CHEMICALS AND ALLIED PRODUCTS

PRELIMINARY SUMMARY STATISTICS - 1943

Production by Canada's chemical industries reached an all-time high in 1945, according to a preliminary summary released by the Dominion Eureau of Statistics at Ottawa. The official figures place the value of Chemicals and Allied Products for that year at \$655 millions, which is 30 per cent more than in 1942 and more than four times the best pre-war total for this group of industries. However, a large part of this gain can be attributed to higher returns from shell-filling plants which are classed in this group in the official records. Without these works the over-all increase was about 8 per cent, a figure which is probably much more representative of the general trend in the chemical field.

Nine of the industries in this group showed higher output values than in 1942, the percentage gains being as follows: heavy chemicals, 7.4; compressed gases, 12.2; fertilizers, 27.6; medicinals, 15.3; toilet preparations, 16.0; adhesives, 8.1; polishes, 4.3; miscellaneous, 52.7, and sosps, 0.5. There was a decline of 3 per cent in paints, 4.9 per cent in inks, 2.3 in wood distillation and 1.2 per cent in coal tar distillation.

In the entire group there were 918 establishments in operation, representing an investment of \$559 millions in fixed and working capital and giving employment to a monthly average of 105,755 workers during the year. These firms paid out \$143 millions for salaries and wages, \$353 millions for materials for processing and \$16 millions in fuel and electricity. Compared with 1942, the increase in capital was 19 per cent; in employment, 14 per cent; in salaries and wages, 7 per cent, in cost of materials, 43 per cent, and in value of production, 30 per cent.

About 52 per cent of the production in 1943 was from Ontario with 470 establishments and output valued at \$338 millions. Quebec, with 299 factories and production worth \$264 millions, accounted for 41 per cent, and British Columbia with 60 plants and output at \$24 millions accounted for 4 per cent of the total.

Imports of chemicals and allied products amounted to \$70.5 millions in 1943 compared with \$66.8 millions in 1942. Exports increased to \$86.4 millions from \$77.3 millions in 1942.
