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THE BROOM, BRUSH AND MOP INDUSTRY IN CANADA1923

Ottawa, March 1925:- A report is herewith presented on the broom, brush and mop industry in Canada during the calendar year 1923. Reports were received from 79 establishments, - an increase of 8 over the total for the previous year, - and were located by provinces as follows. Ontario, 45, Quebec, 23, British Columbia, 4, Manitoba 2, New Brunswick 2, Alberta 1, Nova Scotia 1, Prince Edward Island 1. In order not to disclose information concerning individual establishments, statistics for Manitoba, New Brunswick, Alberta, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island have been combined and are shown throughout this report under the head of "Other Provinces".


PRINCIPAL STATISTICS

PRODUCTION

The quantity and value of the various products of the industry are given by provinces in Table II for the calendar year 1923. The total value of production rose from \$3,909,370 in 1922 to \$4,577,319 in 1923, an increase of \$667,949. The first place in order of importance is occupied by brushes of hair or bristle with \$1,709,990, brooms follow next in order with \$1,692,241, whilst brushes of corn or fibre take third position with \$489,511.



CAPITAL INVESTMENT

The capital employed in the industry for the calendar year 1923 is shown by provinces in Table III. In spite of the fact that there were eight more establishments in operation in 1923 the total capitalization as reported was \$2,955 less than the total given for the previous year. Slight expansion can be noticed for the provinces of Ontario, Quebec and British Columbia whereas the remaining five provinces together show a decline in capital investment of approximately \$100,000 over the two year period.

Employees Salaries and Wages

The number of persons employed in the industry is given in Table IV for the calendar year 1923 by (a) classes of employment, (b) sex and (c) salary and wage payments. The total number of employees in all classes rose from 1194 in 1922 to 1340 in 1923 an increase of 146. The pay roll also showed a corresponding increase amounting to \$164,422 over the two year period.

Other Employment Statistics

The number of days the factories were in operation during the calendar year 1923, together with the number of hours per day or shift and per week normally worked by wage earners is given in Table V(a). The number of wage earners employed in the industry is shown by sex and by months in Table V(b). The maximum number employed was 1181 in the month of April whilst the minimum number reported was 977 in July.



MATERIALS USED

The quantity and value of the principal materials entering into the manufacture of brooms, brushes and mops is given by provinces in Table VI for the calendar year 1923. The total cost value of all materials used in 1922 was \$1,654,335. For the period covered by the report the amount was \$1,991,615, an increase of \$357,380.

Fuel Consumption

The quantity and cost value of the various kinds of fuel consumed in the industry during the calendar year 1923 is shown in Table VII. The total expenditure for all fuel rose from \$29,571 in 1922 to \$34,016 in 1923, an increase of \$4,445.

Power Installation



Miscellaneous Expenses

The miscellaneous expenses or overhead charges incurred in the industry during the calendar year 1923 fell from a total of \$607,115 in 1922 to \$586,159 for the period covered by this report, a decrease of \$20,956. Miscellaneous expenses include, - rents, taxes of all kinds, insurance premiums, telephone, telegraph and postal charges, advertising and travelling expenses and repairs to buildings and machinery.
