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# THE BUTTON, BUCKLE AND FASTENER INDUSTRY 1952

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## NOTICE

# THE BUTTON, BUCKLE AND FASTENER INDUSTRY

## 1952

Commencing with 1952, the value of factory shipments f.o.b. plant was collected in place of the gross value of production for those industries where inventory change was known to be insignificant and where, therefore, factory shipments approximate production. This changeover is expected to provide increased ease in reporting for the majority of plants while at the same time producing more reliable statistics in many cases. The button, buckle and fastener industry is one of those in which the change was made.

In 1952 reports were received from 45 establishments engaged principally in the production of buttons, buckles, fasteners, etc. Thirty-two of these establishments were located in the province of Quebec and thirteen in Ontario. Ontario, however, occupied the leading position in the industry with over 55 per cent of the value of factory shipments and over 56 per cent of the number of persons given employment.

The factory selling value of the goods shipped by the industry during the year amounted to \$11,016,828. Employment was given to 1679 persons, which was 57 more than in 1951, while the payroll increased by \$263,494 or 7 per cent to \$3,969,929. Materials used cost \$4,436,224, an increase of \$554,108 or 14 per cent over the earlier year.

Zipper fasteners continued to be the industry's most important commodity with shipments valued at \$6,154,962. Shipments of other main commodities in order of importance were moulded buttons valued at \$1,419,026, plastic buttons at \$904,120, metal buttons at \$515,180 and celluloid buttons at \$335,100. For further details of products shipped, see Table 3.

By referring to Table 9 it will be observed that in 1952 the 4 largest establishments reported shipments valued at \$5,520,956 or 50 per cent of the total. They also reported 824 or 49 per cent of all persons employed by the industry.
