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## CHEMICALS AND ALLIED PRODUCTS GROUP

PRELIMINARY SUMMARY STATISTICS - 1939
Preliminary totals for 1939 place the output value of chemicals and allied products at $\$ 157,407,059$ or 7.7 per cent more than in 1938 , and 5.7 per cent more than the former record of $\$ 148,973,220$ established in 1937.

The principal statistics for each of the 13 industries in the chemicals and allied products group are given in the accompanying tables. All but 2 industries showed substantial improvement over 1938, the percentage gains being as follows: coal tar distillation, 19.6; acids, alkalies and salts, 12.6; compressed gases, 6.8; fertilizers, 2.6; medicinals, 9.4 ; paints, 4.6 ; soaps, 10.1 ; inks, 8.1 ; hardwood distillation, 8.1; adhesives, 8.0, and miscellaneous chemical products, 8.4. Output of toilet preparations declined 3.2 per cent and polishes and dressings 0.9 per cent.

In 1939 there were 797 factories in operation in this chemical group, representing an investment in fixed and working capital of ${ }_{8} 170,675,035$ and employing 22,288 persons. Over $\$ 64$ millions was spent on materials for manufacturing, \$31 millions for salaries and wages and about $\$ 4$ millions for fuel and electricity.

About 57 per cent of the production was from Ontario with 420 establishments and output valued at $\$ 89,227,731$. Quebec with 246 factories and production worth $\$ 47,590,580$, accounted for 30 per cent of the total, and British Columbia with 47 plants and output valued at $\$ 10,451,045$ accounted for 7 per cent.

Canada's foreign trade in chemicals and allied products was at a record level in 1939. Imports reflecting the increased requirements of expanding domestic industry and possibly also forward purchases in anticipation of higher prices advanced 24.1 per cent to $\$ 43,705,905$, and exports, reflecting the greater producion in Canada's chemical plants, gained 24.4 per cent to $\$ 24,263,042$. The United States supplied 70.2 per cent of the imports in 1959 as against 63.5 per cent in 1938, while shipments from the united Kingdom made up only 26.9 per cent compared with 18.7 per cent in 1938. Forty per cent of the exports in 1939 went to United States, 23.6 per cent to the United Kingdom and 36.4 per cent to other countries.
