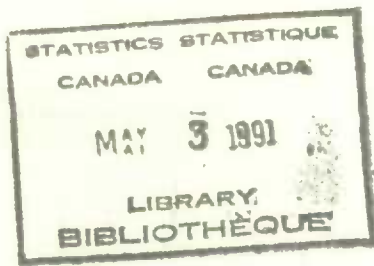

INTRODUCTION

This report presents results of the seventh survey of urban family expenditure to be carried out by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics since the series of small-scale continuing surveys was initiated in 1953. The survey was carried out in February and March, 1968 and refers to the calendar year 1967. The sample of 2,950 households from which 2,096 usable expenditure records were obtained was allocated among eleven major urban centres: St. John's, Halifax, Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, Winnipeg, Regina, Saskatoon, Edmonton and Vancouver.

Table I shows the survey criteria of family composition, family income and geographic location applied to each of the seven surveys of the complete budget. Four of these surveys obtained information on spending patterns of a group of middle-income families of specified composition known as the Consumer Price Index "target group". This group was selected from the comprehensive 1947-48 survey to provide the weighting system for the Consumer Price Index which was in effect up to January, 1961. The criteria of geographic location, family composition and family income which defined the

1947-48 target group, provided the basis for eligibility criteria which were applied in the surveys of 1953, 1955, 1957 and 1962. However, although the original target group referred to families living in 27 Canadian cities with population over 30,000, these later surveys were limited to selected larger cities across Canada. Each of the four restricted survey programs comprised a record-keeping survey of food expenditure detail by rotating monthly samples throughout the year, followed by a recall survey of the complete budget by a different sample surveyed early in the year following.

The survey was broadened in scope in 1959, when no restriction on family composition or income were imposed. The monthly food surveys were omitted and the recall sample was doubled in size. The 1964 survey was carried out on the same basis except that while referring implicitly to cities with populations of 30,000 and over, its sample was concentrated in larger Canadian cities, in order to produce data for individual cities. The 1967 survey, however, was carried out on a virtually identical basis to the survey of 1964, with which it is therefore directly comparable.

SAMPLING AND FIELD OPERATIONS

As in previous surveys, the sample was drawn from the Labour Force Area Sample. Eleven metropolitan areas, including city proper and fringe areas, were selected for inclusion in the sample. This selection was made arbitrarily on the basis of practical considerations of regional office location, availability of enumerators and the size of the Labour Force Sample in the city concerned. Each of the urban centres selected was a primary sampling unit in the Labour Force Sample.

Within each city, or primary sampling unit, the secondary unit was the segment. The sample was drawn from households which had been rotated out of the Labour Force Sample from six to eight months earlier, by systematic selection of rotated households.

The total of 2,950 households was distributed as follows: St. John's, 150; Halifax, 200; Quebec, 200; Montreal, 500; Ottawa, 300; Toronto, 500; Winnipeg, 300; Regina, 100; Saskatoon, 100; Edmonton, 250; and Vancouver, 350. This allocation

of the sample among cities was disproportionate to the populations represented, in order to allow adequate samples in the smaller cities. The disproportion was later corrected by weighting survey results to give each city its due importance in the composite.

Field work was carried out in February and March, 1968, under the supervision of regional offices of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Approximately one hundred enumerators were selected from experienced Labour Force enumerators.

Additional training was given by regional office staff in each city. Members of head office staff visited the regional offices at an early stage in field operations, to review completed schedules and discuss enumerators' problems with them. Completed schedules were given a preliminary editing by regional office staff, which included a balance between receipts and disbursements. Schedules which failed to balance within ten per cent were examined more closely and referred back to enumerators for further inquiry.

SURVEY METHODS AND RELIABILITY OF RESULTS

Survey Methods

The 1967 survey was conducted in the same manner as earlier surveys of family expenditure. The enumerator was first required to list all members of the household and to determine the spending units which comprised the household. The enumerator then completed an expenditure record for each spending unit, recording the information on a detailed schedule. Facsimiles of the Household Control Card (FEX 1) and the Schedule (FEX 2) appear in the Appendix to this report.

The collection of expenditures by recall imposes a considerable task on both the interviewer and the respondents, necessitating lengthy interviews and frequently more than one visit in order to obtain complete information. It is considered that the calendar year provides boundaries which are apt to be more clearly defined in the respondent's mind than any other twelve-month period. Purchases of large items, automobiles, chesterfield suites, etc., may be recalled fairly readily. This is also the case with rent, property taxes and monthly payments on mortgages. Food expenditure, which comprises almost one quarter of the average budget, can be estimated in terms of weekly or monthly expense. Expenses on smaller items, which are purchased at regular intervals, are usually estimated on the basis of amount and frequency of purchase. The accuracy of other family expenditures, such as those for clothing, depends upon the ability of the respondent to remember individual purchases at a considerable level of detail.

Survey Processing

Editing was carried out in several stages. The preliminary edit in the regional office was mainly for completeness, so that, if necessary, a schedule could be returned for further information.

This was the third survey in the series to be processed by computer. The manual editing carried out in head office comprised (1) a review of each schedule for consistency and correct location of items; (2) coding a limited number of items which were reported non-numerically; (3) performing certain adjustments on reported information and (4) reviewing the balancing check. The computer edit performed a variety of consistency checks including the balancing check, and formed the basis of further clerical editing and correction of incorrect entries on tape. Records identified by the computer as being outside the ten per cent limit were submitted to a final appraisal to determine whether they should be accepted or deleted. Experience in 1962 had indicated that in this type of survey too much reliance on a mechanical edit could be as time-consuming as a more complete manual edit, and that, in fact, the identification and correction of errors at this stage demanded much more care on the part of the clerical staff.

Response Errors and Sampling Error

Errors in sample surveys can be divided into two main types, errors of response, and sampling errors. Errors of response may be due to inaccurate

answers or incomplete information. The latter may be the fault of the design of the schedule, faulty questioning by the enumerator, refusal of the respondent to co-operate, or failure to locate some families.

In addition, all samples are subject to sampling error, which arises from the fact that only a portion of the universe is observed. Sampling error is related to the size and efficiency of the sample, the frequency of reporting the item and the variation in expenditures on the item. In general, smaller relative sampling errors are associated with groups of items which are reported by the majority of families, such as totals for food, clothing, household operation, personal care supplies, and medical care. The largest sampling errors occur in individual items infrequently purchased such as major durables or air travel; or groups of items on which the percentage of families reporting expenditure was relatively low. In the detailed tables of this report the percentage of families reporting is shown for each item beside the average expenditure per family.

Reference has already been made in the foregoing sections on survey methods and survey processing to the balancing check which is performed on individual schedules. For the second time in this series of reports, the account-balancing difference is published as a part of the information accompanying each expenditure pattern. For a given group of families, the account-balancing difference represents the average net amount, either positive or negative,

by which the schedules comprising the group were not in balance. A positive account-balancing difference indicates an excess of income, other money receipts and debit items of financial change (decrease in assets and increase in liabilities) over expenditures and credit items of financial change (increase in assets and decrease in liabilities). A negative account-balancing difference indicates the reverse, an excess of expenditure and credit items.

Over the whole sample, the account-balancing difference was -\$58 or 0.7 per cent of average income. This relatively small difference is reassuring in that it indicates there was considerable balancing between positive and negative differences over the whole range of records.

It should be noted that the "allowable" balancing difference, which served as an error signal was ten per cent of total receipts or disbursements, whichever was larger. This method allowed a greater margin of error to families who had substantial changes in assets and liabilities, such as the sale or purchase of a home, and probably accounted for the larger difference averaged by the mixed-tenure groups and contributed to the difference of the group of owners with mortgages. For both these groups, average age of the head was lower and there was a greater average number of children, both facts which are consistent with what has been observed in the classifications by age of head and family type.

SURVEY RESPONSE

The 2,096 usable schedules were obtained from an estimated 3,041 spending units living in the 2,950 households included in the sample. Of the 945 spending units for which usable schedules were not obtained, 69 referred to vacant dwellings, and 104 were otherwise ineligible. Of the remaining 772 spending units, an estimated 174 represented non-contacts with whom no interview was possible, 550 spending units which either completely or partially refused to complete the schedule, and 48 provided schedules which were rejected in office editing as being too far out of balance to be usable.

The overall response rate of 68.9 per cent was fractionally higher than the 68.7 per cent obtained in the 1964 survey. In both of these surveys information concerning household composition was available from Labour Force documents for the majority of households where co-operation was not obtained. For dwellings where occupancy had changed since the Labour Force Survey, no information was obtained in 1967. For the purpose of calculating the response rates by city in Table II, it was assumed that each of these unknown households contained one spending unit. The response rate was then calculated as the percentage of the estimated number of eligible spending units represented by usable schedules.

Although no eligibility criteria of income or family composition were applied, similar to those in some of the earlier surveys, there were certain

conditions under which spending units were not eligible, or were excluded from tabulations. Spending units which were found to have derived over one-half of their income from farming were excluded even though they lived in urban areas, as were families of official representatives of foreign countries living in Canada, and families (or individuals) living full time in institutions. Also excluded were part-year spending units, which comprised families and individuals which had immigrated to Canada during the survey year, units formed by marriage during the year of persons who had both been members of existing spending units previous to their marriage, and other families and individuals who became independent spending units during the survey year. (See section on part-year families page 16.)

Table II presents an analysis of response by city, family type and age of head. Among cities, individual response rates ranged as high as 80 per cent in Quebec City, to a low of 56 per cent in Saskatoon. The other nine cities registered response rates between 63 and 74 per cent.

The classification of response rates by family type shows that, as in previous surveys, families composed of two adults with children under sixteen responded better than did families composed entirely of adults. For this group as a whole the response rate was 73.6 per cent; which presumably reflects, amongst other things, the relatively low incidence in these groups of wives working full time. The

lowest response rates were registered by families of three adults (63 per cent), one adult (64 per cent) and "other" families (64 per cent). All family types were accommodated in the range 63 to 79 per cent.

The classification by age of head showed response rates in a slightly narrower range, namely 64 to 77 per cent.

PRESENTATION OF SURVEY RESULTS

The tables in this report represent a selection from a considerably larger number of detailed tables. In Tables 1 to 10 inclusive, patterns of family expenditure for the total sample of families and one-person spending units are presented, classified by important family characteristics. Tables 11 to 18 provide similar information for families of two or more as a group, classified by the major characteristics, city, income, age of head, and also by two additional classifications particularly relevant to

families, namely number of full-time earners and employment status of wife. A more restricted group of families of two to six persons with family income in the range \$4,000-\$9,999 is covered in Table 19. In the foregoing tables information on family attributes in the form of percentages and averages is provided, descriptive of the families in each class.

