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Forest Products Statistics:
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## The Sporting Goods Industry, 1928 and 1929:

Ottawa, Jamary 1931.- A preliminary report on the manufacture of sporting goods in Canada in 1928 and 1929 has recently been issued by the Zorest Products Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This report covers the operations of wood-working factories which specialice in the manufacture of sporting goods and in most cases covers the greater vart of the production of these commodities in Canada. The production of sqorting goods, however, is irequently carried on as a side line in wood-working factories classed in other industrial groups.

There were 23 establishments specializing in sporting soods in 1929, of which 15 were located in Onvario, 5 in Quebec, 1 in Nova Scotia and 2 in Manitoba. The capital invested amounted to $\$ 2,02 \hat{2}, 334$ and the employees numbered 525, with wages and salaries anounting to $\$ 505,972$. The fuel used cost $\$ 11,725$ and the power employed was 1,047 K.P. The materials used cost $\$ 943,709$ and the gross value of production was $\$ 2,184,022$, the net value or the value added by manufacture being $\$ 712,965$.

The rood used in the industry was chiefly sawn softwood lumber amounting to $1,872 \mathrm{Mft}$. board measure, valued at $\$ 75,576$; 756 if ft. hardwood lumber at $\$ 67,609$; 341 cords of hardwood bolts at $\$ 4,981$ and vencer and plywood valued at $\$ 3,640$. All other materials mere valued at $\$ 790,903$.

The more important items among the principal oroducts were hockey sticks, numbering 532,306 and valued at $\$ 207,852$; tennis racquets numbering 48,750 and valued at $\$ 213,861$. Comparatively iew skiis were made in this industry, the greater number being tumed out as side lines in boat and cnoe factories.

The following tables give, first a comparative sumary of the principal statistics of the industry for 1928 and 1929, followed by detailed comparative ables covering the distribution of establishments, matcrials used, products manufactured, capital invested, mployment fuel and power.
