#### EXPLANATORY NOTES

This report is one in a series of about 140 publications which present the results of the 1960 Census of Manufactures. Most reports in this series refer to specific industries, but there are summary reports for Canada and the provinces and for major industry groups. Adoption of the revised Standard Industrial Classification for 1960 compilations has necessitated changes in titles of many reports in this annual series. The content of many industries has also been affected (see following note on Industrial Classification).

Industry statistics given in these reports refer to number of establishments, employees, salaries and wages, cost of materials, supplies, fuel and electricity, gross value of shipments, inventories and value added by manufacturing. Details of materials used and products shipped are also given. Descriptions of the principal industry statistics, with special reference to 1960 are as follows:

#### Period Covered

Firms are asked to submit figures for the calendar year, if at all possible, and most reports are on this basis. Financial year reports for periods differing from the calendar year are accepted in instances where the firms find it impossible to supply calendar year data from accounting records. However the data on employees, salaries and wages are requested on a calendar year basis in all cases.

#### Establishment

Data for the annual census is collected on an establishment basis. A firm with more than one plant is required to file a report for each plant. In most cases an establishment is a complete factory; sometimes, however, a plant is divided into two or more establishments when it carries out operations classifiable to different industries and when separate accounting records are available. Usually the statistics for an establishment relate only to the manufacturing activities. Other activities such as construction at the plant by its own employees, wholesale or retail activities carried on at the plant location, etc., are not included. Plants engaged solely in repair work (except in the case of furniture, shipbuilding, boat building, aircraft and railway rolling stock industries) are not included but plants occupied in assembling parts into complete units are included.

#### **Employees**

Administrative and office employees include all executives and supervisory officials such as presidents, vice-presidents, secretaries, treasurers, etc., together with managers, professional and technical employees, superintendents and factory supervisors above the working foremen level, and clerical employees. Working owners and partners are also included in this category.

Production and related workers include all other factory workmen whether paid on a monthly, weekly, hourly or piece-work basis. Working foremen doing work similar to that of the employees they supervise are included, as are maintenance, warehousing and delivery staffs. Employees on new construction work, in retail or wholesale operations, on outside piece work etc. are not included.

Production workers are reported by months, an average for the year being obtained by summing the monthly figures and dividing by twelve. This procedure is followed even though the plant did not operate in all months. Figures on employment refer to calendar years whether or not some establishments reported other data on a financial year basis.

#### Salaries and Wages

Salaries and wages refer to gross earnings of the employees described above, including salaries, wages, commissions, bonuses, the value of room and board where provided, deductions for income tax and social services such as sickness and unemployment insurance, pensions, etc., as well as any other allowances forming part of the employees' wages. Payments for overtime are included.

Salaries refer to amounts paid to administrative and office employees. Withdrawals by working owners or partners for normal living expenses for self and family are included but not their withdrawals for income tax. Wages refer to the amounts paid to production and related workers as defined above. Data on earnings refer to the calendar year whether or not some establishments reported other data on a financial year basis.

#### Cost of Fuel and Electricity

Figures for fuel refer to amounts actually used, (including fuel used in cars and trucks), not to purchases unless the quantities are the same. Values refer to the laid-down cost at the works, including freight, duty, etc.

#### Materials and Supplies Used

Figures represent quantities and laid-down cost values, at the works, of materials and supplies actually used during the year whether purchased from others or received as transfers from other plants of the reporting company. Amounts paid to other manufacturers for work done on materials owned by the reporting company are included. Returnable containers or any other items charged to capital account are not included. Fuels are not included. Goods bought from others or received as transfers from other plants or reporting companies for resale without further processing are not included. Maintenance and repair supplies not chargeable to capital account are included.

#### **Factory Shipments**

Factory shipments refer to shipments of goods made from own materials either in the reporting plant or by other manufacturers on the basis of a charge to the reporting plant for work done. All products and by-products shipped from the establishment are included whether for domestic use, export, or for government departments. Transfer shipments to sales outlets, distributing warehouses or to other manufacturing units of the reporting firm are included. Goods bought or received as transfers

and resold without further processing are not included. Values are computed on f.o.b. plant or plant warehouse basis, and do not include sales tax or excise duties. Values of containers not returnable are included. Amounts received in payment for work done on materials owned by others are included.