Tables 20 to 24 provide full expenditure detail for the patterns presented in Tables 1, 2, 4, 12 and

13 respectively. Information is in the form of average expenditure per family and percentage of families reporting. Average expenditure per person may be derived by dividing average per family by average family size. The average expenditure per family reporting on a given item can be derived by the following calculation:

$$\frac{\text{Average expenditure per family}}{\text{Percentage of families reporting}} \times 100$$

Complete expenditure detail is available for all classifications shown in Tables 1 to 19 and for some classifications not shown in this report,

namely: cities grouped by region, immigrant arrival year, mother tongue. In addition, the following two-way classifications of complete detail are available for analytical uses, and may be obtained subject to the terms of the Statistics Act which prohibits the release of information from individual records:

- City by family income
- City by family type
- City by tenure of head
- Age of head by family income
- Family type by family income

PATTERNS OF FAMILY EXPENDITURE

(a) Introductory Note

The intention of the following pages is to direct the reader's attention to highlights of the accompanying tables and to suggest modes of looking at them. The level of total expenditure is closely related to family income which in turn is determined by characteristics, such as age, education and occupation of the family head and other family members. Aspects of this may also be revealed by the number of earners or the employment of the wife. The distribution of total expenditure among its components reflects the varying impact of the foregoing characteristics and also of other characteristics, such as number of children and other dependents, city, country of origin, year of arrival of immigrants, and tenure.

Expenditure patterns classified according to family characteristics reveal variations, both in expenditure levels and in percentage distribution, of families in different socio-economic groups. There are, however, three aspects which should be considered in regard to this. Firstly, classification according to one characteristic will not generally render data homogeneous with respect to other characteristics. It is, therefore, hazardous to compare classes according to one classification without allowing for differences in composition in relation to other characteristics. Secondly, the significance of differences between classes must be judged against the likely response and sampling errors inherent in the data. Lastly, the presentation of the data given here, while designed to facilitate comparisons, may not be in the most relevant form for all uses. In some instances, it may be more useful to compare expenditures in relation to income, total current consumption or some other aggregate expenditure which excludes certain, more or less, non-discretionary items, such as personal taxes and security payments.

(b) Changes in Expenditure Patterns 1964-67

A comparison of results from the surveys of 1964 and 1967 indicated that over the three-year period, average incomes for families and individuals rose by 27 per cent. The increase in total family expenditure from \$6,395 to \$8,000, amounting to 25 per cent, included increases in personal taxes, contributions and gifts, and other non-consumption

items. Expenditure on current consumption per family increased by a little more than 20 per cent, from \$5,296 to \$6,380. These increases are consistent with per capita advances registered by National Account series, over the same period, for the Canadian economy as a whole. At the national level, per capita income rose by nearly 30 per cent, and per capita personal expenditure on current goods and services increased by 20 per cent. In spite of differences in content and concept between the two expenditure series, changes in the distribution of personal expenditure as indicated by household surveys, on the one hand, and the aggregative approach on the other, were broadly similar.

The differing rates of increase shown by the expenditure surveys between total expenditure (25 per cent) and current consumption (20 per cent) reflected the increasing impact of personal taxes on rising incomes, as well as increased rates of income tax. As a result, the proportion of current consumption expenditure to total family expenditure declined from 83 per cent in 1964 to 80 per cent in 1967. However, the 20 per cent increase in average current consumption expenditure was substantially more than the 10 per cent increase registered by the Consumer Price Index over the same period. Increases in expenditure varied in magnitude among consumption groups, ranging from 7 per cent for medical care to 17 per cent for food, around 20 per cent for shelter, clothing and transportation, to an increase of 37 per cent for recreation. In all the consumption groups, except medical care, increases in expenditure were in excess of the price change measured by the corresponding price indexes.

The greater increases in discretionary spending, as compared with the more moderate advances in food and shelter, resulted in some differences in the distribution of expenditure among major categories. The effect, however, was small. Among current consumption items, the importance of food declined from 25 per cent in 1964 to 24.3 per cent in 1967; shelter decreased from 20.3 per cent to 19.9 per cent. The proportions for clothing and transportation showed a very marginal increase and for these four main groups, as a whole, the proportion of current consumption expenditures fell by only 0.9 per cent from 70.4 per cent in 1964 to 69.5 per cent in 1967.

A comparison of expenditure patterns for families at the same level of current dollar income in both surveys showed that with a lower purchasing power, families in 1967 in almost all income classes spent a slightly higher proportion on shelter, while on food, clothing and transportation they spent generally a little less. The samples were not, however, perfectly matched, and the 1967 groups generally had smaller family sizes and older age of heads, for the classes below \$6,000. This aspect probably indicates a real change, because of the lesser impact of income changes on older families with fixed incomes.

(c) Eleven-city Composite

While 73 per cent of individuals had incomes less than \$5,000, only 17 per cent of families of two or more were in this category. The effect of excluding unattached individuals (one-person spending units) was therefore to raise average total expenditure from \$8,000 for the whole sample to \$8,831 for families of two or more. Because of the lesser impact of their expenditures in aggregate, the exclusion of the individuals had relatively little effect on the average distribution of expenditure. The most significant difference was in shelter expenses which accounted for 15.9 per cent of expenditures of families and individuals compared to 15.5 per cent for families, reflecting the greater importance of shelter costs (20.8 per cent) in the one-person budget.

About 45 per cent of the total sample consisted of families of two to six persons with incomes \$4,000 to \$9,999. The family size criteria identifying this group were the same as those employed in the 1964 survey. In order to observe a comparable group of families, an upward adjustment was made in the income range to take into account the upward shift in the distribution of family incomes between 1964 and 1967. The boundaries for the restricted group were not determined with any precision, but the growth in average family income of 25.7 per cent from \$5,615 in 1964 to \$7,059 in 1967, was only slightly below the 27.4 per cent for the whole sample.

For this restricted group, current consumption expenses absorbed almost 84 per cent of the total 1967 expenditure of \$7,204, with food and shelter accounting for 38.1 per cent of total expenditure, in contrast to 35 per cent for all families of two or more.

(d) City Patterns

Expenditures by city for three broad groups comprising families and individuals, families of two or more, and families of two to six persons with incomes \$4,000 to \$9,999 are shown in Tables 1, 11, and 19, respectively. Levels of total expenditure by city reflect average income and other characteristics of city samples as well as differences due to location. The publication of expenditure statistics for city samples, which are not regarded as sufficiently large to yield reliable estimates of average family income, is justified by the fact that valid relationships may be observed within and between

cities in spite of income differentials which may represent sampling variations in city income distributions. The samples were not, however, homogeneous with respect to family size, and per person expenditures are not easy to interpret when allowance is given for contingent sampling and response errors.

Table 19 is more interesting in revealing locational differences. Since the sample is restricted to families of two to six persons with incomes \$4,000 to \$9,999, it is homogeneous in a large measure for both family income and family size. The further reduction in sample size, however, would make conclusions based on the data still somewhat tentative. Differences in shelter expenses reflected, in part, differences in city patterns of tenure. These differences were observed in the total sample, and were consistent with 1966 census data.

(e) Patterns by Income Group

Patterns of family expenditure by income group are shown in Tables 2 and 12 for all families and individuals and for families of two or more. It can be seen in these tables that the successive income classes are not homogeneous as a group with respect to either family composition or age of head. These differences are most marked in income classes up to \$5,000 where spending unit size tended to increase in successive classes, the reduction in number of adults 65 and over being more than offset by increases in both the number of adults 16-64 and children under 16. For these classes too, the average age of head was successively lower. The number of earners tended to rise in successive classes, but very few families in classes up to \$5,000 reported the wife being employed full time.

Current consumption expenses, as a group, declined in relation to total expenditure as income rose, because of increasing proportions taken by personal taxes, security payments and gifts.

For all families and individuals taken together, at the lower end of the income scale 93.3 per cent of expenditure went for current consumption, in contrast to 73.8 per cent at the uppermost level. Both food and shelter declined proportionally with rising income; the importance of food decreased from 28.5 per cent of total expenditure in the lowest income group to 16.7 per cent in the highest; shelter decreased from 31.4 per cent in the lowest income group to 12.9 per cent in the highest income class. The proportion taken by clothing rose moderately with income from 5.9 per cent in the lowest group to 8.8 per cent in the highest. For food, shelter and clothing combined, the proportion, averaging 43.7 per cent over the whole sample, decreased from 65.8 per cent for families with incomes under \$2,500 to 38.4 per cent for families with incomes over \$10,000. The margin of current consumption over and above food, shelter and clothing increased in proportion to total expenditure from 27.5 per cent to 35.4 per cent between the two extreme income groups. The major part of this increase was taken by transportation which advanced in importance

from 4.1 per cent in the lowest group to about 14 per cent at maximum, but lower at 11.5 per cent in the highest income class. These differences between the two extreme income classes both as to level and allocation, reflected the respective socio-economic circumstances of their component families and unattached individuals.

In the under \$2,500 income class, 72 per cent of the spending units were one-person units and thus the class included 40 per cent of all unattached individuals. Over 90 per cent of the units had no full-time earner, 63 per cent were headed by a woman and 60 per cent of the family heads and individuals were of age 65 and over.¹

For the \$10,000 and over income class, in contrast, only 1.5 per cent comprised unattached individuals and nearly two-thirds were families of four or more persons. In all except 3 per cent of families and individuals, there was at least one full-time earner, and 42 per cent had two or more full-time earners. Wives working full time were observed in 26 per cent of the spending units and part time in a further 13 per cent. Men headed 95 per cent of all units and nearly 88 per cent had a male head working full time. Finally, only 5 per cent of the heads were of ages 65 and over and nearly two-thirds were confined to two classes between ages 35 and 54.

Thus, between the extremes there is little which can be compared. The features outlined, however, do bear on the type of composition differences which most of the income classes reveal.

The income classes of \$5,000 and above were, as a group, more homogeneous with respect to family size and age of head characteristics, and the main socio-economic differences reflect more the rising number of earners, particularly full time, and increased participation of the wife in the successively higher income classes. Thus, within these income classes, the proportion of families with 2 or more full-time earners increased from 3 per cent in the \$5,000-\$5,499 income class to 42 per cent in the \$10,000 and over income class, while the proportion of families with full-time working wives increased from under 5 per cent to 26 per cent between the same two classes. These factors, of course, contribute to rising level of family income.

