

#### THE BROOM, BRUSH AND MOP INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1936.

A report of the broom, brush and mop industry in Canada during the calendar year 1936 is presented herewith.

There were seventy-nine establishments in operation which were located by provinces as follows: New Brunswick 1, Quebec 28, Ontario 39, Manitoba 3, Saskat-chewan 1, and British Columbia 7. To avoid divulging information concerning individual establishments, it has been necessary to combine statistics for the province of New Brunswick and Saskatchewan which are shown throughout the report as "Other Provinces".

These seventy-nine factories had a total capital investment of \$4,142,485, provided employment to 1,370 persons who received \$1,189,856 in salaries and wages. The sum of \$1,697,968 was expended for materials used, whilst the total output was valued at \$3,772,487.

The principal items of production in order of importance as represented by the total selling value at the factory were: corn brooms \$1,081,691, paint brushes \$764,342, mops - all kinds, \$387,554, brushes for household use \$273,575, hair brushes \$185,829.

Compared with the previous year there were increases of \$51,321 in the capital invested, \$51,901 in the salaries and wages paid, \$149,535 in the cost of materials used and \$311,013 in the gross value of the products.

The value of the imports of products made and materials used by the industry was \$1,391,037 in 1936 as compared with \$1,183,438 in 1935. Tooth brushes and toilet brushes together formed the greatest item and were valued at \$185,841 in 1936. Broom corn and bristles valued at \$822,219 were the chief raw materials imported.

Exports of this industry in 1936 were valued at \$129,133 of which \$111,322 represented the value of the brushes of all kinds.

Detailed statistics of production, materials used, capital, employment, power and fuel consumption, imports and exports are given in the tables following.

#### Size of Establishments

In view of the tendency towards concentration in industrial enterprises, a series of tables has been prepared presenting in a threefold way the size of establishments in the broom, brush and mop industry measured by (a) capital investment, (b) gross value of production and (c) the number of persons employed. The tables compared for a number of years indicate the movement of capital, production and employment within the industry.

In 1936 the number of establishments reporting was seventy-nine with a total capitalization of \$4,142,485, a gross value of production of \$3,772,487 and a total employment of 1,370. Nine factories had a total capital investment of \$2,941,579 or 71 per cent of the total capitalization, with an average investment of \$326,842 per establishment. 13 establishments had a gross value of production of \$2,762,361 or 73 per cent of the total output, with an average production of \$212,489 per establishment. In employment nine factorie, had 773 persons on the payroll, an average of eighty-six persons per establishment and 56 per cent of the total employment.
