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ADVANCE REPORT ON THE TEXTILE INDUSTRIES OF CANADA, 1945.

By November of 1945 the textile industry had practically completed production against military contracts and was embarked upon a program of reconversion. Although confronted with numerous problems inherent in the changeover from war to peace time production and despite a tight labour situation, an acute shortage of worsted tops and knitting yarns, and an inadequate supply of urgently required machinery, the industry was successful in maintaining production at levels approximating those of the previous year. The industry's best efforts, however, proved unequal to the task of satisfying an abnormally large demand for textile products due in large measure to the purchases of discharged personnel in satisfaction of their own needs and those of their families and to the fact that other goods were in short supply.

Relating the textile industries to other divisions of Canadian manufacturing it may be observed that in 1945, in gross value of products it ranked fifth, with 9.8 per cent and in salaries and wages paid it came third with 11.2 per cent. It is interesting to note, also, that the textile industries provide employment for a large number of female workers. Out of a total of 310,151 female employees engaged in the manufacturing industries of Canada in 1945, 93,478 or 30.1 per cent were found in this group.

In 1945 reports were received from 2,740 establishments. They furnished employment to 158,148 persons who were paid \$207,629,471 in salaries and wages, and produced goods with a selling value at the factory of \$807,722,241. The materials used cost \$429,208,436 and the value added by manufacture totalled \$367,980,705.

In the tables immediately following are given employment and gross value of production totals for the leading industries of the group for the years 1939, 1942, 1944 and 1945. The order of presentation is established by the **gross** value of production in 1945.

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Principal Statistics for 1945 compared with 1944. - As compared with 1944 the group as a whole showed increases of \$25,950,553 or 3.3 per cent in the gross value of production, 5,026 or 3.3 per cent in the number of persons employed and \$9,219,794 or 2.2 per cent in the cost of materials used. Salaries and wages paid were greater by \$11,823,790 or 5.7 per cent, and there was an increase in the value added by manufacture of \$16,794,217 or 4.8 per cent.

Tables 2 and 4(a) present provincial and group totals for the years 1944 and 1945.

Provincial Distribution of the Textile Industries. - The provinces of Ontario and Quebec dominate in the field of textile manufacturing. In 1945, Quebec accounted for 55.8 per cent of the gross value of production and 55.1 per cent of the employment given. The comparable percentages for Ontario were 37.1 and 37.8.

Table 5 shows the principal statistics for 1945 by economic areas. In the Maritime Provinces, cotton yarn and cloth, with an output valued at \$4,700,919 was the leading industry. This was followed by hosiery and knitted goods with a production valued at \$3,985,272, and men's factory clothing, \$2,791,245. These three industries accounted for 61.9 per cent of the output and 69.1 per cent of the employees.

In Quebec, the total value of the output was \$450,393,106. Women's factory clothing headed the list with an output valued at \$100,420,371. Next in order of production was cotton yarn and cloth, \$85,187,647, followed by men's factory clothing, \$83,252,216, natural and artificial silk, \$36,825,222, hosiery and knitted goods, \$34,877,258. The aggregate value of production of these five industries was \$340,-572,714 or 75.6 per cent of the total for the province and they employed 75.1 per cent of the total number of employees.

In Ontario, the production of hosiery and knitted goods was the dominant textile industry in 1945 on the basis of the value of production which totalled \$47,568-149. Men's factory clothing came second with \$42,185.312. Next in order were women's factory clothing \$38,670,506, woollen cloth \$30,730,854, and cotton yarn and cloth \$24,794,236. These five leading industries accounted for \$183,949,057 or 61.4 per cent of the Ontario total, and employed 67.6 per cent of the total employees.

In the Prairie Provinces the men's factory clothing industry, with a production value of \$10,341,848, occupied first place. Following were bags, cotton and jute, \$8,116,068, and women's factory clothing \$7,855,828. The output of these three industries amounted to \$26,311,744 or 87.7 per cent of the total for the three provinces.