For families of two or more, the pattern for current consumption is significantly changed only in income classes below \$5,000, where 73 per cent of the unattached individuals are concentrated, 40 per cent in the lowest class. Even with the individuals removed, there are still marked differences in both family size and age of head between the classes below \$5,000 and those above.

Charts V to VIII show the proportion of total expenditure on food, shelter, clothing and automobiles respectively, for specific family types by family income. While the small sample sizes render the individual classes unreliable, taken as a whole, some tentative relationships seem evident.

The proportion spent on food and shelter tended to fall as income rose, for all family types, whereas for clothing the proportion spent remained fairly constant. In automobile purchase and operation, however, the relationship is obscured by the fluctuations arising from small samples.

The importance of family size and composition was evident in the food category, as would be expected, but not in the other categories shown. This is not too surprising with shelter and automobiles, where family size requirements clearly could be accommodated, without higher costs; for clothing, however, the lack of effect is more striking.

(f) Patterns by Expenditure Group

Classification of expenditures by level of total expenditure has been regarded as an alternative to income classification when income information is either unobtainable or unreliable. Table 3 which employs this classification is very similar in appearance to the income classification in Table 2. However, in Table 3 average expenditure is approximately at the mid-point of each expenditure group, whereas in Table 2 the average of total expenditure is generally well up to or above the upper limit of the income range in classes below \$7,000. In this it reflects the relationship between family income and total expenditure. The difference between income and expenditure is largely accounted for by changes in assets and liabilities; in some classes, however, sizeable amounts of other money receipts also interact. Both of these elements reflect a certain inadequacy in income per se in measuring the financial resources available to finance expenditure. Chart III (page 22) shows the distribution of families within each income group classified according to their total expenditure. It is apparent from this chart that each income class represents a considerable range of expenditure classes, above and below the corresponding expenditure group.

The expenditure classification resulted in minor changes in family size and age of head. The percentage of homeowners in the \$10,000 and over expenditure group was 65 per cent compared to 69 per cent for the corresponding income group. However, the most interesting difference occurred in the net change in assets and liabilities. The net financial changes became positive in all expenditure classes, and were smaller in size at both extremes, compared to the income classification. Families and individuals with incomes over \$10,000 registered a net financial change of +\$1,507, whereas for those with expenditure over \$10,000 it diminished to +\$876, reflecting the upward shift of families below that income level who were "over-spending", and the downward shift out of the class of families in that income level who were "under-spending". At

the other end of the scale, a small positive change replaced a relatively large negative change, as "over-spending" families moved out of the range and "under-spending" families remained.

The most striking effect of this re-grouping of families by expenditure level was the diminished average expenditure on transportation in all expenditure groups under \$7,000 compared with corresponding income groups, and the considerable increase in the group over \$10,000, in which transportation accounted for 13.3 per cent compared with 11.5 per cent in the over \$10,000 income category. It was apparent that this increase was largely due to car purchase, which is included in current expenditures as the complete purchase price (excluding trade-in) of cars bought in the survey year. This also accounted for the great difference in the positive financial change, since the effect of increases in savings by families in this class with incomes of \$10,000 and over was in large measure offset by the increased debts or decreased savings of families with incomes under \$10,000.

(g) Patterns by Family Type

The classification of spending units by family type is shown in Table 4. This takes into account family composition as well as family size and sheds some light on changes in expenditure at different stages of the family life cycle. The youngest family type groups were those composed of two adults and one or more children (under 16), with average age of head varying, from 34.2 to 39.1 years, generally rising as number of children increased. Families with three adults and children, four adults with children and five or more adults with or without children ("other" on Table 4), were older families with average age in the forties, the presence of additional adults reflecting the fact that one or more children were over 16 years. Age of head for families consisting only of adults averaged around 54 years, about 20 years older than the two-adult families with children.

In many respects, the three or four-adult families more resemble those of three or more adults with children, than the two-adult families. For while the ages of heads of the families with three or more adults were concentrated in the 35 to 59 age classes, the two-adult families were more evenly spread so that over half of the heads were in age classes either younger than 35 or over 64 years. Further, the average number of earners in the three or more adult classes were similar to the three or more adults with children, and their average family incomes were, as a group, among the highest.

For families of three or more adults with or without children taken as a group, 81 per cent had family incomes of \$7,000 or more (approximately the median family income for the whole sample). In contrast, 60 per cent of families of two adults with children were in the same category, and for two-adult families only 43 per cent. The importance of secondary earners is evident, in that for the same three

groups of families, the proportions where the head's income was \$7,000 or more were 40, 47 and 22 per cent, respectively. For unattached individuals, family income and income of head are, of course, identical and only 8 per cent of these had income of \$7,000 or more.

A further socio-economic distinction between the four broad groups of families appears in differences in tenure. About two thirds of the families of three or more, with or without children, owned their dwelling and 22 per cent without mortgage. A further 30 per cent rented unfurnished accommodation. For families of two adults with children, 45 per cent rented unfurnished while 42 per cent owned with mortgage. Two-adult families rented as frequently, 28 per cent owned without mortgage to only 19 per cent with mortgage. Over three quarters of individuals rented and nearly 30 per cent were roomers. These characteristics were reflected particularly in the respective categories of shelter, and average shelter expense for the two adults with children group, as a whole, was higher than for the three or more adults with or without children.

The classification of expenditures by family type reveals two exceptions to the generalization that food expenses take the largest share of the budget. For the one-adult group, shelter was the most important item, taking 20.8 per cent of total expenditure compared to 18.2 per cent for food. The other group, in contrast to that shown for the 1964 sample, was the two-adult group where both food and shelter were of approximately equal importance. While the importance of food in the budget was obviously related to family size and composition, in relative terms it was also conditioned by income and the level of total expenditure. Thus, although high food expenditures per family were registered in the "other" groups where number of earners and income were at a maximum, the largest proportionate spending on food occurred in the group composed of two adults and five or more children, where family size was at a maximum, but average number of earners and average income were relatively low. The percentage allocated to food ranged from 26.8 per cent in the latter group down to 17 per cent for two-adult families. On a per person basis, however, the order of magnitude is reversed with the two-adult family averaging \$599 per person compared to \$279 for the family with five or more children. The two-adult group, itself had a lower per person food expenditure than the one adult, for which the expenditure was \$700.

For all-adult families, the percentage taken by shelter decreased with the number of adults from 20.8 per cent for one adult to 12.5 per cent for four adults. This, in part, reflects the fact that increases in shelter costs did not keep pace with increases in income arising from the increased number of earners. However, since families owning a dwelling with a mortgage also increased very significantly in proportion with number of adults, from under 3 per cent for the one-adult to 43 per cent for the four-adult group, this would partly reflect the omission of repayment of mortgage principal from the shelter category.

For two-adult families with children, the percentage taken by shelter decreased as the number of children increased, while income also increased, but the sharp dip in income for the two-adult and five-children group was reflected in a percentage much as for the two-adult and one-child group.

Expenditure on clothing by family type varied between 7 per cent and 11.7 per cent of total expenditure. For the all-adult groups, per person expenditures were fairly similar, ranging from \$255 per person for the three-adult to \$288 per person for the four-adult group. There is evidence also of accommodating additional family members within the same budget, thus the two-adult groups, with no children, one child, and five or more children had very nearly the same incomes and the percentages of total expenditure were 7.6, 7.4 and 7.8 respectively. This aspect is reflected also in the higher income groups, but to a diminishing extent, as may be seen in comparing clothing expenditures for the three-adult and the three-adult with two-children groups, and also the four-adult with "other" groups (averaging four and a half adults and nearly two children).

Transportation costs averaged highest for the family-type groups with the greatest number of earners, the highest dollar expenditure of \$1,620 being recorded by the four-adult group, 82 per cent of whom were car owners. The percentage of total expenditure was in the range of 9.9 per cent to 14.6 per cent for all groups except the one-adult groups with one or more children where it was 6 per cent.

The per person medical expenditures for the all-adult groups declined progressively but only slightly, from the two-adult through to the four-adult groups, reflecting perhaps the lower average age of family members. Expenditures per family on health care for two-adult families with children increased as number of children increased up to four children, but declined in the group with five or more children, where income was lower, to a level not much above that averaged by families with only one child.

(h) Patterns by Age of Head

Expenditure patterns by age of head are shown for all families and individuals and for families of two or more in Tables 5 and 13, respectively. Percentage distribution of all families and individuals by age of head classified according to size of their total expenditure appears on Chart IV (page 23). In both Tables 5 and 13, average income and expenditure increased to a maximum in the two age groups between 35 and 54 and declined in subsequent groups as age of head increased, with the lowest levels of total expenditure being registered in the age groups over 65, where the average number of earners was lowest.

The use of patterns by age of head in reflecting life-cycle characteristics is only partially valid.

The socio-economic characteristics of the respective age groups reveal, among other things, that the younger age groups were successively better educated and tended to enter occupations which eventually provided higher incomes.

The highest proportion of heads with university education (partial or complete) was 23.1 per cent for the 25-34 age group. This proportion was progressively less in each higher age group and was only 6 per cent for the 65 and over age groups. In the lowest age group, however, the proportion was only 13.2 per cent. For heads with secondary education (partial or complete), the proportions decreased progressively from 71.1 per cent for the under 25 age group to 42 per cent for the 65 and over age groups.

The factor of education was partly reflected in the preponderance of family heads in specific occupation classes. Thus, over one third of family heads in the three age groups between 25 and 54 gave as their occupation managerial, professional, technical or sales, and these occupations showed the highest average incomes in the sample. In contrast, only 19 per cent of family heads with age under 25, were so employed, and the same proportion for those in the 55-64 age group. Those who were craftsmen included 38 per cent of the family heads of age under 25, around 25 per cent of each of the family heads in the three age groups between 25 and 54, and 20 per cent for the 55-64 age group. Of the 65 and over age groups, nearly 80 per cent were retired or not employed.

Another important age-linked factor was tenure. This was characterized by home-owners rising in proportion from 3 per cent for the under 25 age group to over 60 per cent for the 45-54 age group. The proportion was however a little lower in the higher age groups averaging 54 per cent in both the 55-64 and over 65 age groups. Ownership without mortgage rose with age without exception in the successive groups up to 65, thereafter remaining fairly steady at about 45 per cent. Ownership with mortgage was highest in the 35-44 age group with about 50 per cent of families and individuals included in this category, accounting for over 40 per cent of all families with a mortgage. These aspects were well reflected in the allocation of shelter costs between expenses on rented and owned living quarters.

The incidence, if not the level, of car purchase was highest for the under 25 age group. Education expenses were highest in the 45-54 age group, where children were more likely to be at university age. In medical care, prepaid medical plans have reduced the incidence of spending within specific categories. Expenses on confinements were highest in the under 25 age group, while medicines and drugs were highest in age groups of 55 and beyond, particularly the 70-74 group.