In a few industries such as shipbuilding, aircraft, etc., where work on principal products extend over a relatively long period, the value of production is recorded rather than the value of shipments. For those industries production is computed from the value of deliveries of complete units during the year plus the value of work done during the year on unfinished units less the value of work done in previous years on finished units delivered in the year under review.

#### Inventories

Values represent the book values of manufacturing inventories owned and held at the reporting plant. Figures include inventories held in warehouses or selling outlets which have been included with plant operations for purposes of reporting shipments.

#### Value added by Manufacturing

Figures are computed from value of shipments plus or minus changes in inventories of finished goods and goods in process less cost of materials, fuel and electricity. This figure is sometimes referred to as net production.

#### Standard Industrial Classification

The revised Standard Industrial Classification which has been introduced with the 1960 Census of Manufactures provides for a breakdown of the universe into 140 industries arranged in 20 major groups compared with 135 industries in 17 major groups in the old classification which was used in the compilations for the years 1949 to 1959 inclusive. It incorporates changes considered desirable on the basis of experience in using the earlier classification as well as those which take account of changes in the structure of Canadian industries associated with the rapid developments of the past decade. Full details are contained in the Standard Industrial Classification Manual, Catalogue No. 12-501, which is available from either the Queen's Printer or the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, Reporting establishments are classified or allotted to specific industries on the basis of the value of principal products made or shipped.

Many industries remain unchanged in the new classification but in many instances there have been substantial changes in content because of the shifting of establishments from one industry to another or in re-grouping of establishments. Where

changes have occurred the principal statistics for 1957, 1958 and 1959 have been re-compiled to provide data on a basis comparable with those for 1960.

#### Short Forms

Between 1949 and 1957, in an effort to ease the reporting burden for smaller firms, a short form was used asking for the total value of shipments only or, in a few cases where losses of detail were significant, for quantities and values of principal products. For purposes of publication, missing data were estimated on the basis of appropriate ratios. In general the cut-off point for these short forms was set at \$50,000 value of shipments. About 40% of the total number of establishments reported on the short form and accounted for less than 3 per cent of the total value of shipments.

In 1958, in order to establish a new base year, the small firms were asked to report all items of principal statistics together with some detail on materials and products.

For the 1959 Census, the short form was used again, but further steps were taken to ease the respondents' burden. First, the general limit for short forms was raised to \$100,000 value of shipments. In addition, a new intermediate form was developed. This form is a shortened version of the long form in that most of the general questions were pared down and the detailed lists of materials and products were limited to the more important items. The general limits for firms in this category were set at between \$100,000-\$500,000 value of shipments, but in the case of both the short and intermediate forms there were lower cut-offs for a number of industries in which the smaller firms accounted for a larger share of total shipments. On the other hand, limits were raised where this could be done without a significant loss of coverage. On most of the short forms for 1959, in addition to total value of shipments, data on principal products were requested. In a few industries, where loss of employment and earnings data were considered too large because of higher cut-offs, a question on total payroll was placed on the short form. This practice was followed again in 1960.

The intermediate and long forms provide complete data for the compilation of all elements of principal industry statistics and the details of materials and products. The one-page short form, although containing data on principal products and total value of shipments, does not request information on other elements of principal statistics such as value of inventories, materials, fuel and electricity and, in most cases, employment and salaries and wages, nor does it contain detailed data on volume and value of materials used. For purposes of compiling aggregates of principal statistics by industry and by geographic location, the missing data for each establishment were estimated for 1959 by using, in general, ratios based on the change in the value of shipments between 1958 and 1959. The proportion of the estimated data was generally less than 5 per cent of the total in each category of principal statistics.

¹ To arrive at the National Accounts concept of ''gross domestic product at factor cost'', it would be necessary to subtract also the cost of office supplies used, advertising, insurance and other goods and services obtained from other businesses. Data on these inputs are not collected on the annual Census of Manufactures. Value added figures for ''The primary industries and construction'' are published in D.B.S. publication 61-202, Survey of Production.

