##  <br> DECEMBER, 1951

Wholesale sales in December 1951 were $4 \$$ higher than in December 1950, with all regions except Quebec contributing to the increase. The largest provincial percentage gain over December last year was recorded in British Columbia where sales rose lo\%. Sales in the twelve months of 1951 were $10 \%$ above the 1950 volume.

The results shown in this report are based on returns from 400 wholesalers distributed over nine trades. They reflect trends in dollar volume of business and are not adjusted for changes in wholesale prices.


The unadjusted index for the total of the nine trades (on the base of $1935-1939=100$ ) stood at 294.8 for December 1951 compared with 282.4 for December a year ago and 353.4 for November 1951.

Fruit and vegetable wholesalers took the lead in sales increases in December 1951 with a gain of $22 \%$. In the other eight trades, four showed increases in volume of sales and four registered declines; auto parts and equipment sales were $11 \%$ higher and dry goods, $15 \%$ lower than in the same period last year.

Year-end stocks held by wholesalers in the nine trades covered by this survey were valued $6 \%$ higher than stocks at the end of 1950, the December increase being the lowest montheend increase in value of inventories of any month during 1951. Wholesalers of fruits and vegetables with an increase of $4 \%$ recorded the greatest gain among the nine trades. An increase of $20 \%$ was reported by auto parts and equipment wholesalers; stocks of hardware, dry goods, clothing and groceries were up $10 \%$, $8 \%$, $7 \%$, and $3 \%$ respectively over December 1950. Decreases in dollar volume of inventory were recorded by wholesalers of footwear, tobacco and confectionery, and drugs, $23 \%, 9 \%$ and $4 \%$ respectively.