In British Columbia the output of women's factory clothing amounted to \$1,-810,795, men's factory clothing, \$1,349,597, and awnings, tents and sails, \$1,006,476.

Value of Production. - By referring to Table 4(b) it will be observed that in 1945, the women's factory clothing industry had the highest value of production. This table also gives the principal statistics for all industries.

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Since the main items of production in some industries are also produced as secondary ones in others, it is not always possible in reviewing a report on an industry to obtain the complete Canadian production of specific articles. In the women's factory clothing industry, for instance, the report for which is compiled from the statistics of firms whose principal production consists of factory clothing and ready-to-wear apparel for women, articles of men's wear, men's furnishings, etc., are also manufactured as by-products. Similarly, articles of women's apparel will be found to be important, though secondary articles of production, in the men's factory clothing, silk and other industries.

A separate table (No. 6), has been compiled showing the total Canadian production of all articles produced by manufacturers of textiles and textile products. This is excepted, of course, in instances where the publishing of figures would disclose the operations of individual establishments.

Volume of Production. - With the years 1935-1939 representing 100, the index of the physical volume of production for 1945 stood at 154.7 a decrease of 1.1 per cent as compared with 1944. Table 7 shows the variations in the volume of production of the major groups and industries for representative years.

Index gains were recorded by hosiery and knitted goods, narrow fabrics, woollen textiles, silk and artificial silk products and by the textile dyeing and finishing industry, the index numbers, together with percentage increase in each case, being respectively 120.4 (0.9 per cent), 65.8 (2.4 per cent), 143.3 (2.7 per cent), 139.4 (3.0 per cent), and 184.7 (7.9 per cent). Losses were sustained by the remaining three groups of industries with index numbers and the percentage decreases as follows: garment trades 141.9 (1.3 per cent); cotton textiles 123.5 (3.8 per cent); and the miscellaneous group, comprising cotton and jute bags, etc. 167.7 (10.9 per cent).

Employment, Salaries and Wages. - In 1945 the textile industries gave employment to 64,670 males and 93,478 females, or a total of 158,148 persons. The payroll amounted to \$207,629,471.

There were 19,019 salaried employees, who received the sum of \$48,084,146. Of these, 11,773 were males and 7,246 females.

Wage-earners to the number of 139,129 received \$159,545,325. The total included 52,897 males and 86,232 females. In this latter connection, it should be noted that the large number of females employed in the textile industries tends to produce lower average earnings per person when compared with the earnings in other industries. Considering the sexes separately, and for Canada as a whole, in the textile industries male wage-earners earned on the average 63.7 cents per hour, \$30.25 per week and \$1,519 per year. They worked an average of 47.5 hours per week. Females received 43.1 cents per hour, \$18.32 per week and \$919 per year. They worked an average of 42.5 hours per week. The break-down of these over-all figures, by industries, and by provinces, is given in Tables 13(a), (b), (c) and (d).

The peak employment of wage-earners was reached in November with 143,241 recorded. July, with 133,668, was the month of lowest employment.

(1) Between 1925 and 1930 the average annual employment of wage-earners was obtained by summing the averages of individual plants, based on the number of months in actual operation, but in 1931 a change was made to the old method, whereby the aggregate of the monthly figure is divided by twelve. However, the effect of this change of method is evident in seasonal industries only.

(2) In accordance with a resolution passed by the Conference of British Commonwealth Statisticians, 1935, the net value of production is now computed by subtracting the cost of materials and the cost of fuel and electricity from the gross value of the products. However, figures for electricity are not available prior to 1924, and the net value as shown for 1917 and 1920 was arrived at by the old method of subtracting only the cost of materials used.

NOTE: Profits or losses cannot be estimated from Census figures as no data are collected for certain expense items, such as interest, rent, depreciation, taxes, insurance, advertising, etc.
