
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# LAUNDRIES, CLEANERS AND DYERS

# 1959

#### SECTION I - GENERAL SUMMARY

This report deals with the business activities of power operated laundries and dry cleaning and dyeing plants. Plants are classified as power laundries if the greater part of their revenue was derived from laundry work, and as dry cleaners and dyers if the greater part was from dry cleaning and dyeing.

The combined operations of the laundries and dry cleaning and dyeing plants established new records in 1959. Receipts reached a value of \$160,307,442, or 5.1 p.c. more than the \$152,544,693 reported in 1958. Employment increased by less than 1 p.c., from 30,979 to 31,187 and salaries and wages paid from \$72,280,096 to \$76,208,129 or 5.4 p.c. Throughout this report, salaries and wages include those paid to working executives of incorporated companies but do not include salaries or withdrawals of proprietors of unincorporated businesses.


The number of establishments rose to 1,813 in 1959, or 4.3 p.c. more than the previous year's 1,739. Cost of materials and supplies used increased by 6.6 p.c., amounting to \$17,246,692 as compared with \$16,175,650.


In 1959, revenue from laundry totalled \$48,535,322, an increase of 4.6 p.c. as compared with the corresponding figure of \$46,385,171 for

1958, of which 78 p.c. was receipts by power laundries and 22 p.c. by dry cleaning and dyeing plants. These percentages were practically the same as the previous year. Dry cleaning receipts amounted to \$88,804,594 of which 87.1 p.c. went to dry cleaners and dyers and 12.9 p.c. to power laundries (See Table 3). The amount was \$84,997,778 in 1958. The division between the two types of plants was little changed in 1959.

Compared with 1949, the 1959 figures show the expansion that has taken place during the last ten years. The number of plants has increased by 46.6 p.c. Employees have increased by 15 p.c. and their earnings are close to twice as great as ten years ago. Cost of materials and supplies used increased by 83 p.c. and total receipts has practically doubled since 1949.

Exclusive of the receipts for cleaning reported by power laundries which had no facilities for dry cleaning and cleaning plants using both petroleum and synthetic solvents, the combined revenue from dry cleaning work performed by power laundries and dry cleaning and dyeing plants amounted to \$82,152,377 (Table 4). Of this amount \$50,161,846 was the receipts of 937 plants using petroleum solvents and \$31,990,531 of 659 plants using synthetic solvents.

Note: The receipts shown in this table do not agree with receipts shown in Table 3 because the receipts of plants using both types of solvents and the receipts of power laundries that have cleaning work done by cleaning plants are omitted. The percentage distribution of receipts between petroleum using plants and synthetic using plants does not add to 100% because the receipts of plants using both types of solvents are included in the total on which the distribution is calculated.

#### SECTION II - POWER LAUNORIES

The 330 power laundries operating in 1959 reported receipts totalling \$68,095,503, an increase of 4.2 p.c. over the previous year's total of \$65,350,103 reported by 322 plants. Average receipts per plant, at \$206,350, were 1.7 p.c. above the 1958 receipts. Receipts per capita advanced to \$3.90 from \$3.83 while the number of plants per 100,000 population remained unchanged at 1.9.

With the exception of a 2.6 p.c. decrease in Nova Scotia, all provinces showed increases in receipts. Increases ranged from 9.0 p.c. in Alberta to 1.1 p.c. in Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island. Other increases were: Ontario 6.6 p.c., Manitoba 5.9 p.c., Saskatchewan 4.7 p.c., New Brunswick 2.6 p.c., British Columbia 2.5 p.c., and Quebec 1.7 p.c.

The number of persons employed in power laundries totalled 13,954, a slight decrease from the previous year, and their earnings amounted to \$33,864,341, an increase of 3.4 p.c. over 1958. The average salary, or wage, was \$2,431 compared with \$2.298 in 1958.

Of their total revenue, power laundries obtained 52.2 p.c. from laundry work (52.9 p.c. in 1958), 16.6 p.c. from dry cleaning (16.9 p.c.), 3.6 p.c. from wholesale laundry and dry cleaning (3.8 p.c.), 20.3 p.c. from coat and towel rentals (19.6 p.c.) and 7.3 p.c. from other sources (6.8 p.c.).

A classification of power laundries by size of receipts in Table 9 shows that 100 plants with an annual volume of \$200,000 or more accounted for 77.4 p.c. of the total receipts, 60 plants with a volume ranging from \$100,000 to \$199,999 accounted for 12.9 p.c., 60 plants with a volume ranging from \$50,000 to \$99,999 accounted for 6.2 p.c. and 110 plants with a volume of less than \$50,000 for 3.5 p.c.

Operating expenses of power laundries amounted to \$63,190,387, an increase of 4.2 p.c. over 1958. This percentage increase in costs was identical to the increase in total revenue. Ratios of the various expense items to receipts were very similar to those for 1958 (Table 6).

#### SECTION III - DRY CLEANING AND DYEING PLANTS

An increase of 66 plants in 1959 over 1958 brought the number of plants to 1,483, a gain of 4.7 p.c. and a new record. Receipts totalled \$92,211,939, up 5.8 p.c. over the \$87,194,590 of 1958. The average receipts per plant increased by 1.0 p.c. from \$61,535 to \$62,179. On a per capita basis, receipts averaged \$5.29, compared with \$5.11 in 1958. There were 8.5 plants per 100,000 population.

Receipts increased in all provinces except New Brunswick, Saskatchewan and Alberta where decreases were 1.5 p.c., 0.1 p.c. and 0.9 p.c. respectively. Increases ranged from 16.3 p.c. in Newfoundland to 4.2 p.c. in Prince Edward Island.

Receipts by source, expressed as percentages of total, were as follows: dry cleaning 78.8 p.c., laundry 10.9 p.c., wholesale laundry and dry cleaning 5.8 p.c. and all other sources 4.5 p.c. In 1958 these percentages were 79.1, 10.2, 6.2 and 4.5 respectively.

Of the 1,483 dry cleaning and dyeing plants operating in 1959, 203 plants whose volume of business was \$100,000 or more obtained 48.2 p.c. of total receipts, 345 plants whose volume of business ranged from \$50,000 to \$99,999 obtained 25.7 p.c. and 358 plants whose volume ranged from \$30,000 to \$49,999 obtained 15.1 p.c. The remaining 11 p.c. was obtained by 577 plants whose volume of business was less than \$30,000.

The number of persons employed by this industry in 1959 totalled 17,233, an increase of 512 over the previous year. Salaries and wages paid totalled \$42,343,788 or 7.1 p.c. more than in 1958.

Operating expenses of dry cleaning and dyeing plants in 1959 amounted to \$83,827,285, an increase of 5.8 p.c. as compared with \$79,242,780 in 1958. There was a 7.1 p.c. increase in salaries and wages, a 4.6 p.c. increase in the cost of materials and supplies used and an increase of 4.4 p.c. in all other operating expenses. Little change occurred from 1958 in the ratios of expense items to receipts as will be noted from Table 14.
