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. THE BROOM, BRUSH AND MOP INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1924

Ottawa, August, 1926 .- A report is herewith presented on the Broom, Brush and Mop Industry in Canada during the calendar year 1924. There were 79 establishments in operation and were located by provinces as follows:- Ontario 44; Quebec 23; British Columbia 5; New Brunswick 2; Nova Scotia 1; Prince Edward Island 1; Manitobal; Saskatchewanl; Albertal. To prevent disclosure of information concerning the operations of individual establishments, statistics for the provinces of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island have been combined under the head of "Maritime Provinces". Similar procedure has been adopted regarding Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, these being shown as "Prairie Provinces."

PRINCIPAL STATISTICS

A summary of the principal statistics of the industry is given by provinces in Table 1 for the calendar year 1924.

PRODUCTION

The quantity and value of the various kinds of brooms, brushes and mops manufactured during the calendar year 1924 is given by provinces in Table II. The total value of production fell from \$4,577,319 in 1923 to \$4,463,021 in 1924, a decrease of \$885,702. In order of importance brooms occupy the premier position with \$1,615,527 followed by brushes made of hair or bristles with \$1,598,451. whilst brushes made of corn or fibre take third place with \$479,180.

CAPITAL INVESTMENT

The total capital employed in the industry during the calendar year 1924 is shown by provinces in Table III. The total capitalization rose from \$3,543,561 in 1923 to \$3,962,072 in 1924, an increase of \$418,511. All provinces reported increases in capital investment over the two year period.

EMPLOYEES, SALARIES AND WAGES

The number of persons employed in the industry during the calendar year 1924 is given in Table 1V by (a) classes of employment, (b) sex and (c) salary and wage payments. The total number of employees in all classes fell from 1,340 in 1923 to 1,333 in 1924, a decrease of 7. There was a slight expansion in the payroll, in 1923 the total being \$1,320,513 whilst the amount reported or 1924 was \$1,338,955, an increase of \$18,442. A further table IV(b) gives the statistics of employment by Trovinces.

OTHER EMPLOYMENT STATISTICS

The number of days the factories were in operation during the calendar year 1924 together with the number of hours per day or shift and per week normally worked by wage earners is given in Table V(a). The number of wage earners employed in the industry is shown by sex and by months in Table V(b). The maximum number employed was 1,159 in the months of February and April whilst the minimum number reported was 998 in August.

MATERIALS USED

The materials used in the brush, broom and mop industry were not itemized on the questionnaire adopted in 1924 but were given in a grand total for value only, which in the year amounted to \$1,936,570. A distribution of the cost of such materials by provinces follows:-

FUED CONSUMPTION

The quantity and cost value, delivered at the factory, of the various classes of fuel used in this industry are shown in Table VI for the calendar year 1924. The cost of fuel decreased by \$6,688 when compared with the previous year, caused by a reduction in the price of bituminous coal as well as reduced consumption of 578 tons. Coal of all kinds represented 86.9 per cent of the total cost of all fuel.

POWER INSTALLATION

The power installed in brush and broom factories during 1924 is shown in Table VII, by classes, number of units in each class and the horsepower according to manufacturers' rating. Electric motors operated by purchased power provided over 68 per cent of the motive power in the entire industry. The cost of electricity for all purposes during the year amounted to \$17,264.
