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THE BROOM, BRUSH AND MOP INDUSTRY IN CANADA

1922

Ottawa, October, 1922:- A report is herewith presented on the broom, brush and mop industry in Canada during the calendar year 1922. A total of 71 establishments reported operations during that year of which 42 were in Ontario, 20 in Quebec, 3 in British Columbia, 2 in Manitoba, 2 in New Brunswick, 1 in Nova Scotia and 1 in Prince Edward Island. To prevent disclosure of information relating to individual establishments, statistics for the last four provinces have been combined and are shown throughout this report under the head of "Other provinces."

PRINCIPAL STATISTICS

A summary of the principal statistics of the industry will be found in Table I by provinces for the calendar year 1922.

P r o d u c t i o n

The quantity and value of the principal products of the industry will be found in Table II by provinces for the calendar year 1922. The total value of all products was reported at \$3,909,370, this was \$120,921 in excess of the value recorded for the total 1921 output of \$3,788,449. In order of importance brushes made of hair or bristle take first place with 270,402 dozen valued at \$1,579,781, brooms take second place with 217,611 dozen valued at \$1,332,093, brushes of corn or fibre take third position with 219,637 dozen valued at \$433,408, brushes all other, whisks and mops follow in the order named.

Employees Salaries and Wages.

The number of persons employed in the industry is given in Table IV by (a) classes of employment (b) sex and (c) salary and wage payments for the calendar year 1922. The total number of persons employed was 1,194, and the total expenditure on account of salaries and wages amounted to \$1,156,091 - this being an increase over the year 1921 of 100 persons and \$85,182 in the payroll. Of this total Ontario contributed \$705,752 or 60.9 per cent, Quebec \$70,558 or 6.1 per cent, British Columbia \$60,835 or 5.2 per cent, whilst the other four provinces together accounted for the remaining 27.8 per cent.

Other Employment Statistics.

The number of wage earners of each sex employed in the industry is given by months in Table V for the calendar year 1922. The largest number of male employees was reported in the month of December with 757. The smallest number was in July, when only 651 men were employed. The maximum number of female factory workers was reached in the months of April and May with 248, whilst the minimum recorded for the year, - viz. 163 occurred in July.

Capital Investment.

The capital employed in the industry in 1922 is shown by provinces in Table III. The total investment of \$3,546,516 shows an increase of \$107,704 over the previous year. Fixed capital which comprises the amount invested in land, buildings, fixtures, machines and tools amounted to \$1,337,994, whilst working capital which is composed of materials on hand, stocks in process, finished products on hand, cash trading and operating accounts, etc., was reported at \$2,208,522. Of the total capital investment for the Dominion, Ontario contributed \$2,251,159 or 63.4 per cent, Quebec \$205,554 or 5.7 per cent, British Columbia \$99,742 or 2.8 per cent, whilst the remaining 28.1 per cent was divided amongst the other four provinces.

Materials Used.

The quantity and value of the principal materials used in the industry will be found in Table VII by provinces for the calendar year 1922. There was a decrease of \$173,709 in the cost of all materials used, over the previous year. The largest item of expense was for broom corn, of which 4,971,809 lbs. were consumed at a cost of \$561,786. Bristles, which are of secondary importance, were used to the extent of 268,645 lbs. valued at \$320,683. Broom handle and horse hair follow next in order of importance in the order named with an expenditure of \$138,242, and 106,573, respectively.

Fuel Statistics.

The quantity and cost value of the various kinds of fuel used in the industry is shown in Table VIII for the calendar year 1922. Out of a total of \$29,571 for all fuel used, bituminous coal accounted for \$23,344, anthracite coal ranks second in importance with \$3,216, whilst wood takes third place with \$1,212, coke, gas, other fuel and gasoline follow in the order named.

Power Installation.

The various classes of power used in the industry will be found in Table IX by (a) the number of units in each class and (b) the indicated horse-power capacity according to manufacturers rating for the calendar year 1922. Electricity was the principal motive power employed with 161 units providing 1,394 horse-power out of a total of 174 units with a capacity of 1,907 horse-power. Steam engines rank second, followed by gas and oil and gasoline engines.

Miscellaneous Expenses.

The miscellaneous expenses or overhead charges incurred in the industry during 1922 amounted to \$607,115 and included rents, taxes of all kinds, travelling and advertising expenses, telephone charges, insurance, and repairs to buildings and machinery, etc. Since 1921 manufacturers are no longer required to itemize their miscellaneous expenses.

Imports and Exports.

The value of the various kinds of raw or partly manufactured materials and the finished brooms and brushes imported into and exported from Canada during 1922 will be found in Tables X (a) and (b).
