table illustrates the variations in the volume of production of the major textile groups of industries between the years 1923 and 1934. The main feature revealed by this table is the tremendous advance made in the production of natural and artificial silk, the volume increasing by 1,037.7 per cent during this period. With the exception of 1924, when there was a slight decrease in the volume of production, the silk group has recorded an increase each year to reach its present peak of 1,137.7.

Prior to 1934 the peak year for cotton textiles, woollen textiles, hosiery and knitted goods, etc., and the garment trades, was 1928. The latter year is still the high for hosiery and knitted goods, for, although the 135.2 shown by this group in 1934 is an increase of 7.1 over 1933, it is a decrease of 0.2 from the 135.4 shown in 1928. The 1928 peak still holds for the garment trades also, for these, with a 1934 index of 123.3, an increase of 13.5 over 1933, are still 7.4 below the 130.7 shown in 1928. However, a new peak was established by cotton textiles with 144.2 in 1934, which was an increase of 15.7 over 1933 and of 8.6 over the 1928 figure of 135.6. Woollen textiles also went to a new high in 1934, with 126.0, an increase of 9.6 over 1933 and of 7.5 over 1928 when the index stood at 118.5.

1929 still remains the peak year for miscellaneous textiles and dyeing, cleaning and laundry work. Miscellaneous textiles, with 99.2 in 1934, record an increase of 11.6 over 1933 but are 27.8 below the 127.0 shown in 1929. Dyeing, cleaning and laundry work had 123.6 in 1934, a decrease of 2.1 from 1933 and of 22.3 from the 1929 level of 145.9.

Employees, Salaries and Wages. - In the last few years preceding 1932 the trend of employment in the textile industries was downward, the low point being reached in 1932. In 1933 and 1934, however, an improvement took place. The peak year in the past from an employment standpoint was 1929 with 115,620 employees and a salary and wage bill of \$105,896,237. Of the number employed that year, 10,026 were salaried employees who were paid \$19,555,354 and 105,594 were wage-earners in receipt of \$86,340,883. In 1932 when employment was at its lowest the number of employees totalled 102,116 with a salary and wage bill of \$82,817,944. Salaried employees numbered 10,557 and wage-earners 91,559, while payments for salaries amounted to \$18,955,951 and for wages \$63,861,993. In 1934 the number employed rose to 115,695, seventy-five more than in 1929, the salaried employees numbering 12,291 and the wage-earners 103,404, while payments amounted to \$90,796,601, \$20,271,456 for salaries and \$70,525,145 for wages.

The increase in the number of salaried employees between 1929 and 1934 is due to the following changes made in the instructions accompanying the schedule.

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1. Prior to 1931, owners who were working as ordinary wage-earners, such as small clothing manufacturers reported themselves as wage-earners. In 1931, however, all such owners were required to report themselves as salaried employees.
2. In 1931 travelling salesmen who were attached to the plant and devoted all or the greater part of their time in selling the products of that plant, were included with salaried employees. Prior to this they were not reported at all.

The high proportion of female wage earners in the textile industries is of interest. As shown in table 1, all the manufacturing industries of Canada in 1934 gave employment to 106,479 female wage-earners, while in the textile industries employment was furnished to 57,276 or 54 per cent of the total. This naturally is reflected in the lower average annual wage paid in the textile group of industries where the average in 1934 was \$682 in comparison with an average wage of \$883 for all other groups. In the textile group the average wage declined from \$818 in 1929 to \$682 in 1934, and the average salary from \$1,955 to \$1,649 in the same period.

In table 12 it will be observed that the monthly employment of wage-earners is fairly steady in these industries, there being no really marked variations. As a rule the spring and fall months show the maximum employment. In 1934 the peak was reached in April when 107,581 wage-earners were employed, while January with 95,539 wage-earners was the month of lowest employment.

Capital Investment. - The year 1929 saw the largest capital investment in the textile group of industries with a total of \$383,153,797 made up of fixed capital, covering land, buildings, fixtures, plant equipment, tools, etc., amounting to \$193,841,995, and liquid or working capital, consisting of materials on hand, stocks in process, fuel and miscellaneous supplies, finished products at their inventory value, cash, bills and accounts receivable, prepaid insurance and other prepaid expenses, etc., amounting to \$189,311,802. By referring to table 8, it will be observed that the amount represented by fixed capital was larger in 1930, 1931 and 1932 than in 1929, with corresponding decreases of working capital in those years, but that the total amount of capital declined from \$383,153,797 in 1929 to \$352,344,073 in 1931 and \$321,593,062 in 1932. This difference in values may be explained by the fact that in the past several years the textile industry renovated its plants to a great extent. Worn-out and obsolete machinery was scrapped and replaced by new and up-to-date equipment. New buildings were erected where necessary, and older ones overhauled, with the result that all buildings and equipment were placed in a state of high efficiency. This materially increased their value and also, of course, the amount of fixed capital invested in them. In 1934 the total capital investment was \$328,362,816 which was an increase of \$6,050,569 over 1933. The investment in fixed assets was, however, \$2,720,022 lower, due mainly to the current charges for depreciation.

