# WHOLESALE TRADE 

JUNE 1950

Wholesale bales in June 1950 were 5 g greaser than the collar volume in June 1949, wile cumule:1ve figures for the first $82 x$ months of 1950 were up 1 over the correspondIng period of last year. The general unadjusted index (on the base, average for $1935-1939=100$ ) stood at 325.8 for June $1950,321.5$ for May 1950 , and 310.9 for June 1949.

All provinces recorded increases over June a year ago, aline ranging from 13 For the Maritime Provinces and British Columbia to 98 for quebec.

The following chart, appearing for the first time in this issue, show the trent in Bale and inventories, annually from 1939 and monthly for January' 1948, for dry goode and grocery wholesalers. These charts are begged on index numbers, and do not portray the dollarwise relationship between sales and stocks.

INDEXES OF SALES AND INVENTORIES OF DRY GOODS AND GROCERY WHOLESALERS $(1935-1939=100)$



Fruit and vegetable wholesalers sales advanced $15 \%$ over tune 1949 to record the largest gain among the nine trades surveyed. Wholesalers of hardware reported sales $9 \%$ above the dollar volume for June last year, while increases of $5 \%$ were recorded for wholesalers of tobacco and confectionery, footwear, and automotive equipment. Gains of $4 \%$ and $2 \%$ were registered for drug wholesalers and dry goods wholesalers respectively, while clothing and grocery wholesalers' sales were practically unchanged in volume from June a year ago.

Stooks

The value of stocke on hand at the end of Jume 1950 was generally higher than at the same date a year ago, totals for the nine trades exceeding the valuo of inventories at June 30,1949 by $10 \%$. Fruit and vegetable dealers and tobacoo and confectionery wholesalers registered the largest gains of $46 \%$ and $24 \%$ respectively.

Grocery and Dry Goods Inventorios
A new feeture of these monthly reports is the introduction of a table showing inventories of wholesale grocers and dry goods wholesalers (see below). These were formerly published only in the annual summary bulletin "Wholesale Trade".

Both classes of business show higher inventori es at the end of June this year than at the same date a year ago. The dowmard trend between May and June in dry goods inventories is consistent with the normal seasonal movement.
