

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POWER LAUNDRIES, CLEANING AND DYEING ESTABLISHMENTS, CANADA, 1947

Section I - All Plants Combined

Receipts of the 774 power laundries, dry cleaning and dyeing plants reporting to the Bureau for the year 1947 amounted to \$59,043,678, a gain of 15% over the \$51,148,159 reported for the year 1946 by 690 plants.

For the purposes of this report, establishments have been classified as laundries or dry cleaners on the basis of the value of work performed. Establishments in which more than 50% of the receipts are from laundry work are classified as laundries; when receipts from dry cleaning or dyeing form more than 50% of the total, the establishment has been classified in that group. Establishments in which the major portion of the work performed was laundry accounted for 244 of the 774 plants included in the survey while the remaining 530 plants were primarily dry cleaners and dyers.

Reports were also received from distributors and establishments specializing in the rental of linens, i.e. coats, towels, overalls, etc. Some of these firms do their own ironing, pressing or packaging, but they have no facilities for washing, cleaning or dyeing on their premises. Statistics for these types are presented separately in Tables 26 and 27 of this report.

Of the total receipts of \$59,043,678, laundry work accounted for 41%; dry cleaning and dyeing, 51%; coat and towel rentals, 4%; and all other work, 4%.

All provinces registered increases in volume of business handled in 1947 compared with 1946, although the gain in Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia combined amounted to only 3%. Percentage increases in the other provinces were as follows: New Brunswick, 11%; Ontario, 14%; Saskatchewan, 15%; Manitoba, 15%; Alberta, 16%; Quebec, 17%; and British Columbia, 20%.

The average number of persons employed in power laundries, dry cleaning and dyeing plants in 1947 was 24,856, and these persons received \$30,501,536 in salaries and wages. In addition, 741 proprietors or partners were actively engaged in the operation of their businesses. Of these, 405 indicated that they received no regular amount in salaries or withdrawals while the remaining 336 reported salaries amounting to \$705,278.

The cost of fuel used in power laundries, dry cleaning and dyeing plants in 1947 amounted to \$2,257,423, an increase of 17% over the 1946 cost. Of this amount, about 60% or \$1,344,581 was expended by laundries and the remaining 40% or \$912,842 by dry cleaning and dyeing establishments. Electricity costs for laundries in 1947 amounted to \$302,512 while dry cleaners and dyers paid out \$295,752 making the total cost to the industry as a whole \$598,264.

Section II - Power Laundries

Reports were received from 244 power laundries in Canada for 1947 and these reported gross receipts of \$30,459,393, 11% above the \$27,427,219 reported by 238 laundries in 1946. Average receipts per plant increased 8% from \$115,240 in 1946 to \$124,834 in 1947.

Separate figures by provinces indicate that laundries in Saskatchewan had the greatest increase in volume of business in 1947 over 1946 at 17%. Gains in the other provinces ranged between 8% and 15% with the exception of Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia combined where there was a decline in gross receipts of 7%.

A breakdown of the receipts of power laundries according to work performed shows that finished laundry formed 42% of the total. Unfinished laundry, i.e. wet wash, damp flat, and semi-finished, made up another 20%, and wholesale or industrial work accounted for 13%. Sixteen percent of the receipts of power laundries was derived from dry cleaning. An examination of separate figures by provinces reveals that the laundries in the western provinces had a higher proportion of receipts from dry cleaning than did those in Eastern Canada. Coat and towel rentals accounted for 7% of the volume of business while the remaining 2% was made up of cleaning and storage of furs, dyeing, and other work.

Power laundries provided employment in 1947 for 13,950 persons who received \$16,357,072 in salaries and wages. Salaried employees numbered 2,856. an increase of 8% over the previous year, while salaries for this group increased 17%. The average salary per employee per year went up from \$1,670 to \$1,801 between the two years. Wage earners (those employed on an hourly or piece work basis) numbered 11,094, an increase of only .05% over 1946 and wages earned by this group amounted to \$11,212,714, 10% above the corresponding figure for 1946. The average wage per employee in 1947 was \$1,011 compared with \$928 in 1946.

In addition to these employees, there were 172 proprietors or partners actively engaged in the operation of their businesses. Of these, 71 male and 6 female owners reported salaries of \$166,425 while 91 male and 4 female proprietors reported that they drew no regular amount from the business.

Table 8 classifying power laundries according to volume of business reveals that 41 laundries with annual receipts of \$200,000 or over handled almost 55% of the business done by all laundries. Another group of 53 laundries with annual receipts falling between \$100,000 and \$200,000 accounted for 25% of the business, while plants whose annual volume was between \$50,000 and \$100,000 numbered 54 and did 13% of the total business. The remaining 7% of the gross receipts was obtained by 96 laundries in which the value of work performed during the year was less than \$50,000.

Operating costs as percentages of total receipts for various sizes of business and by provinces are shown in Tables 10 and 11. Separate figures are presented for incorporated and unincorporated businesses. Total operating expenses (before income taxes) of incorporated companies amounted to 93.3% of gross receipts. This figure varied inversely as the size of business. Firms in the less than \$20,000 group recorded a loss on operations for the year; those in the \$20,000 to \$30,000 group showed expenses 97.6% of receipts; those in the \$30,000 to \$50,000 group, 97.0%; while firms with annual receipts of \$300,000 had operating expenses amounting to 92.7% of gross receipts.