Unattached individuals were fairly evenly spread within the age groups, 37 per cent being in the groups below age 45, nearly 31 per cent in the 45-64 age

groups and just over 32 per cent in the 65 and over age groups. Within all age groups, however, the proportion of males in the total of unattached individuals declined generally with increasing age. Thus, for the under 45 age group, as a whole, 56 per cent were males. This proportion dropped to 38 per cent for the 45-64 age group and to 20 per cent for the 65 and over age group. In contrast, for families of two or more, over 90 per cent of heads were male in the under 45 age groups and also in the 45-64 age groups. Even in the 65 and over age group over 80 per cent of families had a male head.

(i) Other Classifications

The classifications of spending units by tenure are shown for all families and individuals and for families of two or more in Tables 7 and 16 respectively. Reference has been made above to tenure being closely associated with family income, family type and age of head. The interaction of these factors renders classification by tenure difficult to evaluate as a separate source of variability. As indicated throughout the tables, the percentage of homeowners over the whole sample was 47 per cent. Nearly two thirds of these were families with mortgage, who averaged about 16 years younger than the remaining mortgage-free owners. Tenants were divided into regular tenants, roomers and a small group of rent-free spending units. As a group, tenants registered much lower average income, but the only notable feature of their expenditures in contrast to homeowners refers to items which are to a high incidence included in the rent, namely fuel, light and water (expenditure less than half that of the home-owning group) and furnishings and equipment, at least for roomers. A third group, called mixed-tenure families, averaged higher incomes than either owners without mortgage or tenants, but ranked below owners with mortgage in income and family size. They consisted mainly of families who moved from renting to home ownership and consequently averaged the highest expenses for shelter and furnishings and equipment.

The classifications of families of two or more according to number of earners and employment status of the wife of head are shown in Tables 14 and 15 respectively. It should be noted that in Table 14 the classifying variable is "full-time" earners, i.e., those employed for 48 weeks or more. The number of earners shown as an average in the family characteristics at the top of the table refers to all earners, and averages 1.6 for the group.

Slightly less than 60 per cent of families of two or more had only one full-time earner, but averaged 0.4 additional earners. In Table 15 it can be seen that in nearly 57 per cent of families, the wife of the head was not employed outside the home and about half the wives who were employed were full-time earners. Income for families where the wife worked full time averaged \$2,000 more than the other two categories. It has been indicated above that the incidence of additional full-time earners whether the

wife or other family members has a considerable bearing on family income. This aspect is demonstrated in that 88 per cent of families with two earners and 85 per cent of families with the wife working full time had incomes above \$7,000 compared with 56 per cent of families and individuals with one full-time earner and only 14 per cent for those with no full-time earner.

Classifications of spending units by occupation of head are shown for all families and individuals and for families of two or more in Table 8 and 17 respectively. These, together with Table 6, which shows classification for all families and individuals for education of head, reveal variations associated with average income levels in the various classes. Aspects of this were discussed in connection with the family income classification.

The classification of families and individuals by country of origin is shown in Table 9. This table permits comparison between spending patterns of Canadian-born and foreign-born families, with a breakdown of the latter by country of origin or by groupings of countries. Over 70 per cent of the sample were Canadian-born and about a third of the foreign-born were of British origin.

Families whose income derived mainly from a particular income type or source are shown in the classification used for Table 18. For 82 per cent of families of two or more, wages and salaries provided the largest source of family income; family heads for this group were mainly concentrated in the 25-54 age group, and family income averaged \$9,151. Those families whose main source derived from self-employment formed a little over 8 per cent of the sample. They were distributed by age of head similarly to the wage and salaries group, but average family income was somewhat higher, at \$12,739. Pensions formed the major source for just over 5 per cent of families, in which the family heads were generally of age 65 and over, family size was only about half that of the two larger groups and income averaged only \$3,654. The residual group comprised those whose major income was derived from property, financial investments, including annuities and miscellaneous categories. This final group, which accounted for the remaining 4 per cent of the sample, had a fairly large concentration with family heads aged 65 and over, but they were otherwise spread out among other age groups. Average income at \$6,956 was much higher than the pensions group, but well below the other two.

The final classification is shown in Table 10 and is for all families and individuals by family income after tax. Since the same income classes have been used, the distribution of families has been shifted in a downward direction. Family factors bearing on the income tax liability would have, in any case, resulted in some regrouping of families, but the final outcome is not markedly different in terms of expenditure patterns than that shown in Table 2.

OWNERSHIP OF DURABLES

Table III—Percentage Distribution of Durables Owned December 31, 1967, by Year of Purchase,—indicated two main concentrations of purchases. Between one quarter and one third of the number of each of the main household appliances owned, stoves, electric refrigerators, vacuum cleaners, etc., were purchased during the years 1953 to 1959; probably as a result of a build-up of demand, in the war and post-war years, which could not be met due to lack of supply. The purchase of television and television combinations, which came into general use in Canada in the early fifties, was reflected in 25 per cent of those owned in 1967 having been purchased in the years 1953 to 1959, also. Relatively recent developments in the general use of appliances, such as dishwasher, humidifier, tape recorder and air conditioner resulted in over 50 per cent for each of these, being reported in the 1967 survey as having been purchased in the period 1964-67. Whereas 50 per cent of the automobiles owned at the end of 1967 had been purchased within the previous two-year period.

With few exceptions, between 85 and 90 per cent of all household appliances had been bought new. For automobiles, on the other hand, only just over half were purchased new, reflecting the considerably larger outlay needed for new cars.

Of the older appliances still owned at the end of 1967, sewing machines predominated. Over half the non-electric machines which were purchased new and still owned at the end of the survey year, were bought before 1939 as were 17 per cent of those purchased used.

Information was also collected on number and proportion of spending units in the survey which had the use of specified major household facilities. The term "use of" allows the inclusion of renters, particularly renters of apartments, and roomers who do not usually own major household appliances. A comparison of the proportion of survey families having the use of telephones, furnaces, refrigerators, cooking equipment and washing machines was very similar to the proportion of households reporting the same facilities in the Household Facilities and Equipment Survey which covered a national sample of nearly 35,000 households in 1967.² In the urban survey 96 per cent of spending units had the use of telephones and 99 per cent refrigerators. The corresponding national proportions in the Household Facilities and Equipment Survey were 92 and 97. For washing machines the national percentage was 85 per cent of households compared to 84 per cent of families in the urban survey.

NET CHANGE IN ASSETS AND LIABILITIES

Table IV shows detailed accounts of changes in assets and liabilities for all families and individuals classified by family income.

The financial change elements play an important role in balancing family budgets. For home purchase and finance, there is substantial documentation, and data here may be fairly reliable. More generally, however, the topic of assets and debts is one in which the respondent's reluctance or inability to provide adequate information is likely to be more pronounced than elsewhere in the accounts. Response errors may therefore introduce a significant downward bias to changes in the levels of both assets and debts, although these would tend to offset each other in determining the net change.

Net change in assets and liabilities, here defined as saving,³ averaged \$419 per spending unit or just over 5 per cent of average family income. The saving-income ratio ranged from an average of minus 13 per cent for families and individuals with incomes below \$2,500, to a little over plus 10 per cent for those with incomes of \$10,000 and over.

³ Saving in this context excludes insurance and pensions which are included in expenditures on security.

Families and individuals saving over 10 per cent of their incomes are found in all income classes, but only in classes where family income is \$6,000 and above did this group exceed the number of families with net liabilities of more than 10 per cent of income. The \$10,000 and over income class, of course, made the most positive impact on saving: here, 45 per cent of families saved more than 10 per cent of their income, compared with a little over 9 per cent of families, whose net liabilities were more than 10 per cent of their income.

Over half of net saving was in the form of investment by families in the home in which they lived. About a third of families were purchasing their home with a mortgage, and three quarters of these families had incomes of \$7,000 and above. For families with incomes of \$10,000 and over, more than half were mortgagors, accounting for about 45 per cent of all mortgagors. Repayments of mortgage principal were excluded from shelter costs, since it strictly represents investment. However, this is a form of non-discretionary saving which, for families with incomes of \$5,500 and above, absorbed between 2 and 3 per cent of all incomes in a class, and, of course, much higher proportions for the mortgagor families.

PART-YEAR FAMILIES

There were 69 schedules obtained from families and individuals, for which the spending unit existed only part of the year. These were excluded from the tabulations by definition. They included families and individuals who were for part of the survey year members of other spending units, immigrant families and individuals who arrived during the year and also Canadians who returned from living abroad or who

were members of collective households. The appropriateness of such ineligibility criteria depends on the use which is made of the data. The tabulations in this report provide data in the form of average expenditures per family for more or less closely defined groups of families and the introduction of part-year families would have rendered these groups less homogeneous and the averages less specific.

The part-year spending units are a small and diverse group, characterised, in most cases, by abnormally high expenditures on durable goods and greater initial reliance on savings and money gifts as a means to finance these and other expenses. In covering only part of the year, the timing of expenditures was often less certain, and the balancing of family budgets less reliable than for those families providing data for the full year.

Over 40 per cent of the part-year spending units were unattached individuals, three quarters of whom were under 25 years of age. The excluded group, while representing about 8 per cent of all individuals, accounted for 38 per cent of individuals under 25 years of age. On the other hand, these individuals were self-maintaining units on average for less than 26 weeks, so that their aggregate effect, except for

furnishings, would have been less than half that of their numbers.

Part-year families of two or more persons would have had a smaller impact in terms of proportion of their numbers, accounting for only 2 per cent of families. For families with age of head under 25 years, however, the excluded group represented nearly 16 per cent of all families in this class. Part-year families were slightly more numerous among those with heads in 25-34 age group, but accounted for only 5 per cent of families in that class. They were self-maintaining units in Canada for an average of less than 26 weeks in the year and generally their expenditures were reduced in this proportion. For furnishings and equipment and car purchase, however, their expenditures were more than twice as high as the full-year families, so that they would have accounted for more than 5 per cent of aggregate expenditure in these categories.

NOTES AND DEFINITIONS

I. Family and Family Characteristics

Family.—The family or spending unit is defined as a group of persons dependent on a common or pooled income for the major items of expense and living in the same dwelling. Never-married sons or daughters living with their parents are considered as part of their parents' spending unit. In the great majority of cases the members of spending units of two or more are related by blood, marriage or adoption, and are thus consistent with the "economic family" definition employed in surveys of family income, "a group of individuals sharing a common dwelling unit and related by blood, marriage or adoption". The definition of family employed by the population census restricts the family to husband, wife and any unmarried children living with them, or one parent and unmarried children. Individual or one-person spending units are financially independent persons living alone or as roomers.

