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THE COFFIN AND CASKET INDUSTRY IN CANADA

1928 and 1929

Ottawa, December, 1930. - A report on the manufacture of coffins, caskets and shells or rough boxes in Canada during 1928 and 1929 has been completed by the Forest Products Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. There were 36 firms engaged in the manufacture of these products in 1929 as compared to 38 in 1928. The total amount of capital invested in the industry increased from \$3,514,906 in 1928 to \$3,608,383 in 1929. The employees of all classes numbered 755 in 1929 as compared to 697 in 1928. The total payroll in 1929 was \$863,968 and in 1928 \$771,035. This industry in 1929 purchased \$42,893 worth of fuel and employed power to the amount of 2200 horse-power. Its materials in 1929 cost \$1,312,374 and its total products were valued at \$3,185,338.

Out of the total of 36 factories, 16 were located in Ontario, 9 in Quebec, 3 each in Nova Scotia and British Columbia, 2 in Manitoba and one each in Saskatchewan, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.


Tables 1 and 2 give a summary of the principal statistics of this industry and the distribution of its factories by provinces.

The chief material used by the manufacturers of coffins and caskets is lumber which was purchased to the extent of 10,803 m. ft. board measure costing \$407,781. About eighty-one per cent of this lumber was softwood, used chiefly in the manufacture of rough boxes and shells. A quantity of veneer was also purchased but the next important items were linings and coverings for coffins and caskets. Hardware and mountings; nails, tacks and screws; paint, oil and varnish were other important materials purchased.

Table 3 gives details of the materials used in 1928 and 1929.

This industry in 1929 turned out over seventy-six thousand caskets valued at \$2,282,978, seven thousand coffins at \$77,824 and over fifty thousand rough boxes and shells valued at \$269,774. Undertakers' supplies to the value of \$525,076, also formed a part of the products of the industry.

Table 4 gives the details of the products manufactured in 1928 and 1929 and Tables 5, 6, 7 and 8 cover capital invested, employment, fuel used and power employed during these two years.






