

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### POWER LAUNDRIES AND CLEANING AND DYEING ESTABLISHMENTS IN CANADA, 1942

#### Section 1. --- General Review

The marked upward trend which has characterized the power laundry and cleaning and dyeing industries since the beginning of the war was continued in 1942 according to results of the annual survey of these industries recently completed.

Power laundries and cleaning and dyeing plants reporting had annual receipts of \$39,019,922 for 1942 compared with \$34,239,901 for 1941 and \$26,775,841 in 1940. Although a few plants, particularly in the laundry field were known to have ceased operations, this loss was offset by some additions resulting in a net increase of 8 in the number of plants in operation. More than \$19,000,000 was paid to employees of 671 plants in Canada; materials and supplies used in washing and cleaning processes cost \$4,172,745, fuel and electricity cost \$1,956,422 while the collection and delivery of bundles (exclusive of salaries paid to drivers) added nearly \$2,100,000 to the cost of operation.

The 10 largest cities in Canada reported 385 plants having receipts of nearly 30 millions of dollars or approximately 76 per cent of the total. Ontario reported 333 plants with annual receipts of \$16,651,093 or over \$1,800,000 more than in 1941; Quebec with 120 plants reported annual receipts totalling \$9,769,179. British Columbia had 71 plants and \$4,176,223 receipts. Alberta had 35 plants and \$2,069,692 receipts; 32 plants in Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia did business to the extent of \$1,718,911; 28 plants in Manitoba had receipts of \$2,614,136; Saskatchewan had 29 plants and \$1,171,686 receipts; while New Brunswick reported 23 plants with receipts of \$849,002.

Male and female employees required to operate the laundries and cleaning plants averaged 20,372 and the total annual payroll was \$19,187,269, just under 50 per cent of the total receipts for all work performed.

The estimated present value of 2,381 delivery trucks required for the handling of goods was nearly \$1,900,000. The total cost of operation of these units was \$5,127,452, of which \$3,038,775 represented salaries and wages paid to drivers and salesmen. Other expenses such as depreciation, repairs, gas, oil, etc., amounted to \$2,088,577.

Coal and fuel used in providing steam and power for plants in this industry for 1942 cost \$1,521,025, while light and electric power cost \$435,397, a substantial increase in each case over 1941.

Power installation in laundries amounted to 4800 horse power for steam engines and turbines and 8600 horse power generated by electric motors, while dry cleaning establishments had steam engines generating 275 horse power and electric motors rating over 4500 horse power. Boilers installed in these plants had a manufacturer's rating of 36,684 horse power.

The largest single item in cost of materials was packing supplies.

The total cost of wrapping papers, twine, hangers, bags, etc., amounted to
\$685,000. Over 6,500,000 pounds of soaps costing \$700,000 were used along with
4,000,000 pounds of sodas costing \$154,000, 6,000,000 pounds of salt costing
\$57,000, and 698,000 pounds of starches costing \$69,000; cleaning solvents used cost
\$621,600, and wash nets and pads and coverings for presses and ironers cost \$347,000.

#### Section 2. -- Power Laundries in Canada, 1942

The number of power laundry plants in Canada reported for 1942 was 275. The total value of work performed amounted to \$24,071,670, an increase of 15 per cent over that reported for 1941, and the highest receipts yet tabulated for the industry since these reports commenced in 1927. Ontario's urban centres support 124 plants and customers paid over 9-1/2 millions of dollars for laundry service during the year. The annual revenue of 62 plants in Quebec was \$6,206,526; 34 plants in British Columbia and the Yukon received \$3,152,605 for their work; Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia had 17 plants with receipts of \$1,137,802; New Brunswick had 12 plants with \$661,830; Alberta reported 11 plants with receipts of \$1,397,002; Manitoba, 9 plants and \$1,355,768; and Saskatchewan, 6 plants and \$596,882 in annual receipts.

A break-down of the value of work performed by power laundries according to type of service shows that nearly 46 per cent of the total receipts was for finished laundry work. Other services in order of importance were coat and towel supply, 13.0 per cent; cleaning suits and dresses, 12.4 per cent; semifinished laundry, 9.3 per cent; wet wash, 7.8 per cent; damp flat, 7.1 per cent and all other services, 4.6 per cent. Laundry work done for other finishers and distributors amounted to \$580,359.

The total number of salaried employees combined with the monthly average number of wage-earners employed in power laundries was 13,184 persons in 1942. The annual payroll including salaried workers and wage-earners, full-time and part-time was \$12,042,597. The average annual wages for salaried employees was \$1,416 and for wage-earners \$786 per person. Full-time male wage-earners worked on an average 51 hours per week with average weekly earnings of \$22,28; female workers averaged 48 hours per week with average weekly earnings of \$13,35, both average earnings showing an increase over 1941. Part-time male workers averaged \$10.35 per week while part-time females earned \$9,24. The highest average earnings for male employees was \$28,47 in Saskatchewan for an average week of 51 hours. The highest for female employees was in Ontario at \$14.27 for a 48-hour week.