Salaries and wages paid by incorporated companies amounted to 54.9% of total receipts while other costs were as follows: fuel and electricity, 5.1%; materials and supplies, 11.7%; collection and delivery (except salaries and wages but including call or pick up office expenses), 4.6%; and all other expenses such as occupancy costs, administration, advertising, etc., 17%.

Operating expenses of unincorporated companies, before allowance for proprietors' services or income taxes, amounted to 89.0% of gross receipts, but here the percentage varied directly as the volume of business. The smallest businesses, those doing less than \$10,000 per year, had the lowest expense ratio at 71.2% of sales. Operating expenses of the \$10,000 to \$20,000 group amounted to 81.8% and of the \$20,000 to \$30,000 group, 87.1%, while the group of unincorporated firms with annual receipts of \$100,000 to \$200,000 reported operating expenses amounting to 89.4% of receipts.

Unincorporated businesses paid salaries and wages to employees (not including proprietors) amounting to 49.3% but this percentage also varied directly as the volume of business. Fuel and electricity costs were 6.5% of receipts, materials and supplies, 11.7% and collection and delivery (except salaries and wages but including call office expenses), 5.2%. The remaining 16.3% was made up of all other expenses such as occupancy costs, administration, advertising, etc.

Section III - Dry Cleaning and Dyeing Plants

Statistics given in this report for cleaning and dyeing plants are based on returns of power plants engaged in the cleaning of unwashable fabrics through the use of solvents other than water. Firms who do not have the necessary facilities for cleaning or dyeing on the premises but who act as middle men between consumer and plant are, for the purposes of this survey, considered as "distributors". Data received from distributors are not included in the regular tables for dry cleaning and dyeing plants which follow, but statistics for these firms are given in Table 26 of this bulletin.

The 530 cleaning and dyeing plants included in the 1947 survey had gross receipts for the year of \$28,584,285. This was an increase in volume of business of 21% over the amount of \$23,720,940 reported by 452 plants for the year 1946.

Receipts in all provinces were substantially higher than in 1946. The greatest percentage increase was registered in British Columbia where receipts increased 35% while in Alberta, Quebec and Ontario, gains of 24%, 22% and 20% respectively were reported. Receipts in Manitoba were up 17%, in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island combined, 14%, while Saskatchewan and New Brunswick cleaners both reported gains of 13%.

Dry cleaners tend to be more specialized in the type of work performed than do laundries. Of the total value of work performed by these establishments, 83% was dry cleaning. This was distributed as follows: suits and dresses, 71%; curtains, carpets, etc., 5%; cleaning furs, 1%; and industrial and wholesale cleaning, 6%. Dyeing accounted for 5% of the gross receipts of these establishments; laundry, 6%; storage, 2%; and all other services, 4%.

There were 10,906 persons employed in dry cleaning and dyeing plants in 1947 and these received \$14,144,464 in salaries and wages. In addition, 259 proprietors actively engaged in the operation of their businesses withdrew salaries totalling \$538,853, while another 310 working proprietors did not receive a stated salary for their services.

Salaried employees numbered 2,838 and received \$4,497,541 or an average of \$1,585 per person. This is an increase of 2% in number of employees and 24% in salaries over the 1946 figures, with an increase in average yearly salary per person of \$283. Wage-earners, employed on an hourly or piece work basis, numbered 8,068 and were paid wages amounting to \$9,646,923. This is an average wage per employee of \$1,196 which compares with \$1,126 reported for 1946.

The average volume of business handled by dry cleaning plants is considerably smaller than the average volume reported by laundries. The former had an average value of work performed per plant of \$53,933 while the average for laundries was \$124,834. Classified by size of

business, there were 59 of the 530 cleaners and dyers whose annual receipts were over \$200,000 and these did 51% of the total business. Another 80 plants had receipts between \$50,000 and \$100,000 accounted for 19% of the total receipts of all dry cleaners and dyers, while 106 plants with volumes ranging between \$30,000 and \$50,000 accounted for another 14%. The remaining 285 plants each had a volume for the year of less than \$30,000 and this group handled 16% of the total business. A further breakdown of this latter group is given in Table 19.

Operating expenses of incorporated companies amounted to 93.3% of total receipts but here again, as in the case of laundries, the proportion of expenses to receipts varied inversely as the size of business. The smallest firms, with less than \$15,000 annual receipts, reported operating expenses 99.9% of gross receipts while those with over \$300,000 annual volume expended only 92.2% of gross receipts on operating costs. Salaries and wages amounted to 53% of gross receipts while cost of materials and supplies amounted to 10%. Cost of fuel and electricity was 4% of total receipts while collection and delivery expenses (including call offices) amounted to 6%. The remaining 20% was accounted for by other operating costs such as occupancy, administration, advertising, etc.

Unincorporated cleaning and dyeing plants reported operating expenses amounting to 83.7% of gross receipts but again the ratio varied by size of business. Plants with annual receipts of less than \$7,500 had and expense ratio of 79.3%, those with receipts between \$7,500 and \$10,000 operated with an expense ratio of 67.5%, expenses of firms between \$10,000 and \$15,000 amounted to 75.2% of receipts, and from here, the ratio ranged upward through the various size classes to 93.8% for those with annual rereipts of \$100,000 or over.

Salaries and wages (not including proprietors' salaries or withdrawals) amounted to 44.5% of receipts. Other expenses expressed as a percentage of total receipts were as follows: fuel and electricity, 5.0%; materials and supplies, 10.8%; collection and delivery (including call office expense), 6.3%; and other costs, such as occupancy, administration, advertising, etc., 17.1%.



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
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
