THE DYEING, CLEANING AND LAUNDRY INDUSTRIES IN CANADA, 1932.

This industry is divided into two distinct but related branches, (1) establishments whose principal occupation is the laundering of garments, etc., and (2) those to whom dyeing and cleaning rank first in importance. This report, therefore, has been written in three sections, the first reviewing statistics of both industries combined and the second and third covering the industries separately.

In 1932, 409 reports were received from establishments whose principal occupation was laundry work and dyeing and cleaning, representing an increase of two over the number reporting in 1931. The gross value of the work performed amounted to \$17,302,779, a decrease from 1931 of \$3,721,905 or 17.7 per cent. They had a total capitalization of \$24,893,114, \$728,450 or 2.8 per cent less than in the previous year. The payroll comprised 11,170 persons, 602 or 5.1 per cent less than in 1931, and their salaries and wages amounted to \$9,020,441, also a decrease of \$1,651,174 or 15.5 per cent. The cost of materials used was \$1,587,586, a drop of \$380,443 or 19.3 per cent, while the value added by manufacture, \$15,715,193, showed a decline of \$3,341,462 or 17.5 per cent in comparison with 1931.

The actual variations in the principal statistics for 1931 and 1932 are shown in the following table by provinces.

It is an interesting fact that in these industries labour is the most important factor in the cost of production. In 1932 over fifty-two per cent of the value of work performed was paid out in salaries and wages, while 9.2 per cent represented the cost of the various materials used. This was also reflected in the value added by manufacture which amounted to 90.8 per cent of the gross value of work performed.

The 409 establishments were distributed by provinces in 1932 as follows: - Prince Edward Island two, Nova Scotia twenty-two, New Brunswick fifteen, Quebec eighty-eight, Ontario 170, Manitoba twenty, Saskatchewan seventeen, Alberta eighteen, British Columbia fifty-five and the Yukon two.

The following table illustrates the percentage distribution of the principal statistics in 1931 and 1932 by provinces.

From the above table it will be observed that the bulk of this industry is located in Ontario and that Ontario and Quebec together are responsible for approximately two-thirds of the combined industry.

The value of the work performed in 1931 and 1932 is reviewed in table 4 and it will be noted that laundry work accounted for 64.9 per cent and 65.4 per cent of the total value in these respective years. The dyeing and cleaning of garments accounted for 32.4 per cent of the value in 1931 and thirty per cent in 1932.

Soaps, gasoline and benzine were the principal materials used in this industry in 1932. A list of materials used, by provinces, is contained in table 5.

The amount of capital invested in the industry remained substantially the same in 1932 as in 1931, there being a small decrease amounting to \$728,450.

The wage-earners employed in the combined industry numbered 9,786 in 1932, a decrease of 697 from the previous year. The month of maximum employment was May with 10,072 wage-earners while December with 9,202 was the minimum. In 1931, April was the maximum month with 10,804 persons employed and again December was the minimum with 9,954.

THE DYEING, CLEANING AND LAUNDRY INDUSTRIES IN CANADA, 1932.

SECTION 1. - THE LAUNDRY INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1932.

In 1932, 243 establishments whose principal operation was the laundering of garments, household effects, etc., reported work performed to a gross value of \$12,297,061, which was a decrease of \$2,582,858 or 17.3 per cent from the previous year. The capital investment, \$18,525,196, also declined by \$568,265 or three per cent. Employment was furnished to 8,292 employees in 1932, representing a decrease of 515 persons or 5.8 per cent, while the salary and wage bill declined to \$6,482,339, a decrease of \$1,227,517 or 15.9 per cent. The cost of materials used was \$1,065,906, \$284,109 or twenty-one per cent less than the 1931 cost, and the value added by work performed, \$11,231,155, had decreased by \$2,298,749 or seventeen per cent. These variations are shown in detail by provinces in the following table.

In this industry in 1932 labour costs accounted for 52.7 per cent of the gross value of work performed, while the cost of materials used was only 8.7 per cent. In 1931, these proportions were 51.8 per cent and 9.1 per cent respectively.

