# WHOLESALE TRADE 

SEPTEMBER AND OCTOBER, 1955 ANNUAL, 1951-1954

(New Dollar Series)

Estimated wholesale sales for September and October, 1955, were \$618,764,000 and $\$ 594,510,000$ respectively. In the case of September, this represents an.increase of $19.8 \%$ over sales during the same month in 1954. In the case of October, the increase over the same month in 1954 was $15.5 \%$. Cumulative figures indicate sales for the period January-0ctober, 1955, were $13.0 \%$ over the corresponding period in 1954. These figures, as well as annual sales figures since 1951, are outlined for various trade classifications in the tables which follow the text of this report.

This is the first publication of a new series dealing with wholesale trade. While monthly unadjusted indexes of sales for nine wholesale trades have been published for many years, estimates of total wholesale sales, unadjusted for price changes or seasonal variations, are reported in this publication for the first time since 1939. As in the past, adjustment has not been made for firms entering and leaving the trade. A project presently under way will make it possible to take account of this important factor when revised figures are reported. Estimated variations in inventories held by wholesale firms have been published in the past for a similar nine trades but this series is now discontinued pending the study of a more adequate approach to inventory statistics.

While statistics of population, production, external trade, and various other aspects of the social and economic life of the nation are of long standing, data relating to the form and extent of the distribution of goods and services are of more recent origin. The first complete census of dis tribution was taken for the year 1930 in connection with the seventh Decennial Census of 1931. Complete censuses were taken for the years 1941 and 1951. Since 1931, periodic inter-censal estimates of wholesale trade, which is the subject of this report, have been published. These estimates have been based on a sampling procedure. The last annual review of wholesale trade was published prior to the ninth Decennial Census of Distribution, 1951, and covered the year 1949. Results of the 1951 census are available in Volume VIII of the Census of Canada, 1951. The last monthly indexes of wholesale trade published were for the month of August, 1955.

It should be pointed out that the wholesale group now being surveyed is comprised, as in the past, of firms falling within the category known as "wholesalers proper." These firms generally act as middlemen between the producer and the retailer or between the producer and the business, industrial or institutional user. They hold inventories and buy and sell on their own account. They are distinguishable from agents and brokers, manufacturers' sales branches, assemblers of primary products, petroleum bulk stations and other types of operation not included in the survey but usually considered to be part of the group which performs the wholesale functions.

A record of all wholesale firms was obtained during the 1951 Census and, within trade groups, these firms have been classified into three size strata from which the current sample has been drawn. The estimates contained herein are based on reports from about 1,400 wholesale firms. The trends revealed by these firms have been applied to the results (adjustments having been made for omissions) of the Decennial Census of Distribution, 1951, to produce estimates of sales during the subsequent period. As indicated above, revised figures will be published at a later date.

With one exception, the nature of each trade group can be ascertained readily from its title. Motor vehicle and grain firms which are classified as wholesalers are included with "all other." This residual group includes, as well, a large varlety of trades dealing in both consumers' and producers ' goods. It includes firms whose main activity is in one or more of such trade lines as the following: sporting goods, toys, beer and ale, books, household and office furniture, industrial chemicals, metal goods, scrap metal, rubber goods, used machinery, leather, live stock, live stock feeds, scientific equipment, optical goods, etc.
