Greenway, M.A. Dominion Statistician: Chief, Prices Branch: WORLD WHOLESALE PRICE MOVEMENTS FIRST HALF OF 1944 Wholesale price index numbers for most countries recorded small advances in the first half of 1944 usually not exceeding 2 p.c.; somewhat larger increases in Mexico and Argentina provided the princip 1 exceptions to this statement. The relative stability of price levels in Canada, the United Kingdom and the United States offered a contrast to their behaviour in the first half of 1919. The termination of war in 1918 was followed by a mild depression in commodity markets. This continued well into 1919 before the final inflationary phase which reached a climax about the middle of 1920. The United States Bureau of Labor wholesale index in the first half of 1944 advanced again following a gradual decline in the latter part of 1943; fractional gains were recorded in each of the first six months of 1944, and the June index of 104.3 (1926=100) was 0.2 p.c. above the preceding wartime high of May, 1943. The June, 1944 index was 39.1 p.c. above the corresponding August, 1939 level. The Canadian index of wholesale prices continued to make slight advances in the first quarter of 1944, but these were lost in the second quarter. The June index of all wholesale prices showed a wartime increase of 41.8 p.c. with the corresponding rise in Canadian farm product wholesale prices amounting to 74.7 p.c. The rise in wholesale prices in Mexico accelerated in 1944, following short orops in 1943, and a rising tendency in wages. In March, 1944 provision was made for the import and distribution of commodities in short supply, including corn, wheat, lard and sugar. The Bank of Mexico wholesale index advanced 14.5 p.c. in the first half of 1944, and has increased 78.1 p.c. since the outbreak of war. In Argentina, a 4 p.c. rise in the wholesale price index in the first half of 1944 followed a temporary check subsequent to price control measures established in the middle of 1943. The United Kingdom Board of Trade index rose 1.7 p.c. in a steady advance between December, 1943 and May, 1944, and remained stationary in June. Lower food prices were outweighed by increases in all groups of industrial materials and manufactures, the most substantial being in coal and cotton prices. Since the end of 1942 the Swiss index has shown only a moderate increase compared with that of earlier war years; between December, 1943 and April, 1944 a rise of 1.4 p.c. was recorded. Comparative stability is also shown by index numbers for Sweden, in the latter part of 1943 and the early months of 1944. The index of wholesale prices in Cairo, Egypt remained unchanged from February to April of 1944, but rose 4 points in May to a level 212 p.c. above August, 1939. A conference held in Cairo in April, 1944 by eleven countries of the Near and Middle East considered the problem of absorbing purchasing power created by Allied expenditure in these countries. So far, the principal offsets have been sales of precious metals and offers of government bonds. In Egypt an approach to the problem of food supply has been made in 1944 by converting to food production more than a million acres formerly used to grow cotton. There was little change in the Calcutta wholesale price index for India during the first half of 1944. The June index was only 0.7 p.c. below December, 1943, although still 14 p.c. below the peak of September of last year. To June, 1944 the wartime increase in wholesale prices was almost 200 p.c. In 1944 the economic situation has been eased by better crops and distribution control. Rationing of rice, wheat, and sugar exists in more than fifty cities and towns and is being extended to rural areas.

Wholesale index numbers for Australia showed small deviations from levels reached early in 1943. The New Zealand series which has recorded a fairly persistent rise throughout the wartime period recorded no net change between December, 1943 and May 1944. Lower prices for vegetable foodstuffs counterbalanced increases in other groups. The South African index advanced only 0.9 p.c. between December and May, as compared with 4.6 p.c. since June, 1943.

WORLD COST-OF-LIVING MOVEMENTS

FIRST HALF OF 1944

Index numbers of living costs in the first half of 1944 continued to rise in most countries. The rate of increase was generally moderate, except in certain countries of Latin America and in Iceland.

The United States Bureau of Labor index of living costs has shown only fractional changes since the early summer of 1943. Food prices in June, 1944, averaged 4.4 p.c. below June, 1943, a contrast to the rate of increase during the preceding year when food prices had risen 15.2 p.c. Declines in food prices since June, 1943 have been offset by a rise in the homefurnishings index which advanced 8.2 p.c. in the first half of 1944.

Throughout the first half of 1944 the Canadian cost-of-living index remained fractionally below the levels reached in the last four months of 1943. The June, 1944 index was 0.3 p.c. below that of December, 1943, although still 0.4 p.c. higher than in June, 1943.

The Ministry of Labour index for the United Kingdom rose 0.5 p.c. in February influenced by higher coal prices, and remained at that level through June. Levels of food, rent and miscellaneous items remained unchanged.

The Mexican cost-of-living index continued an advance which has been unbroken since the end of 1942. It increased 16.0 p.c. in the first half of 1944, due in large measure to a 21 p.c. increase for foods.

A new series for Peru also showed an accelerated rate of increase of 9.5 p.c. between December and June, as compared with 15.3 p.c. for the year ending June, 1944.

In Reykjavik, Iceland, living costs after declining sharply in the first half of 1943, have risen again steadily since then. There was a 3.5 p.c. increase in the first half of 1944, but the June, 1944 index was still 1.5 p.c. below the December, 1942 peak. The wartime increase to June 1944 approximated 160 p.c.

Quarterly cost-of-living index numbers for Australia, which had recorded their first wartime declines in the second half of 1943, rose only 0.2 p.c. in the first half of 1944. The South African official series rose in a more marked degree in this period with an increase of 2.4 p.c. between December, 1943 and May, 1944.
