#### THE BUTTON, BUCKLE, AND FASTENERS INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1940.

There were twenty-two establishments in Canada in 1940 engaged principally in the production of buttons, buckles, and fasteners, etc. Eleven of these establishments were located in the province of Quebec, ten in Ontario, and one in British Columbia. The industry as a whole reported a capital investment in fixed and current assets of \$1,877,541 and avvalue of production of \$2,524,388. Persons employed numbered 988 and salaries and wages paid \$887,602.

The output of the button industry was considerably higher in 1940. Compared with the previous year there was an increase of \$326,600 or 48.6 per cent in the gross value of production, 177 in the number of persons employed and \$225,199 in the amount of salaries and wages paid. The physical volume of production was also materially higher. The expansion of this industry during 1940 was not, however, as marked as the above figures would indicate. Although there is an actual increase, the main increase is due to the transfer of a large button manufacturer from the "Miscellaneous Chemical" to this industry. In view of this transfer definite comparisons with 1939 cannot be made without disclosing the operations of an individual establishment.

Buttons, of plastic materials to the value of \$962,708 was the most importand single item of production in 1940 followed by metal buttons valued at \$358,109 and pearl and fresh water pearl buttons valued at \$357,450. These items represent respectively 38.1, 14.2 and 14.2 per cent of the total value of production.

Referring to Table 4 it may be noted that 7 establishments represented a capital investment of \$1,499,472 or 79.8 per cent of the total. The output of these establishments was valued at \$2,102,522 or 83.2 per cent of the total and Employed 747 persons or 75.6 per cent of the total number.

Employment in this industry is fairly uniform throughout the year, there being no marked seasonal variations. Of the wage-earners employed in 1940, 509 or 61.7 per cent were males, as compared with a male employment of 435 or 65 per cent of the total wage-earners in 1939. The average salary in 1940 amounted to \$1,616 \$20 less than in 1939 and the average wage paid in 1940, \$756 was \$113 more than the 1939 average.

The export of buttons is of growing importance in Canada's foreign trade, shipments in 1940 totalling \$580,697, an increase of \$510,905. Imports were also higher, the \$326,392 so recorded represent an increase of \$99,994 over the previous year. Imports of buckles, clasps and other fasteners amounted to \$369,196 while exports of buckles and slide fasteners were valued at \$57,982.
