PRODUCTION. SHIPMENTS AND STOCKS ON HAND OF SAWMILL\$ IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

LIBRARY Production of sawn lumber and ties in British Columbia totalte 105,696 M ft September, 1958 as compared with 384,897 M ft. in September, 1957 an increase of 3 p.c. over the previous year and an increase of 5.7 p.c. over the previous month. Production of Coast mills, which accounts for 47.7 p.c. of the total, showed an increase of 13.1 p.c. over the same month of the previous year, and the Interior mills, which produced the remaining 52.3 p.c. showed an increase of 29.2 p.c. Shipments in September, 1958 totalled 409,352 M ft., as compared with 382,546 M ft. the previous year, an increase of 7.0 p.c. with Coast mills registering a decrease of 15.9 p.c. but Interior mills an increase of 33.8 p.c. Total shipments for September decreased by 4.0 p.c. from the August figure of 426,249 M ft. Stocks on hand at the end of September, 1958 amounted to 553,424 M ft., as compared with 567,435 M ft. at the end of September the previous year and 512,820 M ft. at the end of August of this year. Coast mills reported stocks totalling 337,104 M ft., while Interior mills showed 216,320 M ft.

Summary Figures

Table 1 gives a comparative summary of production, shipments and stocks of sawn lumber and ties for all British Columbia sawmills for August and September, 1957 and 1958. Details by species are given for production and stocks while shipments are shown by destination. Total production decreased from 396,300 M ft. in August, 1957 to 384,897 M ft. in September, 1957 but increased from 440,070 M ft. in August to 465,696 M ft. in September, 1958. Shipments totalled 426,249 M ft. in August, 1958 and 409,352 M ft. in September 1958 as compared with 397,303 M ft. in August and 382,546 M ft. in September of 1957. Stocks on hand at sawmills increased from 552,063 M ft. in August, 1957 to 567,435 M ft. in September 1957 and increased from 512,820 M ft. in August, 1958 to 553,424 M ft. in September of this year.

Production

Table 2 gives particulars of lumber and tie production for Coast mills and Interior mills separately, and also shows separately the production of lumber and ties, by species. Production of sawn lumber in Coast mills amounted to 221,942 M ft. in September, 1958 as compared with 242,667 M ft. reported by Interior mills. Sawn tie production of Interior mills in September was 1,087 M ft. while no sawn ties were reported for Coast mills. Coast mills accounted for 47.7 p.c. of the total production of sawn lumber and ties in September, 1958 as compared with 51.0 p.c. the previous year. The percentages of Coast mills during August, 1958 and 1957 respectively, were 45.6 and 46.9 p.c.

Shipments

Table 3 gives details of lumber and tie shipments, by months, for Coast mills and Interior mills separately. Shipments by truck, by rail and waterborne are shown for each Canadian province, to points in the United States, to the United Kingdom and to other countries, for all mills reporting. Total estimated shipments of non-reporting mills are also given. It is to be noted, however, that some lumber originally reported as having been shipped to points in British Columbia may have been re-shipped to other provinces or exported by the purchasers and reported by them also, thereby causing a certain amount of duplication.

Shipments of Coast mills amounted to 173,739 M ft. in September of 1958 and 187,-221 M ft. in August, 1958 as compared with 206,495 M ft. in September, 1957 and 181,052 M ft. in the previous month, while the Interior mills shipped 235,613 M ft. and 176,051 M ft. in September, 1958 and 1957 and 239,028 M ft. and 216,251 M ft. in August, 1958 and 1957. Of all shipments actually reported for September, 45.8 p.c. went to points in Canada, 47.5 p.c. to points in United States, 4.3 p.c. to the United Kingdom and 2.4 p.c. to other countries. Waterborne shipments accounted for 14.4 p.c. of the total, while 53.7 p.c. went by rail, and 31.9 p.c. by truck.

Stocks

Table 4 gives particulars of stocks of lumber and ties at sawmills by months. It distinguishes between stocks sold but not shipped and stocks unsold, and between stocks at Coast and Interior mills, by species. Total stocks at Coast mills in August and September, 1958 amounted to 280,269 M ft. and 337,104 M ft. as compared with 266,798 M ft. and 263,765 M ft. in August and September of 1957. Interior mills stocks increased from 285,265 M ft. in August to 303,670 M ft. in September, 1957 but decreased from 232,551 M ft. in August to 216,320 M ft. in September, 1958. Unsold stocks accounted for approximately 27.1 p.c. of the total in September, 1958 as compared with 36.3 p.c. in September, 1957 for Coast mills, while for the Interior mills the percentages were, respectively, 92.4 and 93.6.

Orders on Hand

Table 5 shows the distribution of orders on hand at the end of the months of August and September, 1957 and 1958 for Coast mills only. Similar information is not collected from Interior mills and no attempt has been made to estimate orders on hand of non-reporting mills on the Coast. Destination and mode of shipments are shown in this table, which also gives total lumber purchases reported by some mills. Total orders on hand at the end of September, 1958 amounted to 340,806 M ft. as compared with 275,366 M ft. in September, 1957. Orders on hand at the end of August, 1958 and 1957 amounted to 366,670 M ft. and 271,807 M ft., respectively. Purchases of lumber from other mills amounted to 9,040 M ft. in September, 1958 and 9,160 M ft. in September, 1957 as compared with 5,691 M ft. in August, 1958 and 11,143 M ft. in August, 1957.

Active Mills Reporting

Table 6 gives the number of active mills reporting each month for the Coast and Interior of British Columbia. The mills reporting for September accounted for 80.4 p. c. of the total production on the basis of the annual returns from 1956 compared with 81.3 p.c. for the previous year. The percentages for August, 1957 and 1958 were 79.7 and 79.8 respectively. It is hoped that the compilation will eventually include all mills in the 500,000 feet and over classification.

The co-operation of the British Columbia Lumber Manufacturers' Association, Interior Lumber Manufacturers' Association and Northern Interior Lumbermen's Association in the collection of these statistics is gratefully acknowledged.