# MISCELLANEOUS MANUFACTURING INDUSTRIES

# 1960

For the 1960 survey, the Bureau implemented a revised Standard Industrial Classification, This brought about extensive changes and revisions to this industrial group as follows:

- (a) The Electric Lamp and Shade Industry was transferred to the Furniture and Fixtures group and will be published, for 1960 and subsequent years, in a new and separate report under Catalogue Number 35-214.
- (b) The Venetian Blind Manufacturers industry, formerly a part of the Miscellaneous Wood-Using Industries (Catalogue Number 35-207), was transferred to this industrial group and will be published separately, for 1960 and subsequent years, under Catalogue Number 47-210.
- (c) The Jewellery and Silverware Manufacturers industry, formerly part of the Metal Fabricating group, was transferred to this industrial group but will be published, for the 1960 report only, under its previous Catalogue Number 41-211.
- (d) The Fur Dressing and Dyeing Industry, formerly a part of the Textile group, was transferred to this industrial group for 1960 and is included in all the group totals, i.e. in Tables 1 to 3, inclusive, of this report. However, in order to maintain historical continuity for one year, the 1960 report on this industry has been published, as in the past, in the Fur Goods and Fur Dressing Industries report (Catalogue Number 34-213).
- (e) The Bicycle Manufacturing Industry, formerly included in the Transportation Equipment group (Catalogue Number 42-204), was disbanded and the establishments therein were transferred to the Sporting Goods Industry for 1960 and subsequent annual surveys.
- (f) Within the industries previously comprising this group, one industry was extensively revised on the new basis. This was the Model and Pattern Manufacturers industry, which was enlarged to include all the manufacturers of paper patterns, previously classified elsewhere.
- (g) A new industry, Dental Laboratories, was established and surveyed for the first time in 1960: the statistics of this industry will be found in a new 1960 report (Catalogue Number 47-206), details of which are given below.

The various changes outlined above necessitated changes to the various reports covering this industrial group. At the same time, the opportunity was taken to publish separate 1960 reports on various industries belonging to this group since the group as a whole has increased greatly in importance over the last five years. This group now comprises twenty-six industries of which sixteen are covered separately and the remaining ten are included in

this report in question. The separate reports, to be published for 1960 and subsequent years, are listed immediately below:

The effect of all the above changes and revisions has been to reduce the number of industries treated separately in this report to ten as follows:

All of the 1960 reports on this group will now include a separate list of the firms classified to each of the industries within this group. This change is in line with the practice prevailing in all other Census of Manufactures reports of which this group of reports forms part.

Tables 1 to 3, inclusive, of this report, cover this industrial group as a whole and the extensive changes and revisions outlined in detail above have, in turn, led to comparable changes in the statistics for this group. Table 1A of this report shows the Principal Statistics of this group, on the old basis, for representative years for the period 1926 to 1959, inclusive. Table 1B shows the same statistics, on the revised basis, for the years 1957 to 1960, inclusive. The comments made immediately below refer to the revised data only and this should be firmly borne in mind when they are considered. The fact that the 1960 figures include those of Dental Laboratories, a new industry, whereas the revised 1959 ones do not, should be especially noted.

The total factory shipments by this group were valued at \$538,935,510 in 1960 as opposed to \$505,198,716 in 1959, an increase of \$33,736,794 or 6.7 per cent. In 1960, 2,493 establishments were classified to this group an increase of 632 over 1959. The reporting firms employed 47,083 persons, an increase of 2,937 or 6.7 per cent, over the 44,146

employed in 1959. Salary and wage payments, at \$172,219,763 in 1960, were higher by \$17,895,285 or 11.6 per cent than the \$154,324,478 paid out in the previous year. Materials and supplies used in manufacturing cost \$237,597,396 in 1960 as opposed to \$220,441,688 in 1959: this represents an increase of \$17,155,708 or 7.8 per cent over the previous year's total.

On this revised basis, as on the old one, Ontario continued to be the predominant province in the group, contributing 64.2 per cent of the total value of shipments and accounting for 60.7 per cent of the total number of employees. The Quebec firms reported 28.2 per cent of the total factory sales and 30.3 per cent of the workers.

Capital and repair expenditures for this industrial group as a whole in 1960 were \$25,451,000 of which \$17,375,000 were of a capital nature, the remaining \$8,076,000 being expended on repair work.

Note: The commodity figures shown for the industries in this publication are not necessarily Canadian totals for the items specified. It is not unusual for a commodity to be produced as a secondary product in two or more industries. For total Canadian figures, reference should be made to the appendix to the annual report entitled General Review of the Manufacturing Industries of Canada.

The opening inventory for 1960 differs from the closing inventory for 1959 because of the receipt of revised data, the inclusion of new firms and the removal of figures for firms which did not operate during 1960.

