The dollar volume of wholesale aries in November 1950 was 74 higher than in November of the previous year but decilned seasonally from October by $4 \%$. These figures are besed on returns submitted by some four hundred forme representing nine lines of trade. Cumulative sales for the eleven months of 1950 were 56 in excess of the volume in the corrappondine eleven month of 1940. The general unadJusted index (on the base, average for $1935-1939=100$ ) stood at 326.9 for November 1950, 306.7 for November 1949, and 339.4 for October 1950.

The largest provincial percentage gain over November 1949 was recorded in British Columbite where alps rose 11\%. Increases ranging between $5 \%$ and 5 , were recorded for the other regions of the country.

NOVEMBER 1950


The three trades which have shown the greatest advances during the past few months continued to lead in November. Hardware and dry goods wholesalers' sales were $14 \%$ above November 1949, while wholesalers of automotive equipment rallied from the small gain of $5 \%$ in October to record dollar sales in November up 13\%. Increases in the other trades were as follows: drugs, $8 \%$; footwear and clothing, 6\%; groceries and fruits and vegetables, $3 \%$. A deoline of less than $1 \%$ was recorded by tobacco and confectionery wholesalers.

Stocks
The margin of increase in value of stocks in the hands of wholesalers continued to rise in November, inventory at the end of that month being valued $14 \%$ higher than at the same date of the previous year as compared with increases of $12 \%, 11 \%$, and $7 \%$ for the three preceding months.

Wholesalers of groceries, tobacco and confectionery, hardware, drugs, and footwear reported stocks on hand at a value between $14 \%$ and $18 \%$ higher than at November 30, 1949. Automotive equipment and dry goods wholesalers' inventories rose $9 \%$ and $2 \%$ respectively, while fruit and vegetable and clothing wholesalers recorded stocks $1 \%$ and $2 \%$ respectively below the November 1949 levels.
