



## WHOLESALE TRADE SEPTEMBER 1954

The results shown in this report are based on returns from 400 wholesalers distributed over nine trades. They reflect trends in dollar volume of business and are not adjusted for changes in wholesale prices.

The unadjusted index for the total of the nine trades (on the base of 1935-1939= 100) stood at 402.3 for September 1954 compared with 409.0 for September a year ago and 378.1 for August 1954.

September sales of wholesalers covered by this report registered a seasonal increase of 6.4% over the preceding month but were down 1.3% over September of the previous year. Of the nine trades covered, six reported decreases in comparison with September 1953 which ranged from 13% for footwear wholesalers to less than one per cent for groceries. Of the three trades reporting increases the largest which amounted to 5% was shown for fruit and vegetable wholesalers while drug wholesalers reported an increase of less than one per cent.

## Inventories

There was a decrease of 0.7% in the value of stocks on hand at the end of September 1954 in comparison with the previous month and of 1.9% in comparison with September of 1953. In the comparison with the previous year six trades reported decreases in value of stocks on hand which ranged from 24.2% for footwear wholesalers to 1.1% for hardware wholesalers. Three trades reported increases, the largest being grocery wholesalers with 3.7% followed by auto parts and equipment wholesalers and drug wholesalers with 2.7% and 2.5% respectively.
