The results shown in this report are besed on returns from 400 wholesalers distributed over ninu trades. They reflect trends in dollar volume of business and are not adjusted for changes in wholesale prices.

The unadjusted index for the total of the nine trades (on the base of $1935-1939=100$ ) stood at 408.8 for September 1953 compared with 404.1 for September a year ago and 369.4 for August 1953.


Sales Trands by Trades
Wholesale sales continued fractionally higher in September 1953 than in the same month last year according to flgures submitted by wholesalers in the nine trades covered in this survey. Sales of drugs were $5 \%$ higher than in September 1952 followed by hardware with an increase of $4 \%$, groceries $3 \%$ and tobacco and confectionery $2 \%$. Wholesalers of footwear reported decreased sales of $11 \%$, sales of dry gonds droppod $7 \%$, while both fruit and vegetable and clothing sales declined $4 \%$. Sales of auto parts and equipment were 3\% lower than in September 1952.

## Inventories

The dollar value of stocks held by wholesalers was 5\% higher at the end of September 1953 than at the same date last year. Month end inventories of clothing and dry goods increased $32 \%$ and $21 \%$ respectively. Stocks of footwear were $20 \%$ higher, while fruit and vegetable and auto parts and equipment inventories increased $16 \%$ and $8 \%$ respectively. Smaller gains of $3 \%$ and $2 \%$ were reported by wholesalers of tobacco and confectionery and groceries. Stocks of drugs declined 3\%, while hardware stocks were fractionally lower than at the end of September a year ago.