With regard to working capital, the reduced cost of raw materials, the low prices prevailing for finished merchandise, and the decline in the cost of manufacture had tended to reduce the value of stocks of raw materials and finished products carried on hand during the last few years. Then, too, buying by retailers had been reduced to a minimum with a consequent reduction of bills and accounts receivable. All these factors tended to reduce the value of liquid or working

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capital held by the industry. An upward trend was evident in 1933, and in 1934 the working capital was about \$8,800,000 more than in the previous year.

Cost of Materials and Value added by Manufacture. - In accordance with the recommendations of the Conference of British Commonwealth Statisticians, 1935, the net value of production, or value added by manufacture, is now computed by subtracting the cost of materials, as well as the value of fuel and electricity, from the gross value of products. Prior to this only the cost of materials was deducted. The difference so arrived at represents the value added to the raw and other materials by labour, and it is this value which the manufacturer uses to pay for the labour itself, the other overhead expenses and to provide his profits. In 1933 the gross value of production was \$294,715,248, cost of materials \$144,584,507, fuel and electricity \$6,140,133, leaving \$143,990,608 as value added by manufacture. In 1934 the gross value of production was \$342,054,536, cost of materials \$174,532,597, fuel and electricity \$6,798,445, the value added by manufacture being \$160,723,494.

Table 16 shows the power equipment used in the textile group from 1924 to 1934 inclusive, with the year 1934 shown in detail by industries. It will be noted that electric motors are fast becoming an increasingly important motive power. In 1924, out of a total primary power installation of 8,322 units with a horsepower rating of 139,482, there were 7,864 electric motors driven by purchased power and generating 81,208 horse-power. In 1934 there were installed 40,673 units of primary power with a rated capacity of 219,938 horse-power, and included in these were 40,292 electric motors operated by purchased power with a rating of 159,586 horse-power. Also, in addition to these motors there were in 1934, 3,247 motors with a rating of 27,149 horse-power operated by power generated in the factory, making a total number of 43,539 motors operating with a capacity of 186,735 horse-power. Other equipment consisted of 244 steam engines with a horsepower capacity of 26,883, 33 diesel, oil, gas and gasoline engines with a horsepower capacity of 2,058, and 104 hydraulic turbines and water wheels with a capacity of 31,411 horse-power.

Consumption of Fuel and Electricity. - The cost of all fuel consumed in the textile industries in 1934 was \$3,660,250, while the bill for electricity was \$3,138,195, making a total cost of \$6,798,445. Bituminous coal constituted the most important item with 481,193 tons costing \$2,860,023 or 78 per cent of the total cost of all fuel. 33,306 tons of anthracite coal worth \$175,102 were also used so that the total coal bill amounted to \$3,035,125 or 83 per cent of the total cost. Fuel oil is being used in increasing quantities and in 1934, 4,550,544 gallons were consumed costing \$288,341. In some sections of Canada natural gas is used to a considerable extent, the total cost of all natural and artificial gas used in the textile industries being \$90,913.

Imports and Exports. - Imports of fibres, textiles and textile products in 1934 were valued at \$83,872,525, an increase of \$13,597,438 over the 1933 valuation.

Imports of cotton and its manufactures had the highest valuation of \$33,397,470 in 1934. The wool group with \$22,321,659 was next, and following in order came mixed textile products \$8,075,411, flax, hemp, jute and their manufactures \$6,959,842, other fibres and their products \$2,982,777 and artificial silk and its manufactures \$2,381,798.

Exports of fibres, textiles and textile products were valued at \$7,334,685 which represents an increase of \$238,432 over the 1933 total of \$7,096,253.

It should be noted that between 1925 and 1930 the average annual employment of wage-earners was obtained by summing the averages of individual plants, based on the number of months in actual operation, and not by dividing by twelve the sum of the monthly employment figures. In 1931, however, a change was made to the old method

whereby the aggregate of the monthly figure is divided by twelve. This method gives the man year that each plant operates. However, the effect of this change of method on annual employment and average wages is evident in seasonal industries only.

(2) Figures for fuel and electricity are not available prior to 1924, and the value added by manufacture as shown in 1917 and 1920 is arrived at by subtracting only the cost of materials used from the gross value of production.


