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NOTICE

THE SPORTING GOODS INDUSTRY

1952

Commencing with 1952, the value of factory shipments f.o.b. plant was collected in place of the gross value of production for those industries where inventory change was known to be insignificant and where, therefore, factory shipments approximate production. This changeover is expected to provide increased ease in reporting for the majority of plants while at the same time producing more reliable, more meaningful statistics in many cases. The sporting goods industry is one of those in which the change was made.

In 1952 reports were received from 77 establishments engaged primarily in the manufacture of sporting goods. The factory selling value of the goods shipped from these plants during the year amounted to \$9,979,386. Employment was provided for 1541 persons which was 191 less than in 1951, while the payroll at \$3,687,606 was very little changed. The cost of materials used was \$3,694,839, a decrease of \$369,824 or 9 per cent.

Ontario, with 42 establishments, accounted for 76 per cent of the value of factory shipments and 71 per cent of employment. The remaining establishments were located as follows; Quebec 22, Manitoba 2, Saskatchewan 1, Alberta 1 and British Columbia 9. By reference to Table 9 it will be observed that 26 of the establishments reported factory shipments valued at \$8,554,842 or approximately 86 per cent of the total. They provided employment for 1216 persons or about 79 per cent of all persons employed.

Only establishments whose principal products consist of sporting equipment, supplies and accessories are classified to the Sporting Goods Industry. With few exceptions, separate articles are the output of less than three establishments and it is not possible, therefore, to present the many and varied items of manufacture in detailed form. Instead, it has been found necessary to group them under the head of that particular branch of sport in which they are used. The materials entering into the manufacture of sporting goods are of such a diversified nature that it is not feasible to show them in detail. Bicycles, firearms and ammunition are not included in this report.

The sporting goods produced by the establishments classified to this industry do not represent total Canadian production. There are concerns which manufacture sporting goods only as secondary or minor products and which are assigned to other industries on the basis of their more important items of manufacture. Table 4 of this report summarizes in as much detail as possible total sporting goods output as assembled from all industries. Unfortunately, the number of firms participating in the production or shipment of many of the commodities are too few to permit publication of separate figures without the possible disclosure of data of individual firms. The table specifies every commodity that could be shown separately.
