THE POLISHES AND DRESSINGS INDUSTRY

1954

The Polishes and Dressings Industry includes only the factories which were occupied chiefly in the manufacture of polishes, floor wax and other similar preparations. In 1954 there were 50 establishments in this category, located by provinces as follows: 30 in Ontario, 16 in Quebec and 4 in British Columbia.

Factory shipments from these establishments were valued at \$17,718,078 in 1954. About 75 per cent of the total came from plants in Ontario and 25 per cent from establishments in Quebec.

Output of polishes and floor wax during 1954, including small amounts from other industries, was as follows: paste floor wax, 8,049,188 pounds at \$3,049,227; liquid floor wax and polish, 3,387,023 gallons at \$8,297,785; shoe polishes and dressings

at \$1,177,320; furniture polishes at \$1,078,292; stove polishes at \$53,930; brass polishes at \$85,577; silver polishes at \$163,333; auto polishes at \$332,952 and miscellaneous polishes at \$285,187. The total value of all polishes, including polishing wax, was \$14,523,603 in 1954 compared with \$14,404,422 in 1953.

Note: Figures for value added by manufacture shown in Table 1 prior to 1952 were obtained by subtracting the cost of materials used, including fuel and electricity, from the value of production. In 1952, the gross value of production was replaced by value of factory shipments, f.o.b. plant. As no information on inventory change is available for 1952 and 1953, value added figures for these years were obtained by subtracting from the value of shipments the cost of materials, fuel and electricity. In 1954, information on the value of year-end inventory holdings at plant and plant warehouses was collected as part of the annual Census of Industry and information thus made available was taken into account in calculating the value added figure for 1954.