#### ARTIFICIAL FLOWERS AND FEATHERS MANUFACTURERS

As can be seen from Table 4, this industry has not been changed in composition by the adoption of the revised classification. The Artificial Flowers and Feathers Manufacturers industry is defined as comprising those "establishments manufacturing feathers, plumes and artificial flowers". Again, as from 1958 to 1959, the level of operations rose in spite of the fact that the number of establishments fell from 38 to 35. The value of factory shipments, given in detail in Table 5, at \$3,541,178 was 5.2 per cent above the previous year's total \$3,364,737. The value of production, estimated from the value of shipments by adjusting for changes during the year in plant inventories of goods in process and finished goods was \$3,469,652 in 1960. Employment was afforded 493 persons, five more than in 1959; whilst the payroll increased by 13.0 per cent from \$1,148,039 to \$1,297,893. The value of materials and supplies used by the industry in 1960 was \$1,326,952, a very substantial increase over the 1959 figure of \$966,390, but still below the record 1958 total of \$1,345,310. Table 5 shows certain changes in the composition of the products shipped from 1959 to 1960 which may, once again, partially account for this change in costs.

The industry is almost confined to Quebec and Ontario. With 35 establishments reporting, the former province was responsible for 60.6 per cent of the employees and for 52.1 per cent of the total value of shipments. Ontario accounted for the balance of employment and factory sales, except for the contribution of the lone firm in Manitoba.

The total value of artificial flowers shipped in 1960 was \$2,085,870, compared to a similar figure of \$1,948,473 in 1959. Second in importance were feathers and feather trimming valued at \$396,699. For further details of products shipped see Table 5.

A list of the firms classified to this industry in 1960 will be found at the end of this report.

#### ARTIFICIAL ICE MANUFACTURERS

Again, as can be seen from Table 6, there was no change in the composition of this industry from the 1959 to the 1960 survey. The Artificial Ice Manufacturers industry is defined as comprising those "establishments manufacturing artificial ice for sale". Firms, whose principal activity is the making of ice for their own refrigeration systems, are excluded from this industry. The harvesting and storing of natural ice is not considered to be a manufacturing operation: establishments so engaged are, therefore, also excluded.

In 1960 there were 46 firms in the industry, the same as in 1959, and these were located as follows: Nova Scotia 4; New Brunswick 2; Quebec 5; Ontario 22; Manitoba 1; Saskatchewan 1; Alberta 2; and British Columbia 9. The value of shipments of ice for the year amounted to \$2,624,447 compared to

sales valued at \$3,169,839 in 1959. Employment was provided for 348 persons, who were paid a total of \$1,249,117 in salaries and wages. Materials costing \$225,648 were consumed in the manufacturing process. The value of production, estimated from the value of shipments by adjusting for changes during the year in plant inventories of goods in process and finished goods was \$2,627,460 in 1960.

The industry shipped 375,705 tons of ice in 1960, 16.1 per cent less than the 447,940 tons reported the year before. The value of manufactured ice exported was \$16,774. Separate statistics are not maintained in the imports of artificial ice, although such imports did take place in 1960.

A list of the firms classified to this industry in 1960 will be found at the end of this report.

#### CANDLE MANUFACTURERS

Although the Bureau has adopted a revised Standard Industrial Classification for the 1960 survey, there has been no change in this industry as can be seen from the scrutiny of the Principal Statistics in Table 7. The Candle Manufacturers industry continues to be defined as comprising those "establishments making candles".

Factory shipments amounting \$3,002,515 f.o.b. plant were reported by the Candle Manufacturers industry in 1960. This total was less than one per cent below the \$3,027,059 worth of shipments reported the previous year. The value of production, estimated from the value of shipments by adjusting for changes during the year in plant inventories of goods in process and of finished goods, was \$2,945,058 in 1960. The number of employees decreased by 6 persons, from 251 in 1959 to 245 in 1960. Salaries and wages were slightly lower at \$837,180 in 1960, being very slightly below the total 1959 payments of \$839,725. Materials used in manufacture cost \$1,189,529 in the year under review, \$48,416 or 3.9 per cent below the 1959 figure of \$1,238,045.

There were 19 firms in this industry in 1960, four less than the year before. These were distributed as follows: Quebec 13; Ontario 2; Manitoba 1;

Alberta 1; and British Columbia 2, Quebec, with 13 establishments, accounted for 92.8 per cent of the value of all factory shipments during 1960.