Family head.—In husband-wife families, the husband was considered as head. In one-parent families with unmarried sons or daughters, the parent was considered head. In all other types of spending units, the head was the person mainly responsible for the maintenance of the spending unit.

Age of family members.—In all cases the age referred to was the age at December 31, 1967, in other words the age attained at the 1967 birthday.

Adult.—Person 16 years of age or over at December 31, 1967.

Child.—Person under 16 years of age at December 31, 1967.

Family type.—Defines the family in terms of numbers of adults (A) and children (C) listed as family members during the survey year, e.g. 2A/1C represents two adults and one child.

Earned.—Any person 14 years of age or over who earned more than \$250 in the survey year.

Employment status of wife.—Refers only to number of weeks worked within the survey year including holidays with pay. No distinction was made between full-day and part-day employment. **Full-time** employment refers to employment of 48 weeks or more. **Part-time** employment refers to employment from one to 47 weeks. **No wife of head** refers to families other than husband-wife families, and includes families where the head was a female.

Homeowner.—Refers to families living in a dwelling (either with or without mortgage) owned for the entire survey year by a member of the spending unit.

Car owner.—Refers to families owning a car at December 31, 1967.

Occupation of head.—Based upon the Standard Occupational Classification published by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, April 1961.

City.—Refers in each case to the metropolitan area or urban area comprising city proper and fringe areas.

Country of origin.—Refers to country where family head was born. **British** includes those born in United Kingdom, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand, Malta and Jamaica. **Other West European** includes those born in Belgium, the Netherlands, France, Portugal, Spain, Switzerland and Scandinavia. **Other East European** includes those born in the Ukraine, Russia, Hungary, Lithuania, Latvia, Estonia, Czechoslovakia, Roumania and Greece. **German** also includes immigrants from Austria. **Other** includes African and Asian except Russian.

II. Income, Expenditure and Other Financial Items

Money income.—Included: (1) Employment income i.e. gross income from wages and salaries; net income before taxes from self-employment; and receipts from military pay and allowances. (2) Other income i.e. gross receipts from roomers and boarders; net rentals; family allowances; interest and dividends; all pensions; workmen's compensation and unemployment insurance benefits; regular receipts from insurance policies and annuities; and miscellaneous regular income receipts.

Other money receipts.—Reported but not included in income, comprised inheritances; bequests; lump sum settlements from property insurance, accident and health policies; and irregular gifts from outside the family.

Income type.—Wages and salaries comprised employment income including military pay and allowances and salary paid to owner of incorporated business. **Income from self-employment** included net profit to proprietor or partner of unincorporated business plus gross income from roomers and boarders. **Pensions** included government and other retirement pensions but did not include veterans' pensions or disability pensions. **Investment and other income** included net rents on owned property, trust or estate income, family allowances, unemployment insurance, veterans' pensions and disability pensions and other money income including individually purchased annuities.

Net change in assets and liabilities.—Referred to net changes during the survey year in assets such as bank accounts, money on hand, investments in business, stocks and bonds (excluding change in market value), loans made to others, and the sale of real estate and personal possessions along with net changes during the survey year in liabilities such as mortgages, notes due to banks, loan and insurance companies, etc., instalment purchases, charge accounts and other bills, rents and taxes. If on balance a family dissaved, i.e. if credits (net increase in assets and net decreases in liabilities) were exceeded by debits (net increase in liabilities and net decrease in assets) then, this would result in a negative figure (-). There was no allowance for depreciation in any of these asset changes.

Money owed to family.—Included changes in the amounts owed to the family on mortgages retained on property sold by the family and cash loans to individuals.

Investment in business.—Consisted of money put into a business, profession or farm in 1967, less the money received from the sale of any part of a business, profession or farm.

Purchase, improvement and sale of owned dwelling.—Included the gross purchase price of the dwelling or the total land and construction cost for the family's home. **Improvements** are additions or

installations which added to the value of the property, such as new rooms or garage; the original installation of electricity or heating, or the finishing of basements and attics. Sale of the family's dwelling was the selling price or trade-in allowance of a home sold in 1967. If its entire value was not received at the time of sale, the amount of mortgage which was retained by the family was shown as an increase under "Money owed to family".

Money owed to banks, etc. n.e.s.—Included money owed to banks, insurance companies, credit unions and small loan companies. n.e.s. Mortgage and business loans were excluded.

Other money owed.—Included money owed on rents and taxes; for professional services such as doctor and dentist, and other bills such as hospital.

Mortgage on owned dwelling.—Increases in liabilities included amount of mortgage taken on home bought in 1967 including increasing mortgage through refinancing, net of the amount of the loan balance paid off by the family or assumed by the purchaser of a dwelling sold in 1967. Decreases in liabilities were the **principal payments** on all mortgages on the family's home during 1967, including those on a previous home if made in 1967.

Expenditures for current consumption.—Included expenses incurred during the survey year for food, housing, fuel, light and water; household operations; clothing; automobile purchase and operation; other transportation; medical care; personal care; reading; recreation; education; smoking and alcoholic drinks and a miscellaneous group. Consumer durables such as automobiles and household equipment were considered as consumption items, but changes in equity, purchases and sales of homes were considered as changes in assets and liabilities. Family expenditures for items used partially for business, such as home or cars were adjusted to exclude the amount chargeable to business use. Sales, excise, automobile and real estate taxes were included as part of consumption expenditure for the commodity or service to which these taxes applied.

Food prepared at home.—All food purchased to be served at home or carried away from home in lunches, including cost of food served to boarders.

Rent.—The net family expense for contract rent after adjustment for any use of the dwelling for business. There was, however, no adjustment in rent for partial sub-letting to roomers or boarders.

Fire insurance.—Premiums paid on policies for fire and comprehensive policies. Amounts paid in premiums covering more than the survey year were not pro-rated.

Housing repairs.—Amount spent for labour and materials for all types of repairs and maintenance. Costs of improvements (such as added rooms, garages, etc.) which are considered increases in assets, were not included.

Repair materials.—Cost of materials purchased separately by family.

Repairs—contract cost.—Included both cost of materials and the labour for repair jobs done by professional building craftsmen.

Mortgage interest.—Was calculated on the basis of the terms of the individual homeowner's mortgage contract. The mortgage principal repayments in the survey year were not considered as expenses, and hence they were not included in either shelter costs or total expenditure, but counted as decreases in liabilities.

Other owner expenses.—Included real estate commissions, lawyers' fees connected with home ownership, and mortgage insurance fees and premiums.

Gas.—Delivered in mains, by tank truck or in containers.

Other heating costs.—Included such things as payments for central community heating and rental of heating equipment.

Telephone.—Basic charges plus long distance, installations, extension, etc.

Household moving expenses.—Did not include trailer or truck rental for purposes of moving (See transportation).

Paid help.—Included maids, landscape gardeners, charwomen, lawnmowing, etc.

Miscellaneous household operation.—Included matches, insecticides, flowers for home, ice, rental of freezer lockers, etc.

Other kitchen equipment.—Included wooden utensils, canning materials and jars.

Other kitchen electrical equipment.—Included can openers, blenders, etc.

Other electrical equipment.—Included coffee warmers, heating pads, electric clocks, etc.

Other household textiles.—Included mattress covers, runners, etc.

Car purchase.—Was net of trade-in allowance (or sale) and discount. It included the purchase price of the automobile, extra equipment and accessories bought when the car was purchased and all financing charges. Car purchase was adjusted for business use only for spending units whose major source of income was self-employment.

Car operation.—Where the car was used for both business and family use the car operation expenditures were adjusted to account only for family use.

Other — boat, steamship.—Included pleasure cruises but excluded boat passage as part of a package tour (see recreation).

Other prepaid plans.—Included school insurance.

Physician's care, etc.—Physician's care, eye care, dental care, hospital care, nursing care, etc. referred only to expenditures made by the family on that portion of the health services **not** covered by the prepaid plan (s) held by the family.

Other medical expenses.—Included X-rays, laboratory tests, etc.

Other recreation expenses.—Included repairs to cameras, sporting, recreation goods, recreation on trips not elsewhere specified.

Other miscellaneous.—Largely fees paid for lawyers' services such as wills, etc.

III. Technical Definitions

Weighted number of families.—Survey results were adjusted by city weight factors, designed to give each city the relative importance of its population. In some cities different weights were assigned to individuals to compensate for lower response rates for this group.

Weighted percentage of families.—The weighted number of families in a specified cell was expressed as a percentage of the total weighted number of families in the survey. In the definitions which follow the term "weighted" is implicit.

Family size.—Family size or "year-equivalent persons" was computed by dividing the total number of weeks during which family members belonged to the unit in the survey year by 52 weeks. In this way, part-year members were counted as fractions of a year-equivalent person.

Average per family.—The averages were based on all families in each class, whether or not they reported purchases of a particular item. Averages were calculated by dividing the aggregate amount of income or expenditure in a given class by the total number of families in the class. Because all averages for a class are obtained by a common divisor they are additive.

Percentage reporting.—Percentage reporting was obtained by dividing the number of families reporting the specified item of income, or expenditure, by the total number of families in the class. Average amounts for families reporting a specified item can be developed from this by dividing the average dollar expenditure by the percentage reporting.

Percentage distribution.—The expenditure on a specified item of expenditure was expressed as a percentage of total expenditure.

