## WORD WHOLEMS OTICA MOVIHNUS SECON IAN OF 1944

Wholesale price series in the second half of 1944 recordec comparatively small changes. Although the movement contimued to be geaeraily upward, occasional small decreases were noted. Mexico and Argentina, where considerable acivances were recorded in the first half of the year, showed moderate increases of less than 2 p.c. Index numbers for Austrulia and Switzerland showed fractional declines.

Price series for Canada and the United States had registered their steepest wartime rise by the end of 1941, and since then their rates of advance have moderated to marked degree. The Canadian wholesale index showed no net change in the second half of 1944, and in fact, ended the year on a par with the December, 1943 index. The United States Bureau of Labor index recorded fractional losses during the second half, but ended the year 0.4 p.c. above June, 1344 and 1.5 p.c. above December, 1943. In both series fluctuations were usually caused by changes in farm product prices.

The Board of Trade wholesale index for the United King cora reached a new wartime high in August, 1944 influenced by seasonal food price increases and higher prices for coal, iron and steel. Subsequent food price declines lowered the inciex so that the December level was only 0.7 p.c. above June, 1944. is 1344 net increase of $2.3 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}_{0}$, 2 s compared with $1.3 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$ 。in 1943 , was due principally to authorized increases in coal and cotton prices.

The Sriss wholesale series which has risen only moderately since the end of 1342 , recorded small losses in the socond half of 1344 , resultind in a decrease oif O. 6 p.c. betveen June and November, and a gain of 0.9 p.c. for the year.

The Australian wholesiale index for Decuaber, 1944 was 0.5 p.c.. below June, 1944 and $0.8 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. above December, 1943. Price series for New Cumland and South iffica, uiter recording no net changes in the first half of 1944, advanced moderately between June and Noveraber, Nevi Zealand U.E p.c. ind South Atrica, 1.3 p.c. Until the end of 1340 series for Austraiia, Nev Zealand and South Africa showed rates of advance very similar to that of the Canadian index. The austraikn index, after a eradual rise in 1941, advanced sharily again in 1942. Frice control measures have beer ofiective in ceeping this index relatively stable since the middie of 1343. Incex numbers for New Zealand and South Africa continued to show substantial increases for each year of war until the beginning of 1944.

For Argentina, a slower rate of increase prevailed in the second half of 1944, $1.4 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. between June and Deceraber, as against $5.8 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. for the year. In most

Latin-nmerican countries, prices did not begin to show unusual advances until 1941. Argentina was exceptional in recording a gain of $13 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$ 。 in the first four months of war. This was followed by comparative stability in 1940, and a further rapid ascent in 1941 which continued almost unbroken until extensive price control measures were introduced in the middle of 1943.

The Mexican series recorded small intermittent deciines in the second half of 1944, the first since Aupust, 194\% However, in spite of these, the JueDecember, 1944 period witressed an increase of 1.1 ince, whick colupred with a gain of 18.5 poc. for the yedr.

The wholesale index for Calcutta, lndia continued below the levels reached in the latter part of 1943. The November, 1944 index was 0.3 j.c. below June, 1944 and 0.7 poc below Decenver, $134 \%$.

## WORLD COST-OF-LIVING MOVEMEVIS <br> SECOND HALF OF 1344

In the second half of 1944 cost-of-living index numbers for most countries recorded small increases which were usually less than those in the first half. Series for Canada, Mexico and Newfoundland showed minor declines betreen June and December.

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics Decenber index of Canadian living costs was 0.4 p.c. lower than June, 1944 , and 0.7 p.c. below December, 1943. The United States Bureau of Labor index rose $1.3 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. between June and December, and $2.1 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. for the year. The largest group increases were show by clothing and housefurni shings.

The cost-of-living index for St. John s, Newfoundland had risen 52 p.c. from October, 1939 to Deccmuer, 1344 ; the December index was 2.3 p.c. below the June level and only C. 3 p.c. above December, 1943. An extension of price controls to cover practically all foodstuit's became offective October 31, 1944.

The Ministry of Labor index of living costs in the United Kinguom has recorded a wartime increase of 30.3 p.c. to August, 1944. The groups responsible for the increase were foods and fuel and light. The net increase for the second half of 1944 vias $0.5 \mathrm{p}, \mathrm{c}$, and for the year $1.0 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$.

The November level of living costs in Switzerland was unchanged fron June, 1944, and stood I. 5 . c. ubove December, 1943.

Cost of-living index numbers for Latin-American countries continued upward in the second half of 1944, with the exception of the Mexican series which recorded its first declines since December, 1942. Lower food prices caused decrease of $1.8 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$ 。 in the second half in contrait to a net increase of $13.9 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{c}$. for the year. A June-November advance of 3: $\%$ c. for Limd, seru vas thocerate compared with the 13.0 p.c. increase in the firat eleven months of 1944. In rio de Janeiro, living costs showed a slightly accelerating rise, and in Santiago, Chile the cost-of-living index mounted with increasing monentum in the third cuarter of 1944.

The quarterly index ol living costs for Australia remained throughout 1944 below the level of the second quarter of 1343 whon new itabilization measures were adopted. The December, 1944 index mas C. 1 p.c. above June, 1944 and 0.3 p.c. above December, 1343.

The New Zealand wartime index of retail prices (December, $1342=100$ ) was loc. 4 in December, 1944; this was C. 3 p.c. above the level of June, 1944 and December, 1943.