The principal product of the industry is religious candles. In 1960 shipments of these candles were: 7-day lights, 174,021 dozen valued at \$981,544; candles, 751,406 pounds at \$757,806; and votive lights, all kinds, 1,889,640 dozen at \$603,739. Other main items in order of importance were: household candles, 1,344,993 pounds worth \$332,892; and coloured and fancy candles, including wax novelties, 189,843 dozen worth \$255,037.

The chief material used by the industry was paraffin, of which 1,193,022 pounds refined and 4,138,443 pounds crude were used at a cost of \$111,068 and \$298,760, respectively. Beeswax was consumed in the amount of 278,503 pounds valued at \$159,574. Stearic acid used in manufacture, 165,044 pounds in 1960, cost the firms \$22,598.

Imports of paraffin wax candles in the year under review amounted to 596,009 pounds, with a value of \$179,772, and those of other candles to 176,060 pounds valued at \$68,187. Exports of candles were 71,503 pounds worth \$35,837.

#### HAIR GOODS MANUFACTURERS

Although the Bureau has adopted a revised Standard Industrial Classification for the 1960 survey, there has been no change in this industry can be seen from the scrutiny of the Principal Statistics in Table 9. The Hair Goods Manufacturers industry continues to be defined as comprising those "establishments making hair, bristles and hair goods".

Manufacturers of hair goods products reported the value of their 1960 shipments at \$1,044,055, an increase of 18.4 per cent above the \$881,747 reported in 1959. The value of production, estimated from the value of shipments by adjusting for changes during the year in plant inventories of goods in process and of finished goods, was \$1,039,365. The number of employees increased by 23 persons, from 94 in 1959 to 117 in 1960. Salaries and wages also were much higher at \$389,389 in 1960, being \$60,008 or 18.2 per cent above the total 1959 pay-

ments of \$329,381. Materials used in manufacture cost \$404,146 in the year under review, \$16,281 or 4.2 per cent above the 1959 expenditure of \$387,865.

In 1960 there were 13 establishments, three more than the year before. These were located by provinces as follows: Quebec 3; Ontario 7; Manitoba 1; and British Columbia 2. Ontario, with 7 firms, accounted for 71.2 per cent of the value of factory shipments and for 75.2 per cent of the employment.

The major part of the increase in shipments may be attributed to the notable rise in sales of cleaned and dressed animal hair, from 136,651 pounds valued at \$195,489 in 1959, to 259,038 pounds worth \$343,543 in 1960. Further details of factory shipments may be found in Table 10.

#### MODEL AND PATTERN MANUFACTURERS

For the Census of Manufactures Survey year 1960, the Bureau implemented a revised Standard Industrial Classification, one of the results of which was a change in the composition of this industry as a scrutiny of the revised Principal Statistics for the years 1957 to 1959, inclusive (Table 11B), will show. Prior to the 1960 survey, manufacturers of paper patterns were not included in this industry; however, from 1960 onwards, these firms will be included in this industry. Because of the above revisions, it has not been possible to publish the 1959 factory shipments data on the revised basis. However, whenever 1959 data are given in this preface, these are on the revised basis. The Model and Pattern Manufacturers industry is now defined as comprising those "establishments making models and patterns of all materials".

The value of production, estimated from the value of shipments by adjusting for changes during the year in plant inventories of goods in process and of finished goods, was \$8,735,360. Factory shipments by this industry during the current year reached a total value of \$8,652,609, an increase of 4.8 per cent over the preceding year's total of

\$8,257,188. On the other hand, the total cost of materials and supplies used, \$1,632,224 was 16.1 per cent below the comparable 1959 figure of of \$1,945,579. The payroll consisted of 853 employees, who were paid \$3,977,492; in 1959, the 815 persons then employed by the industry earned \$3,613,248.

There were 92 firms in the industry in 1960, six more than in 1959. They were distributed by provinces as follows: Quebec 22; Ontario 61; Manitoba 1; Alberta 1; and British Columbia 7. Ontario, with 61 establishments, accounted for 87.4 per cent of the value of factory shipments, and for 81.9 per cent of employment.

The leading product of this industry in 1960 was moulds, factory shipments of which attained a total value of \$3,870,903. Models and patterns followed behind with sales f.o.b. plant of \$4,310,629. Further details of factory shipments by the industry may be found in Table 12.