ALL FAMILIES AND INDIVIDUALS, ELEVEN CITIES, 1967

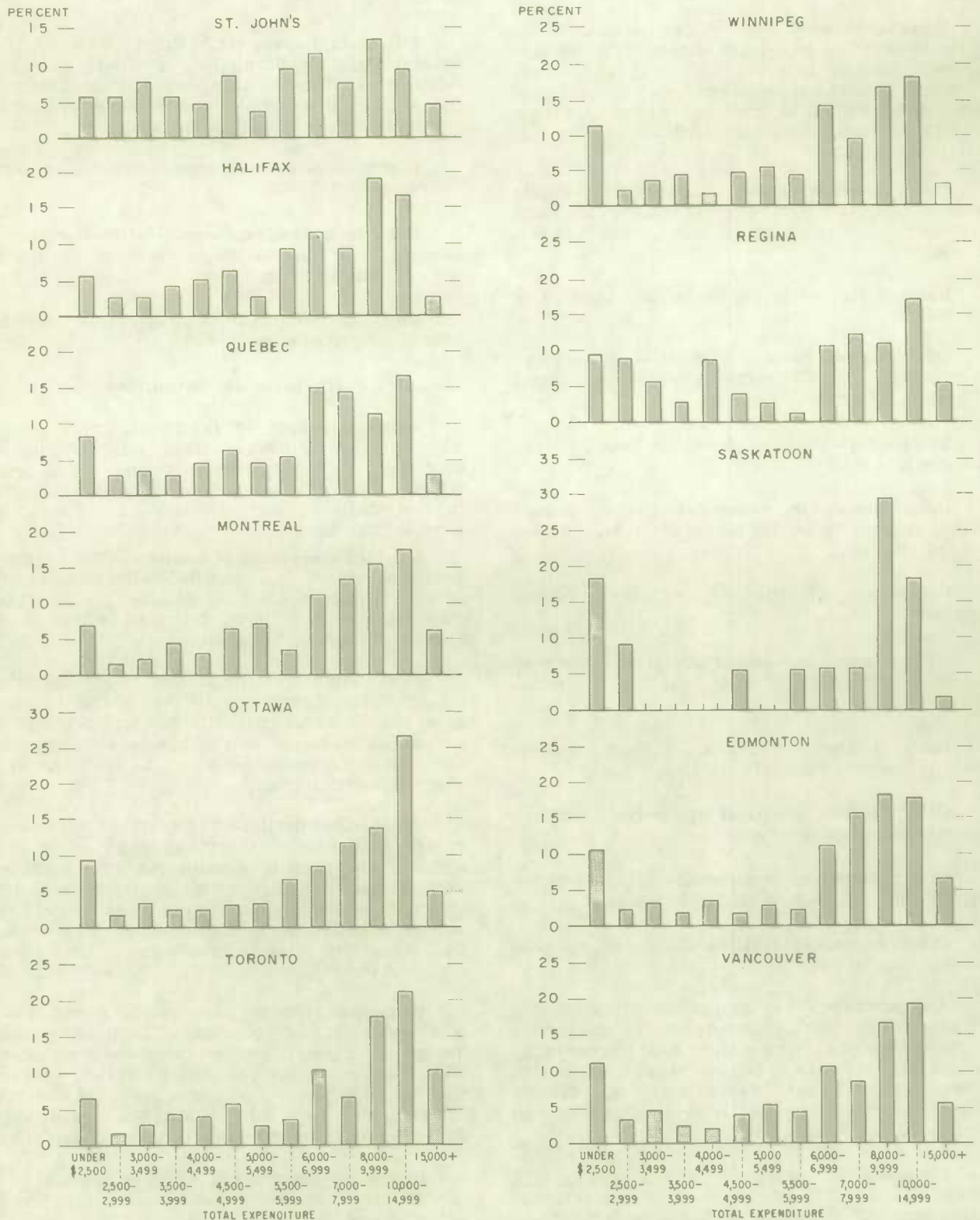

ALL FAMILIES AND INDIVIDUALS, ELEVEN CITIES, 1967

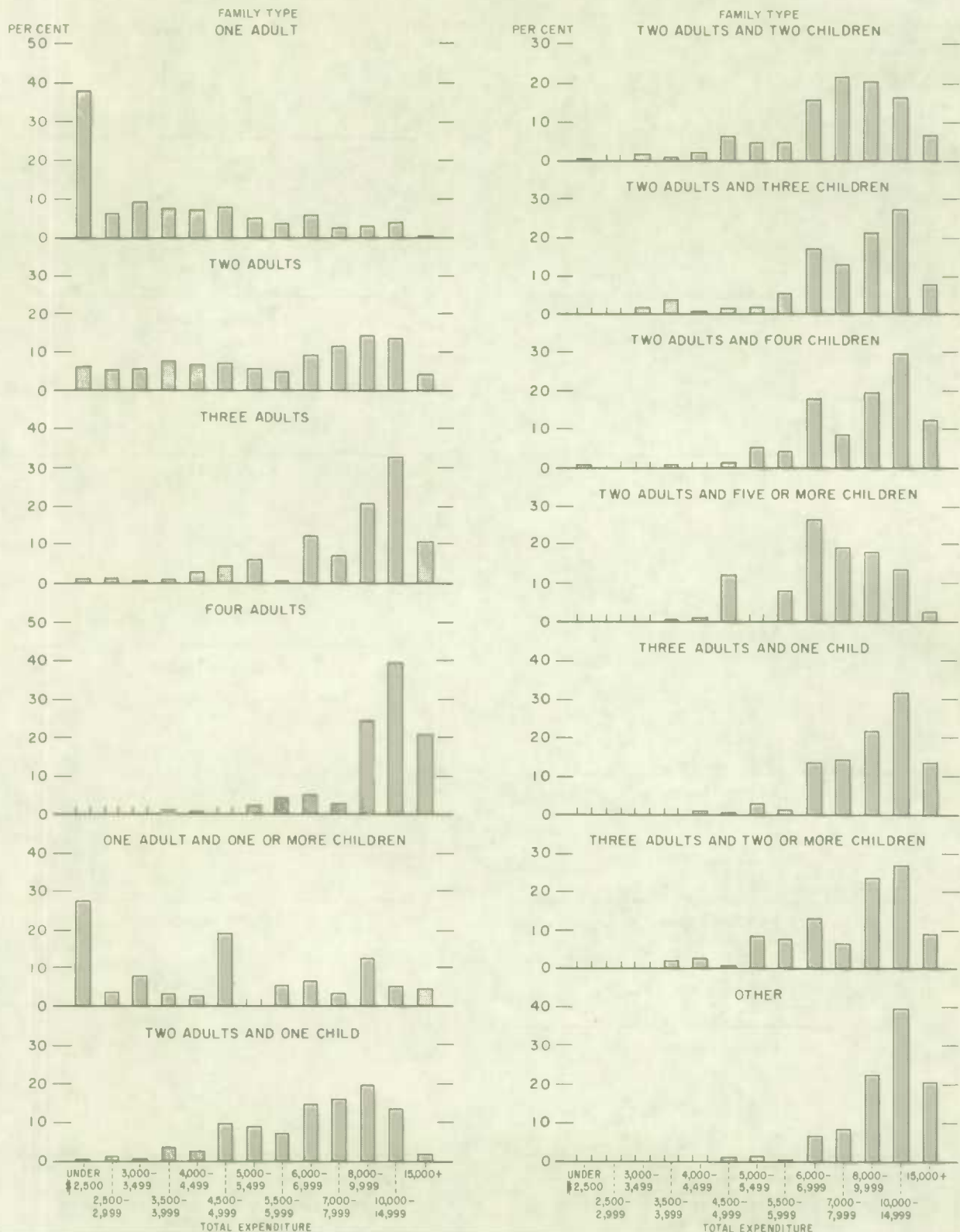

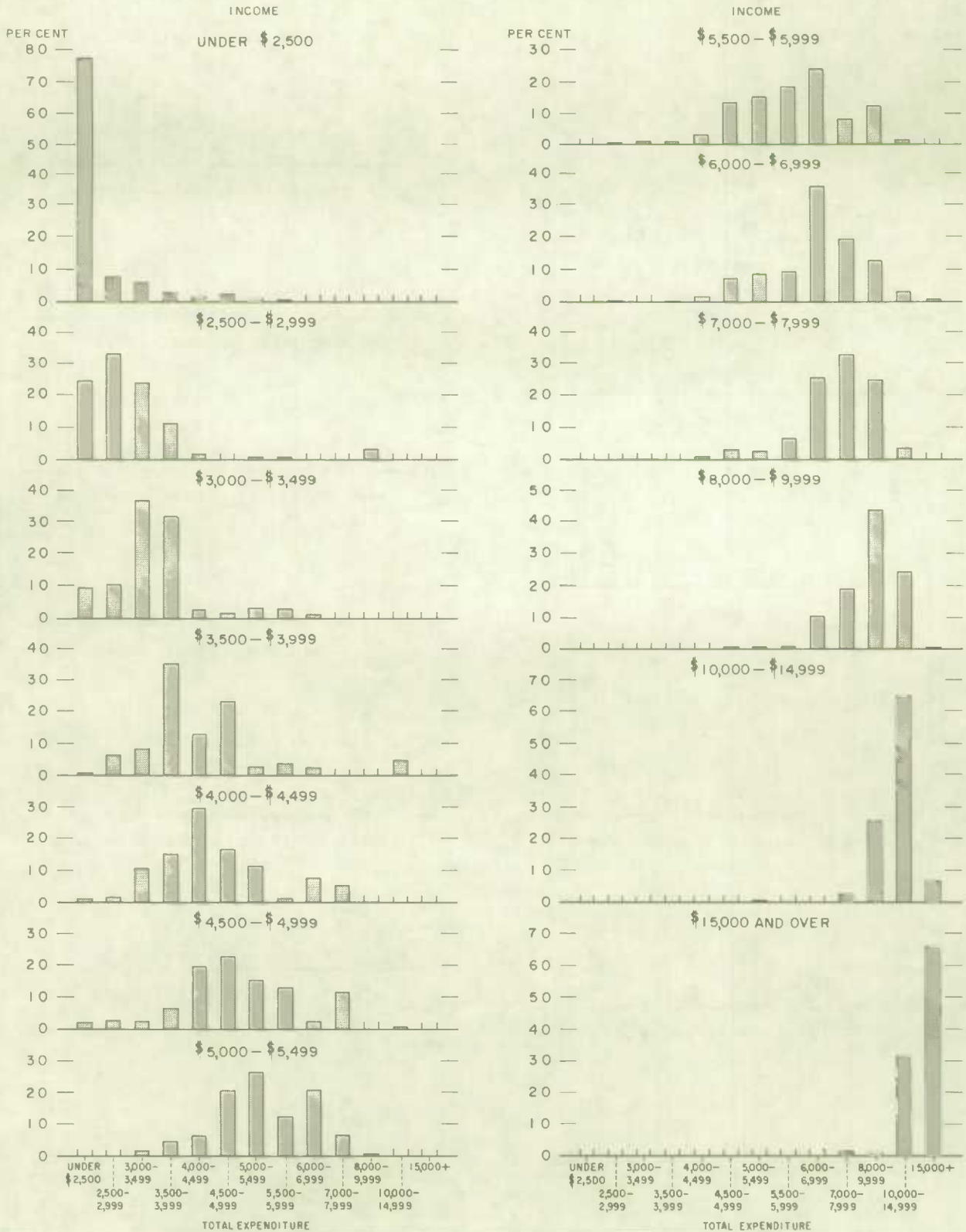

ALL FAMILIES AND INDIVIDUALS, ELEVEN CITIES, 1967

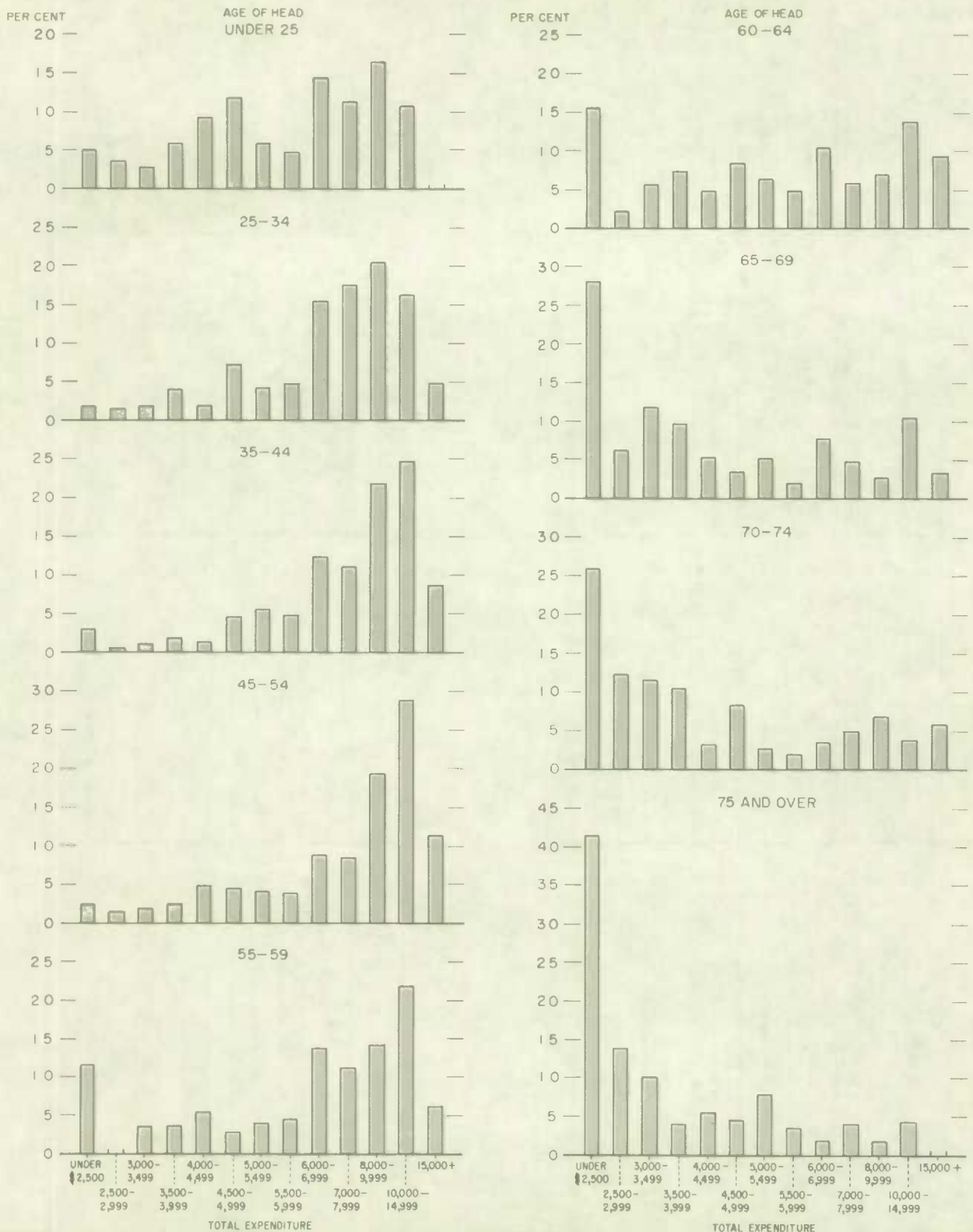

ALL FAMILIES AND INDIVIDUALS, ELEVEN CITIES, 1967

