
SECTION I. GENERAL SUMMARY


This report deals with the business activities of power operated laundries and dry cleaning and dyeing plants. Plants are classified as power laundries if the greater part of the revenue is derived from laundry work and as dry cleaners and dyers if the greater part is from dry cleaning and dyeing.

The combined operations of laundries and dry cleaning and dyeing plants increased by 5.2 per cent in 1963. Receipts reached \$192,005,867, compared with 182,495,998 in 1962. There were 31,747 people employed on the average during 1963, versus 32,043 in 1962. Salaries and wages paid in 1963 were \$88,161,127, an increase of 4.5 per cent from the 1962 figure. Throughout this report, salaries and wages include those paid to working executives of incorporated companies but do not include salaries or withdrawals of proprietors of unincorporated businesses. The number of business locations increased by 40 plants to 2,163 in 1963 from 2,123 in 1962. The cost of materials and supplies used increased from \$19,821,803 to \$20,294,295.

In 1963, receipts from laundry, totalled \$54,661,164, a significant increase from \$52,866,036 reported for 1962. Revenue from dry cleaning was \$102,259,492 for 1963 substantially higher when compared with \$96,956,955 for 1962. There was a slight increase (approximately 4.0 per cent) in the proportion of laundry receipts earned by dry cleaning plants. (See Table 3).

Exclusive of the receipts for cleaning reported by power laundries which have no facilities for dry cleaning and cleaning plants using both petroleum and synthetic solvents, the combined revenue from dry cleaning work performed by power laundries and dry cleaning and dyeing plants was \$89,727,118. Of this amount \$40,508,355 was the receipts of 826 plants using petroleum solvents and \$49,218,763 was the receipts of 1,020 plants using synthetic solvents. As in the case of the previous year, a significant shift during 1963 to synthetic solvents is evident. (See Table 4).

Note: The receipts shown in this table do not agree with receipts shown in Table 3 because the receipts of plants using both types of solvents and the receipts of power laundries that have cleaning work done by cleaning plants are omitted. The percentage distribution of receipts between petroleum using plants and synthetic using plants does not add to 100% because the receipts of plants using both types of solvents are included in the total on which the distribution is calculated.

SECTION II. POWER LAUNDRIES

The 367 power laundries operating in 1963 reported receipts totalling \$79,294,604, an increase of 4.6 per cent over the 1962 total of \$75,840,359 reported by the same number of plants. Average receipts per plant at \$216,062 were 4.6 per cent above the 1962 figure. Receipts per capita increased to \$4.20 from \$4.08 for 1962, while the number of plants per 100,000 population indicated a very slight drop.

Five regions showed a decrease in receipts, the greatest decrease occurring in the amount for New Brunswick or 13.4 per cent. Manitoba and Saskatchewan reported decreases of 6.7 per cent and 6.9 per cent respectively. The corresponding declines in Quebec and Alberta were slight or 2.6 per cent and 0.2 per cent respectively. All other regions reported an increase in receipts. the largest being 17.6 per cent in the combined figure for Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, followed by 14.9 per cent for Ontario.

The number of persons employed in power laundries on the average was 13,701 for 1963 versus 13,942 for 1962. Salaries and wages for 1963 amounted to \$37,565,355 a slight increase from the figure of \$36,251,612 reported for 1962. The average salary or wage per employee was \$2,742, an increase of 5.5 per cent from the figure calculated for 1962.

Of their total revenue, power laundries obtained 43.3 per cent from laundry work (46.6 per cent in 1962), 14.7 per cent from cleaning (15.6 per cent in 1962), 3.1 per cent from wholesale laundry and dry cleaning (2.9 per cent), 37.4 per cent from rental services (31.4 per cent) and 1.5 per cent from all other services.

The classification of power laundries by size of receipts in Table 9 shows that 103 plants with an annual volume of \$200,000 or more accounted for 79.8 per cent of total receipts, 57 plants with a volume ranging from \$100,000 to \$199,999 accounted for 9.9 per cent, 67 plants with a volume ranging from \$50,000 to \$99,999 accounted for 6.1 per cent and the remaining plants with a volume of less then \$50,000 accounted for 4.2 per cent. It will be noted that there is little change in these ratios from year to year.

Operating expenses of power laundries amounted to \$72,637,004, an increase of 6.4 per cent from 1962. This represented 91.6 per cent of receipts of power laundries, compared with 90.0 per cent for the previous year. Ratios of the various expense items to receipts were very similar to those for 1962, (See Table 6).

SECTION III. DRY CLEANING AND DYEING PLANTS

The 1963 survey recorded 1,796 plants, 40 more than covered in 1962. Receipts totalled \$112,711,263, an increase of 5.7 per cent over the 1962 figure. The average receipts per plant increased by 3.3 per cent to \$62,756 from \$60,738. On a per capita basis, receipts averaged \$5.96, 3.8 per cent more than in 1962. There were 9.5 plants per 100,000 population, no change from the figure for the previous year.

Receipts increased in all but one province. Only Saskatchewan showed a very slight decrease of 0.9 per cent. The largest provincial increase occurred in Prince Edward Island, 22.6 per cent, followed by New Brunswick and Manitoba with increases of 21.1 per cent and 17.0 per cent respectively.

Receipts by source, expressed as percentages of total, were as follows: dry cleaning 75.4 per cent, laundry 15.1 per cent, wholesale laundry and dry cleaning 5.8 per cent, rental services 0.6 per cent, all other receipts 3.1 per cent. In 1962 these percentages were quite similar, i.e., 74.9 per cent,

13.8 per cent, 5.5 per cent, 2.7 per cent and 3.1 per cent, respectively.

Of the 1,796 dry cleaning and dyeing plants operating in 1963, 262 plants whose volume of business was \$100,000 or more obtained 47.6 per cent of total receipts, 456 plants whose volume ranged from \$50,000 to \$99,999 obtained 27.8 per cent and 425 plants whose volume ranged from \$30,000 to \$49,999 obtained 14.6 per cent. The remaining 10.0 per cent of total revenue was obtained by 653 plants with a volume of business of less than \$30,000 in 1963.

The number of people employed on the average during 1963 was 18,046, compared with 18,101 employed in 1962. Operating expenses of dry cleaning and dyeing plants in 1963 amounted to \$101,593,589, an increase of 4.9 per cent over 1962. The ratio of operating expenses to receipts was 90.1 per cent, compared with 90.8 per cent for 1962, The average wages per employee increased by 5.9 per cent from \$2,656 in 1962 to \$2,813 in 1963. Little change occurred from 1962 to 1963 in the ratios of the individual expense items to receipts as will be noted from Table 14.