#### SMOKERS' SUPPLIES MANUFACTURERS

Although the Bureau has adopted a revised Standard Industrial Classification for the 1960 survey, there has been no change in this industry as can be seen from the scrutiny of the Principal Statistics (Table 13) apart from one in title, namely from Pipes, Lighters and Other Smokers' Supplies Industry to Smokers' Supplies Manufacturers. This industry is defined as comprising those "establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing tobacco pipes and cigarette holders".

In 1960 factory shipments by Smokers' Supplies Manufacturers industry were valued at \$2,158,617, a decrease of 11.4 per cent below the comparable 1959 figure of \$2,435,919. The value of production, estimated from the value of shipments by adjusting for changes during the year in plant inventories of mods in process and of finished goods, was \$1,100,941. Employment in the current year was stightly higher, 161 as against 153, and salaries and wages also rose, by 4.2 per cent: from \$497,184 to \$517.836 in the year under review.

The cost of materials and supplies used in the process of manufacture amounted to \$964,933, a decrease of 6.2 per cent below the comparable expenditure of \$1,028,483 made in 1959. The industry in 1960 was comprised of 13 establishments, 7 of which were in Quebec, and 6 in Ontario.

Details of the products shipped by the industry must be suppressed in order to preserve information of a confidential nature. However, it is possible to publish figures assembled from all industries for most of the main commodities produced in the Smokers' Supplies Manufacturers industry. These all-industry shipments for both 1959 and 1960 are given in Table 14.

#### STAMP AND STENCIL (RUBBER AND METAL) MANUFACTURERS

Although the Bureau has adopted a revised Standard Industrial Classification for the 1960 survey, there has been no change in the composition of this industry as can be seen from the scrutiny of the Principal Statistics (Table 15). However, a slight one in title occurred, namely from Stamps and Stencils (Rubber and Metal) Industry to Stamp and Stencil (Rubber and Metal) Manufacturers. This industry is defined as comprising those "establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing rubber and metal stamps and stencils".

In 1960 reports were received from 70 plants, three more than the year before. These were located as follows: Nova Scotia 1; Quebec 15; Ontario 35; Manitoba 5; Saskatchewan 2; Alberta 3; and British Columbia 9. These firms made factory shipments during the year amounting to \$8,058,390 f.o.b. plant, 9.4 per cent above the \$7,367,331 worth of goods shipped in 1959. The value of production, estimated from the value of shipments by adjusting for changes during the year in plant inventories of goods in

process and finished goods, was \$8,074,296. Employees numbered 1,006 compared to 968 the year before; their salaries and wages, \$3,939,299, were 10.2 per cent higher than the \$3,575,234 paid by the industry the preceding year. Materials and Supplies used in production cost \$2,430,428 in 1960 as against \$2,282,475 in 1959, an increase of 6.5 per cent

The industry, in 1960, reported shipments worth \$2,162,441 for the item "stamps, daters and other marking devices"; of this total \$1,833,522 worth were of rubber. Factory sales of rubber dies amounted to \$803,232 and of other dies to \$284,050. Seals, all kinds, were shipped to the value of \$298,615, and stencils, all kinds, to the value of \$85,471. Further details of factory shipments may be found in Table 16.

# STATUARY, ART GOODS, REGALIA AND NOVELTY MANUFACTURERS

For the Census of Manufactures Survey year 1960, the Bureau implemented a revised Standard Industrial Classification one of the results of which was a minor change in the composition of this industry as a scrutiny of the revised Principal Statistics for the years 1957 to 1959, inclusive (Table 17B) will show. Whenever the 1959 data are shown in this preface, these refer to the revised figures. The Statuary, Art Goods, Regalia and Novelty Manufacturers industry, formerly known as the Statuary, Art Goods, Regalia and Novelties Industry, is now defined as comprising those "establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing statuary, art goods and novelties (except those of stone or concrete)".

Activity within this industry was at a slightly higher level in 1960, the value of shipments, \$5,656,676, being less than one per cent above the comparable 1959 amount of \$5,635,208. The value of production, estimated from the value of shipments by adjusting for changes during the year in plant inventories of goods in process and finished goods, was \$5,617,146 in 1960. The number of employees rose from 788 to 815 in 1960: similarly, their aggregate salaries and wages rose in the same period from \$2,101,756 to \$2,277,651, or by 8.4 per cent.