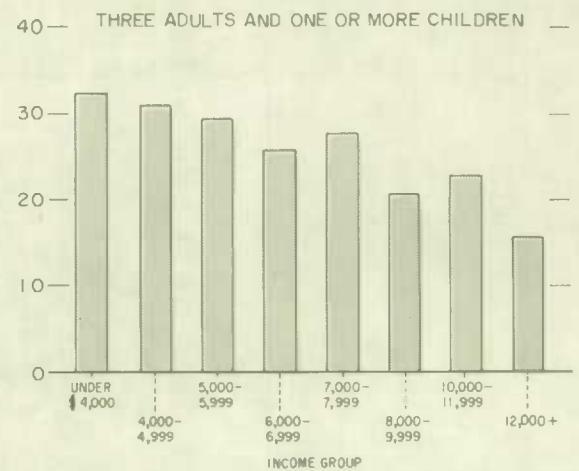
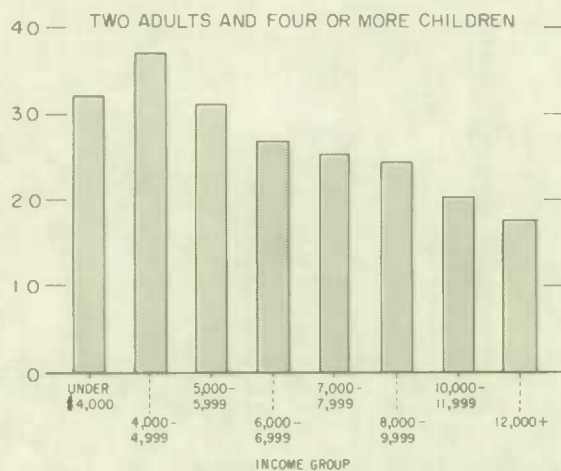
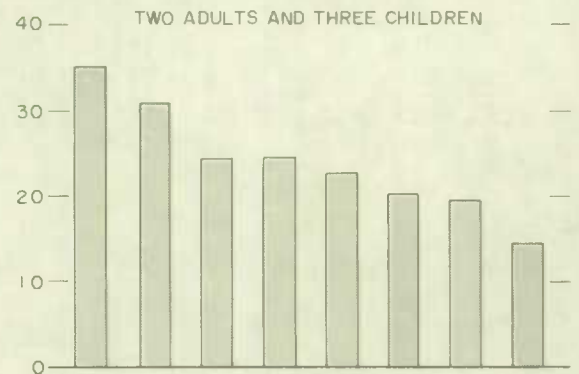
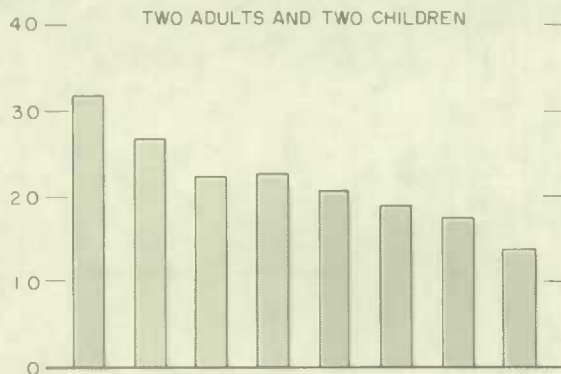
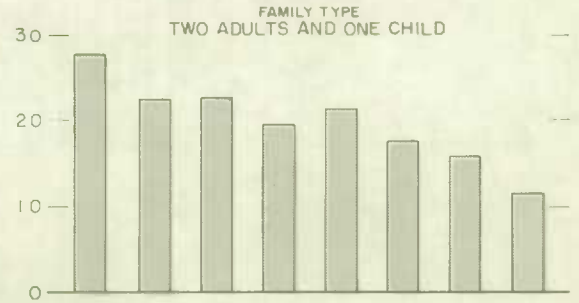
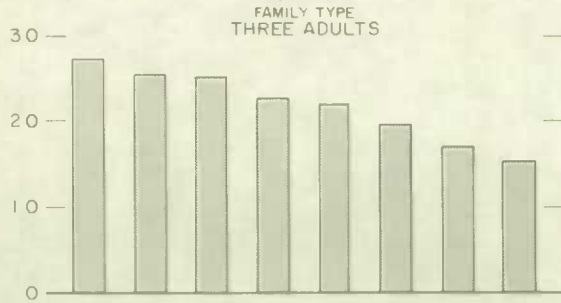
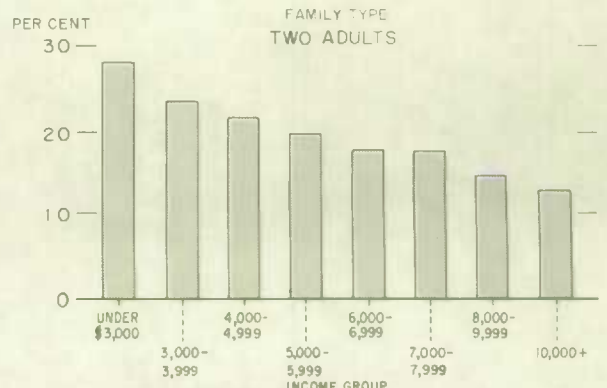
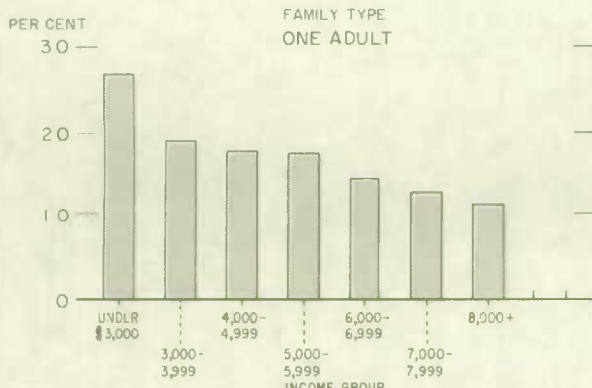
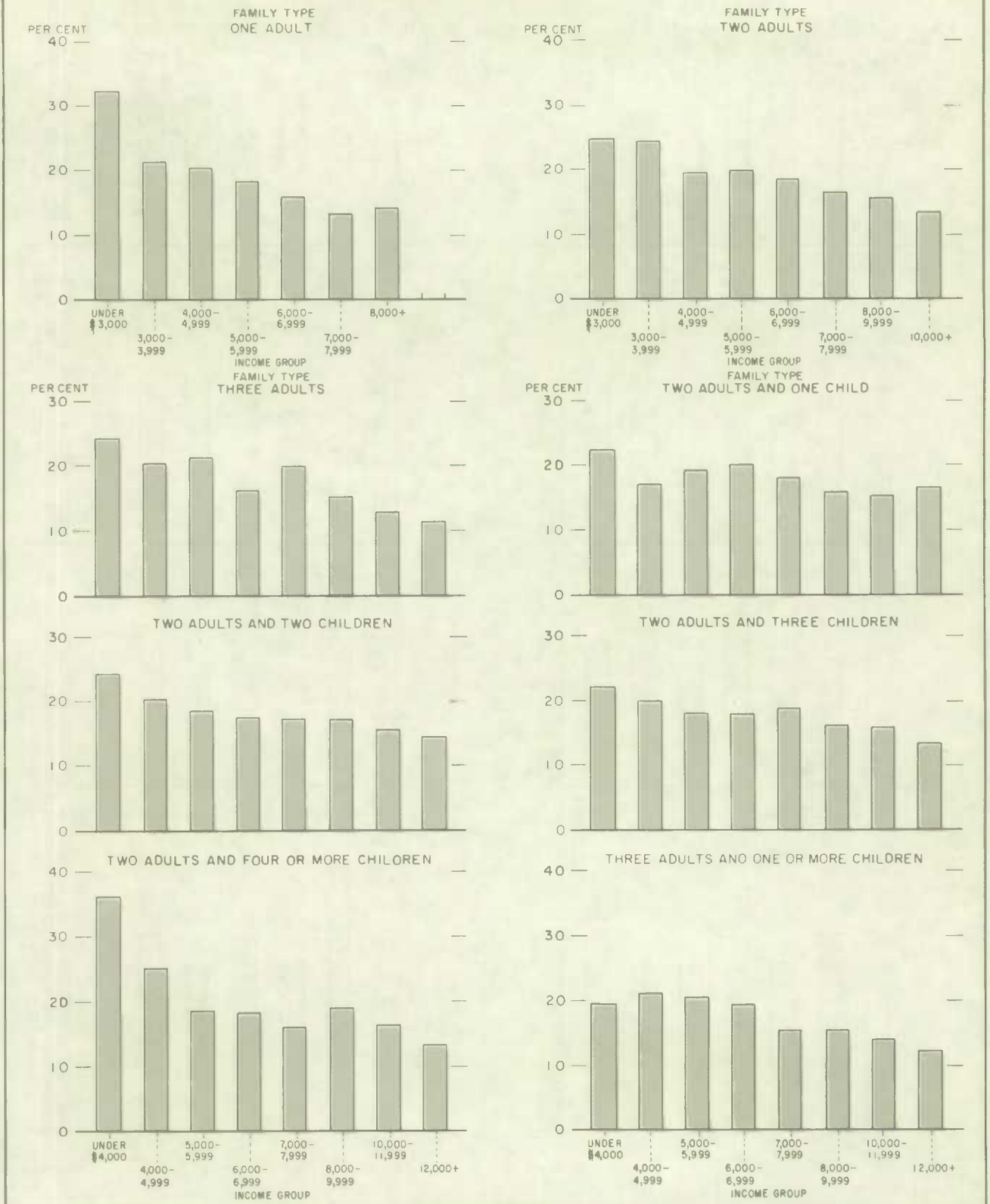