The collection and delivery of customers' goods, an important item in laundry service cost laundry operators 13.8 per cent of the total receipts for all laundry work as compared with 15.3 per cent for 1941. More than 1,400 trucks were required for this collection and delivery of bundles. The average operating expense including depreciation of equipment was \$866 per unit while drivers' and salesmen's wages amounted to \$1,414 per unit. The cost of this service was highest in Alberta where it averaged 15.1 per cent of the total receipts.

The cost of washing materials and supplies is another important expense item. Laundry owners paid \$2,706,183 to manufacturers or dealers of scaps, sodas and other laundry supplies during 1942. Scaps cost plant operators \$583,850; washing sodas, \$137,925; starch, \$64,488; wash nets, \$120,212; and wrapping materials, \$362,959. The total cost of supplies averaged \$9,841 per plant or 11.2 per cent of the annual receipts.

The average amount of capital employed by owners of power laundries was \$71,702 per plant, slightly more than the average reported for 1941. Out of the 275 plants reported in Canada only 51 are operated with an investment of less than \$10,000; 106 have an investment of over \$50,000 each and 19 reported an employed capital of over \$200,000 per plant.

A slight increase in the total number of installed units of machinery and equipment was shown in the year's reports. Dry cleaning units decreased from 136 to 121, while flat-work ironers numbered 443. The larger portion of the remaining equipment included 1,814 washwheels, 1,025 extractors, 2,960 presses of various kinds and 1,210 ironing board units.

Hand laundries are established in many places but are generally doing only a small volume of business and are limited mostly to the ironing and finishing of wearing apparel. Washing and finishing of the larger household and flatwork pieces is done for these hand laundries by power plants at wholesale rates.

#### Section 3 .-- Cleaning and Dyeing Establishments in Canada, 1942.

The cleaning and dyeing establishments in this section are those engaged in the cleaning of unwashable fabrics by solvents other than water. While a certain amount of washing of goods is done in some plants, receipts reported for laundry work and other services were generally small, but are specified under separate headings in tables showing work performed in cleaning plants.

There were 396 cleaning and dyeing plants operating in Canada in 1942 and annual receipts for this service totalled \$14,948,252. Reports were received from 209 plants in Ontario whose receipts of \$7,087,838 formed 47.4 per cent of the Dominion total. Quebec had 58 plants with \$3,562,653 receipts; British Columbia had 37 plants with \$1,023,618 receipts; Alberta, 24 plants with \$672,690; Manitoba, 19 plants with \$1,258,368; Saskatchewan, 23 plants with \$574,804; Prince Edward Island and Neva Scotia, 15 plants with \$581,109; and 11 plants in New Brunswick had receipts amounting to \$187,172 for the year.

The annual revenues of 51 plants operating in Toronto was \$3,467,356 or almost 50 per cent of the Ontario total. Plants operating in Montreal numbered 32 with receipts of \$2,877,608. There were 20 plants in Vancouver with receipts of \$727,766; 15 plants in Winnipeg with receipts of \$1,192,524, and 16 in Hamilton had receipts of \$543,628 for 1942.

The total annual payroll amounted to \$7.144,672 for 1,795 salaried employees and 5,393 wage-earners. The average salary per employee was \$1,263 while the average wage-earner received \$904 for his work. The monthly average of wage-earners showed employment of 2,393 males and 3,000 females. The average earnings per full-time male employee was \$21.85 for a 49-hour week, while the average earnings per female employee was \$14.66 for a 47-hour week. Male wage-earners in Ontario received the highest average weekly earnings with \$23.18 per week. Female wage-earners were highest in British Columbia and averaged \$18.00 per week. The total wage cost for cleaning and dyeing establishments was 41.3 per cent of the total receipts as compared with 41.5 per cent for power laundries.

Cost of collection and delivery averaged 12.1 per cent of the total receipts compared with 13.8 per cent reported for collection of laundry work. The number of delivery trucks in operation was 923 with an average operating cost of \$894 per unit. Salaries paid to drivers and salesmen averaged \$1,059 per unit.

Most cleaning and dyeing establishments operate on a smaller scale than do power laundries. Of the 396 plants reporting, 35 had annual receipts of less than \$7,500 each, 46 reported receipts between \$7,500 and \$10,000, 209 between \$10,000 and \$30,000, 80 were over \$30,000 but less than \$100,000 and 26 establishments reported total revenues in excess of \$100,000 each for 1942.

Materials and supplies used by cleaners and dyers cost \$1,466,562; 82,651 pounds of colours and dyes valued at \$104,024 were used along with 176,412 pounds of acids, 1,608,000 gallons of common solvents and 1,058,854 pounds of soaps. Paper, bags, wrapping materials and hangers cost over \$322,000.

Dry cleaning units in operation increased from 236 to 253 during the year and suit presses increased from 1,213 to 1,305. Other equipment included 764 wash-wheels, 581 extractors, 543 dyeing vats, 633 sewing machines, 802 ironing board units and 379 other presses of various kinds.

According to services performed by cleaners and dyers, 74.7 per cent of the total receipts was for cleaning suits and dresses. Cleaning curtains, carpets and household articles accounted for 7.3 per cent of the receipts, dyeing, 4.9 per cent, finished laundry, 3.0 per cent and all other work and services. 10.1 per cent.