In 1932 the establishments were distributed by provinces as follows: - Prince Edward Island two, Nova Scotia seventeen, New Brunswick twelve, Quebec fifty-eight, Ontario ninety-three, Manitoba ten, Saskatchewan seven, Alberta nine, British Columbia thirty-three and the Yukon two. The following table shows the percentage distribution of the principal statistics for both 1931 and 1932 by provinces.

Laundry work is the only work of importance performed in this industry. In 1932 its value was \$11,332,125 out of a total of \$12,297,061. In 1931 the value was \$13,645,902 out of a total of \$14,879,919. All work performed in 1931 and 1932 is shown by provinces in table 12.

All materials used in 1931 and 1932 are shown in table 13. Soaps of all kinds was the principal one of the many materials used in this industry.

The capital invested in this industry was practically the same in the two years, there being a small decrease of \$568,265 in 1932 in comparison with 1931.

By referring to table 15, it will be observed that seventy-eight establishments accounted for work to the value of \$9,330,157 or 75.9 per cent of the total value of work performed, that ninety-four establishments supplied \$15,828,627 or 85.4 per cent of the total capital investment and 123 establishments furnished employment to 7,234 persons which represented 87.2 per cent of the total number employed.

The number of wage-earners declined in 1932 by 594 persons. May with 7,508 persons was the month of highest employment and December with 7,014 was the lowest. In 1931, July and August with 8,127 and 8,124 respectively, had the highest employment and November with 7,654 had the lowest.

SECTION 2. - THE DYEING AND CLEANING INDUSTRY IN CANADA, 1932.

In this section are included all establishments whose principal source of revenue is derived from the dyeing and cleaning of wearing apparel, household effects, etc., and reports were received from 166 establishments, an increase of nine over the number reporting in 1931.

The gross value of work performed in 1932 was \$5,005,718, a decrease of \$1,139,047 or 18.5 per cent from 1931. The capital invested in this industry in 1932, \$6,367,918, also showed a decline of \$160,185 or 2.5 per cent. The number of persons furnished employment was 2,878, eighty-seven less than in 1931, and their salary and wage bill, \$2,538,102, also dropped by \$423,657 or 14.3 per cent. All materials used decreased by \$96,334 or 15.6 per cent to a cost of \$521,680, while the value added by manufacture, \$4,484,038, showed a decline of \$1,042,713 or 18.9 per cent.

These actual variations in the principal statistics for 1931 and 1932 are shown in the following table by provinces.

In this industry in 1932 the cost of labour was 50.7 per cent of the gross value of all work performed, while the cost of all materials used was only 10.4 per cent. In 1931 the cost of labour equalled 48.2 per cent, while the cost of materials used was 10.1 per cent.

The 166 establishments reporting in this industry were distributed by provinces as follows: - Nova Scotia five, New Brunswick three, Quebec thirty, Ontario seventy-seven, Manitoba ten, Saskatchewan ten, Alberta nine and British Columbia twenty-two. The percentage distribution of the principal statistics is shown by provinces for 1931 and 1932 in the following table.

It will be observed from the above table that approximately one-half the principal statistics were accounted for by the province of Ontario in both years.

The principal work performed in this industry in both 1931 and 1932 was the dyeing and cleaning of garments, and in the latter year this amounted to \$4,286,449 or 35.6 per cent of the total. In 1931 the value was \$5,669,478 or 92.3 per cent of the total. All work performed is reviewed by provinces in table 24.

Gasoline and benzine, the principal materials used in the industry, cost \$156,520 in 1932 and \$197,072 in 1931. Table 25 contains a detailed list of all materials consumed in both years.

By referring to table 27, it will be noted that twenty-three establishments accounted for \$2,681,630 or 53.6 per cent of the total value of work performed, that thirty-seven establishments supplied \$4,357,921 or 68.4 per cent of the total capital investment and out of the 2,878 employees, salaried and wage-earning, thirty-seven establishments furnished employment to 1,885 or 65.5 per cent of the total.

The trend of employment remained practically the same in both years, the number of wage-earners showing a small decrease of 103 in 1932. In that year, May with 2,564 persons employed, was the month of highest employment and February with 2,136 was the lowest. In 1931, April with 2,776 was the highest and again February with 2,221 was the lowest.