The industry in 1960 was comprised of 95 establishments, three more than the year before. The provincial distribution was as follows: Quebec 46; Ontario 33; Manitoba 8; Alberta 1; and British Columbia 7.

In the year under review, the industry shipped statues valued at \$561,147, an increase of 7.7 per cent over the \$520,879 worth sold in 1959. Other statuary and art goods shipped had a value of \$743,039 compared to the previous year's total of \$1,007,704. Shipments of crests, emblems, etc., attained a value of \$364,541, or 27.6 per cent below the \$503,753 reported in 1959. More detailed information on commodity shipments may be found in Table 18.

Imports of the principal commodities manufactured by the industry were as follows: statues and statuettes of porcelain or earthenware, \$897,213; statues and statuettes of materials other than porcelain or earthenware, \$331,730; and regalia and badges, \$207,373.

### **UMBRELLA MANUFACTURERS**

Although the Bureau has adopted a revised Standard Industrial Classification for the 1960 survey, there has been no change in this industry as can be seen from the scrutiny of the Principal Statistics in Table 19. The Umbrella Manufacturers industry, previously known as The Umbrella Manufacturing Industry, is defined as comprising those "establishments primarily engaged in manufacturing umbrellas and canes".

The Umbrella Manufacturers industry is a small one with gross value of shipments that has hovered around the million dollar mark for the past few years. As in 1959, there were eight reporting firms in 1960; 4 in Quebec; 1 in Ontario; and 3 in British Columbia.

In 1960 the industry shipped \$1,063,526 worth of goods, compared to total 1959 shipments valued

at \$1,092,807. Employment, which stood at 114 in the year under review, and salary and wage payments, which totalled \$330,781, were 9.5 per cent lower and 12.2 per cent higher, respectively, than the 1959 figures of 126 and \$294,810. Materials and supplies used in manufacture cost \$539,192, as against a similar figure of \$559,305 for 1959.

Shipments in 1960 of 29,878 dozen umbrellas valued at \$883,516, were 1.1 and 2.0 per cent, respectively, below the 30,200 dozen worth \$901,009 shipped the previous year. In addition to a small amount received for repair work done, shipments of sundry items of men's furnishings were reported.

#### OTHER MISCELLANEOUS INDUSTRIES

For the Census of Manufactures Survey year 1960, the Bureau implemented a revised Standard Industrial Classification one of the results of which was a change in the composition of this industry as a scrutiny of the revised Principal Statistics for the years 1957 to 1959, inclusive (Table 21) will show. For this 1960 survey, two special groups of firms were transferred into this industry: (a) establishments producing mainly gaskets of more than one material; and, (b) firms chiefly making folding doors out of more than one material. These transfers were aimed at bringing together in this industry most of the firms making specialized end products of many varied materials.

The "Other Miscellaneous Industries", previously known as "The Miscellaneous Industries, N.E.S.", comprises those establishments that cannot be assigned to other industries of the revised Standard Industrial Classification. These firms manufacture either a product, or products, not covered by a distinct classification, or a product, or products, that would be assignable to existing classifications were it not for their mixed nature.

This industry, because of its heterogeneous composition, is subject to considerable fluctuation, so that comparisons between years do not have any great significance. It was composed of 54 plants in

1960, four less than the year before. Of this number 13 were in Quebec; 38 in Ontario; and one each in Manitoba, Alberta, and British Columbia.

In 1960 the industry shipped goods worth \$22,216,590 f.o.b. plant, as against shipments valued at \$23,760,147 the year before. The payroll listed 2,012 persons, who received \$6,710,436 in salaries and wages, compared to the 2,208, who were paid \$7,105,851 in 1959. Materials used in manufacture in the year under review cost \$8,983,010, compared to a similar outlay of \$9,170,489 in the preceding year.

The products are, of course, quite varied and include such diverse objects as hair nets and musical powder boxes, jewellery findings and trays, needles and cases for musical instruments. Unfortunately, too few firms are engaged in the manufacture of the individual items to permit publication of data on products. However, it is possible to give the 1960 shipments of folding doors, all types, by all manufacturing industries which were 151,116 such doors valued at \$2,288,121. As pointed out previously, most of the firms making this product are now classified to this industry.

A list of the firms classified to this industry in 1960 will be found at the end of this report.