ALL FAMILIES AND INDIVIDUALS, ELEVEN CITIES, 1967

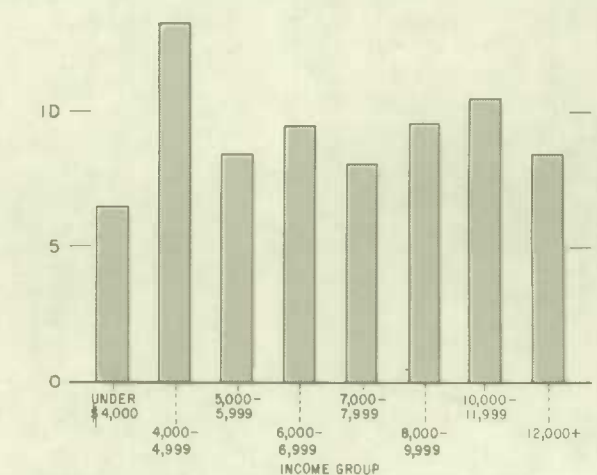
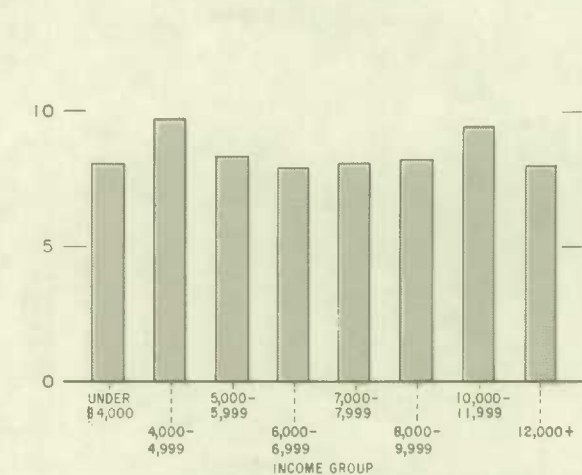
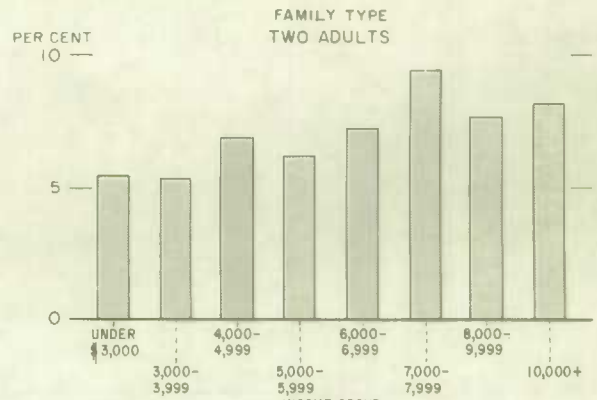
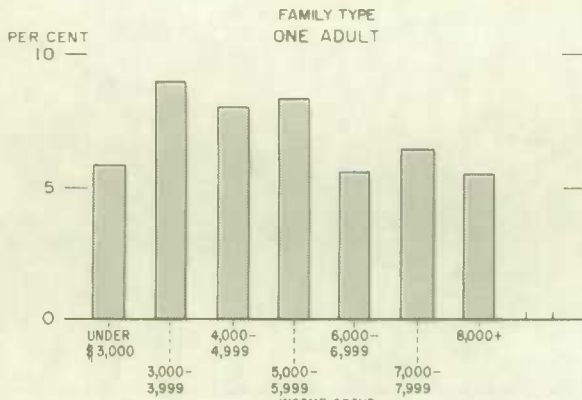
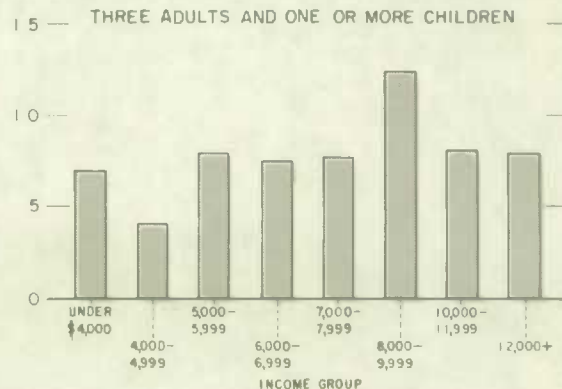
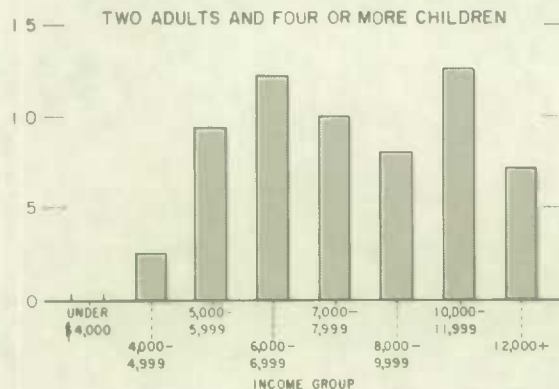
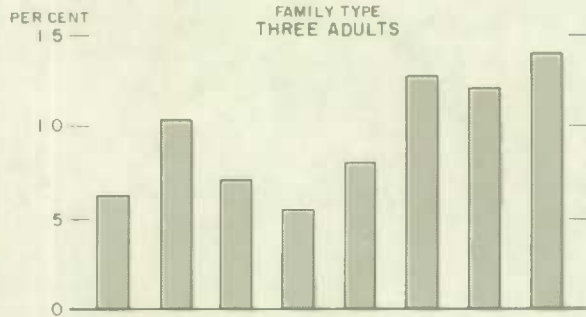
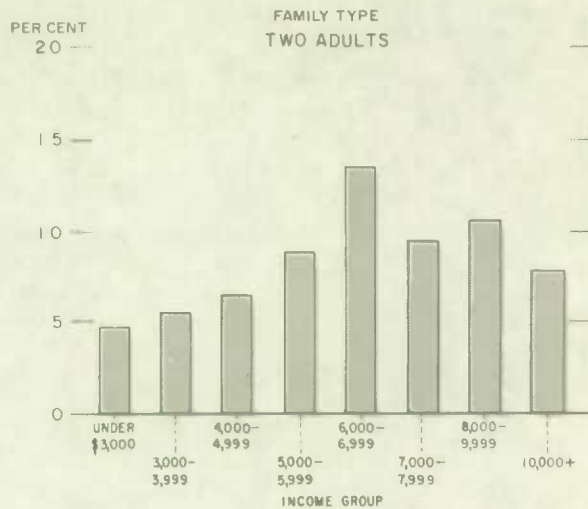
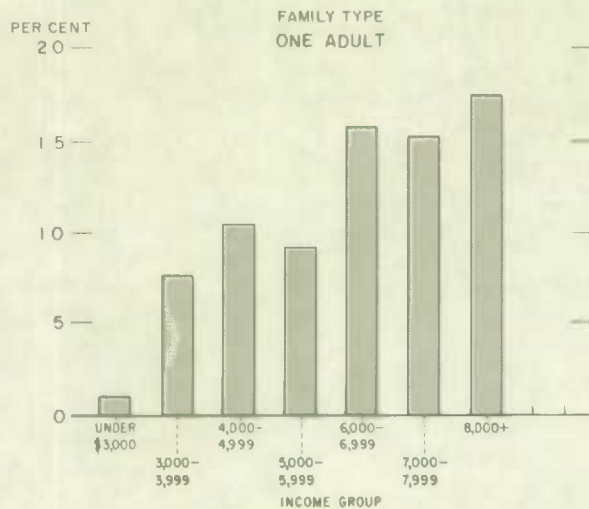
