
#### SECTION I. GENERAL SUMMARY


This report deals with the business activities of power operated laundries and dry cleaning and dyeing plants. Plants are classified as power laundries if the greater part of the revenue is derived from laundry work and as dry cleaners and dyers if the greater part is from dry cleaning and dyeing.

The combined operations of laundries and dry cleaning and dyeing plants increased by 3.2 per cent in 1962. Receipts reached \$182,495,998, compared with \$176,916,640 in 1961. There were 32,043 people employed on the average during 1962. Employment statistics collected during the course of the 1961 Census are not comparable with statistics collected for 1962, the former recording the number of people employed as of the last week of November 1961, i.e., 31,477. Salaries and wages paid in 1962 were \$84,330,628, an increase of 5.0 per cent from the 1961 figure. Throughout this report, salaries and wages include those paid to working executives of incorporated companies but do not include salaries or withdrawals of proprietors of unincorporated businesses. The number of business locations fell to 2,123 in 1962 from 2,144 in 1961. The cost of materials and supplies used increased from \$17,761,249 to \$19,821,803.

In 1962, receipts from laundry totalled \$52,866,036, a significant increase from \$51,894,907 reported for 1961. Revenue from dry cleaning was \$96,956,955 for 1962, compared with \$95,562,864 for 1961. The figures show that there was a very small increase in the proportion of laundry receipts earned by dry cleaning plants. (See Table 3).

Exclusive of the receipts for cleaning reported by power laundries which have no facilities for dry cleaning and cleaning plants using both petroleum and synthetic solvents, the combined revenue from dry cleaning work performed by power laundries and dry cleaning and dyeing plants was \$86,003,306. Of this amount \$41,769,232 was the receipts of 855 plants using petroleum solvents and \$44,234,074 was the receipts of 943 plants using synthetic solvents. As in the case of the previous year, a fairly significant shift during 1962 to synthetic solvents is indicated, (See Table 4).

Note: The receipts shown in this table do not agree with receipts shown in Table 3 because the receipts of plants using both types of solvents and the receipts of power laundries that have cleaning work done by cleaning plants are omitted. The percentage distribution of receipts between petroleum using plants and synthetic using plants does not add to 100% because the receipts of plants using both types of solvents are included in the total on which the distribution is calculated.

#### SECTION II. POWER LAUNDRIES

The 367 power laundries operating in 1962 reported receipts totalling \$75,840,359, an increase of 4.9 per cent over the 1961 total of \$72,286,272 reported by 375 plants. Average receipts per plant at \$206,649 were 7.2 per cent above the 1961 figure. Receipts per capita increased to \$4.08 from \$3.96 for 1961, while the number of plants per 100,000 population indicated a very slight drop.

Three regions indicated a decrease in receipts, the greatest decrease occurring in the combined figure for Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island—15.3 per cent. Nova Scotia and Saskatchewan reported decreases of 11.2 per cent and 5.0 per cent respectively. All other regions reported an increase in receipts, the largest being 22.2 per cent for the province of New Brunswick, followed by 10.6 per cent for Quebec.

The number of persons employed in power laundries on the average was 13,942 for 1962. This statistic is not comparable with the 1961 figure which recorded employment as of the last week of November 1961 to be 13,543 persons. Salaries and wages for 1962 amounted to \$36,251,612, a significant increase from the figure of \$34,112,655 reported for 1961. The average salary or wage was \$2,600, an increase of 3.2 per cent from the figure calculated for 1961.

Of their total revenue, power laundries obtained 46.6 per cent from laundry work (47.4 per cent in 1961), 15.6 per cent from cleaning (15.3 per cent), 2.9 per cent from wholesale laundry and dry cleaning (4.2 per cent), 31.4 per cent from rental services (31.3 per cent) and 3.5 per cent from other services.

The classification of power laundries by size of receipts in Table 9 shows that 99 plants with an annual volume of \$200,000 or more accounted for 78.2 per cent of total receipts, 58 plants with a volume ranging from \$100,000 to \$199,999 accounted for 10.8 per cent, 71 plants with a volume ranging from \$50,000 to \$99,999 accounted for 6.8 per cent and the remaining plants with a volume of less than \$50,000 accounted for 4.2 per cent. It will be noted that there is little change in these ratios from year to year.

Operating expenses of power laundries amounted to \$68,286,472, an increase of 3.6 per cent from 1961. This represented 90.0 per cent of receipts of power laundries, compared with 91.1 per cent for the previous year. Ratios of the various expense items to receipts were very similar to those for 1961, Salaries and wages tended to take more of total receipts and the same can be said for cost of materials and supplies used. Fuel and electricity expense showed a small decrease. (See Table 6).

### SECTION III. DRY CLEANING AND DYEING PLANTS

The 1962 survey recorded 1,756 plants, 13 less than covered in 1961. Receipts totalled \$106,655,639, an increase of 2.1 per cent over the 1961 figure. The average receipts per plant increased to \$60,738 from \$59,147. On a per capita basis, receipts averaged \$5.74, practically identical with the 1961 figure. There were 9.5 plants per 100,000 population, also practically identical with the figure for the previous year.

Receipts increased in all but three provinces. New Brunswick had a 14.3 per cent decrease and Manitoba and British Columbia showed 0.3 per cent and 2.8 per cent decreases respectively. The largest provincial increase occurred in Newfoundland — 11.9 per cent, followed by an increase of 7.6 per cent in Prince Edward Island.

Receipts by source, expressed as percentages of total, were as follows: dry cleaning 74.9 per cent, laundry 13.8 per cent, wholesale laundry and dry cleaning 5.5 per cent, rental services 2.7 per cent, all other receipts 3.1 per cent. In 1961 these percentages were quite similar, i.e., 75.5 per cent, 13.1 per cent, 5.5 per cent, 2.7 per cent and 3.2 per cent, respectively.

Of the 1,756 dry cleaning and dyeing plants operating in 1962, 238 plants whose volume of business was \$100,000 or more obtained 46.9 per cent of total receipts, 423 plants whose volume ranged from \$50,000 to \$99,999 obtained 27.4 per cent and 401 plants whose volume ranged from \$30,000 to \$49,999 obtained 14.5 per cent. The remaining 11.2 per cent of total revenue was obtained by 694 plants with a volume of less than \$30,000 in 1962.

The number of people employed on the average during 1962 was 18,101, a figure not comparable with the statistic for 1961 which represented the number of persons employed as of the last week of November and was recorded as 17,934 persons.

Operating expenses of dry cleaning and dyeing plants in 1962 amounted to \$96,835,796, an increase of 3.1 per cent over 1961. The ratio of operating expenses to receipts was 90.8 per cent, compared with 89.9 per cent for 1961. The average wages per employee increased by 3.2 per cent from \$2,574 in 1961 to \$2,656 in 1962. Little change occurred from 1961 to 1962 in the ratios of the individual expense items to receipts as will be noted from Table 14.
