## LARCH DEPARTME

The results shown in this report are based on returns from 400 wholesalers distributed over nine trades. They reflect trends in dollar volume of business and are not adjusted for changes in wholesale prices.

The unadjusted index for the total of the nine trades (on the bess of $1935-1939=100$ ) stood at 400.4 for October 1953 compared with 414.3 for October a year ago and 409.5 for September 1953.


## Sales Trends by Trades

Wholesale sales moved downard in October 1953 for the first time in five months, according to figures submitted by wholesalers in the nine trades covered in this survey. Wholesalers of footwear reported decreased sales of $24 \%$ compared with October 1952, dry goods sales declined 13\%, clothing $10 \%$, fruits and vegetables $7 \%$ and tobacco and confectionery $3 \%$. Wholesalers of auto parts and equipment, groceries and drugs all reported a drop of $2 \%$ in sales. Sales of hardware with an increase of $1 \%$ reported the only gain in sales during October 1953.

## Inventories

The dollar value of stocks held by wholesalers was 3\% higher at the end of October 1953 than at the same date last year. Inventories of clothing and footwear increased $28 \%$ and $21 \%$ respectively. Stocks of dry goods were $19 \%$ higher, tobecco and confectionery stocks increased $8 \%$ while smaller gains of $6 \%$ and $2 \%$ were reported by wholesslers of auto parts and equ*pment and groceries. Month end stocks of fruits and vegetables declined 19\%, while stocks of drugs and hardware declined $2 \%$ and $2 \%$ respectively.
