POWER LAUNDRIES, DRY CLEANING AND DYEING PLANTS 1964

SECTION I. GENERAL SUMMARY


This report deals with the business activities of power operated laundries and dry cleaning and dyeing plants. Plants are classified as power laundries if the greater part of the revenue is derived from laundry work and as dry cleaners and dyers if the greater part is from dry cleaning and dyeing.


The combined operations of laundries and dry cleaning and dyeing plants increased by 8.3 per cent in 1964. Receipts reached \$207,998,771, compared with \$192,005,867 in 1963. There were 32,503 people employed on the average during 1964, versus 31,747 in 1963. Salaries and wages paid in 1964 were \$96,314,309, an increase of 9.2 per cent from the 1963 figure. Throughout this report, salaries and wages include those paid to working executives of incorporated companies but do not include salaries or withdrawals of proprietors of unincorporated businesses. The number of business locations increased by 25 plants to 2,188 in 1964 from 2,163 in

1963. The cost of materials and supplies used increased from \$20,294,295 to \$21,573,509.

In 1964, receipts from laundry, totalled \$60,255,936, a significant increase from \$54,661,164 reported for 1963. Revenue from dry cleaning was \$110,659,522 for 1964, substantially higher when compared with \$102,259,492 for 1963.

Exclusive of the receipts for cleaning reported by power laundries which have no facilities for dry cleaning and receipts of cleaning plants using both petroleum and synthetic solvents, the combined revenue from dry cleaning work performed by power laundries and dry cleaning and dyeing plants was \$97,462,778. Of this amount \$42,591,701 was the receipts of 794 plants using petroleum solvents and \$54,871,077 was the receipts of 1,088 plants using synthetic solvents. As in the case of the previous year, a significant shift during 1964 to synthetic solvents is evident. (See Table 4).

Note: The receipts shown in this table do not agree with receipts shown in Table 3 because the receipts of plants using both types of solvents and the receipts of power laundries that have cleaning work done by cleaning plants are omitted. The percentage distribution of receipts between petroleum using plants and synthetic using plants does not add to 100% because the receipts of plants using both types of solvents are included in the total on which the distribution is calculated.

SECTION II. POWER LAUNDRIES

The 362 power laundries operating in 1964 reported receipts totalling \$85,249,180, an increase of 7.5 per cent over the 1963 total of \$79,294,604 reported by 367 plants. Average receipts per plant at \$235,495 were 9.0 per cent above the 1963 figure. Receipts per capita increased to \$4.43 from \$4.20 for 1963 (5.5 per cent), while the number of plants per 100,000 population indicated no change.

Two provinces showed a decrease in receipts. The greatest decrease occurred in Nova Scotia, i.e., 5.3 per cent, followed by 4.2 per cent for New Brunswick. All other regions reported an increase in receipts. The largest increase was 23.8 per cent for Alberta, followed by 12.4 per cent for Saskatchewan and 9.8 per cent and 6.8 per cent for British Columbia and Ontario, respectively. The smallest improvement was recorded in the combined figure for Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island or 3.0 per cent.

The number of persons employed in power laundries on the average was 13,815 for 1964 versus 13,701 for 1963. Salaries and wages for 1964 amounted to \$40,919,190, a substantial increase from the figure of \$37,565,355 reported for 1963. The average salary or wage per employee was \$2,962, an increase of 8.0 per cent from the figure calculated for 1963.

Of their total revenue, power laundries obtained 41.6 per cent from laundry work (43.3 per cent in 1963), 15.2 per cent from cleaning (14.7 per cent), 3.1 per cent from wholesale laundry and dry cleaning (no change from 1963), 38.1 per cent from rental services (37.4 per cent) and 2.0 per cent from all other services.

The classification of power laundries by size of receipts in Table 9 shows that 104 plants with an annual volume of \$200,000 or more accounted for 81.0 per cent of total receipts, 53 plants with a volume ranging from \$100,000 to \$199,999 accounted for 8.8 per cent, 78 plants with a volume ranging from \$50,000 to \$99,999 accounted for 6.5 per cent and the remaining plants with a volume of less than \$50,000 accounted for 3.7 per cent. It will be noted that there is little change in these ratios from year to year.

Operating expenses of power laundries amounted to \$78,866,872, an increase of 8.6 per cent from 1963. This represented 92.5 per cent of receipts of power laundries, compared with 91.6 per cent for the previous year. Ratios of the various expense items to receipts were very similar to those for 1963. (See Table 6).

SECTION III. DRY CLEANING AND DYEING PLANTS

The 1964 survey recorded 1,826 plants, 30 more than in 1963. Receipts totalled \$122,749,531, an increase of 8.9 per cent over the 1963 figure. The average receipts per plant increased by 7.1 per cent to \$67,223 from \$62,756. On a per capita basis, receipts averaged \$6.38, 7.0 per cent more than in 1963. There were 9.5 plants per 100,000 population, no change from the figure for the previous year.

Receipts increased in all but two provinces. Prince Edward Island and Alberta recorded decreased receipts of 3.9 per cent and 0.5 per cent, respectively. The largest provincial increase occurred in Saskatchewan, i.e., 14.0 per cent, followed by Nova Scotia with 13.5 per cent, and Ontario and British Columbia with 11.5 per cent and 9.4 per cent, respectively.

Receipts by source, expressed as percentages of the total were as follows: dry cleaning 74.7 per cent, laundry 15.7 per cent, wholesale laundry and dry cleaning 5.7 per cent, rental services 0.7 per cent, all other receipts 3.2 per cent. In 1963 these percentages were quite similar, i.e., 75.4 per cent,

15.1 per cent, 5.8 per cent, 0.6 per cent and 3.1 per cent, respectively.

Of the 1,826 dry cleaning and dyeing plants operating in 1964, 293 plants whose volume of business was \$100,000 or more obtained 49.1 per cent of total receipts, 495 plants whose volume ranged from \$50,000 to \$99,999 obtained 28.2 per cent and 429 plants whose volume ranged from \$30,000 to \$49,999 obtained 13.8 per cent. The remaining 8.9 per cent of total revenue was obtained by 609 plants with a volume of business of less than \$30,000 in 1964.

The number of people employed on the average during 1964 was 18,688, compared with 18,046 employed in 1963. Operating expenses of dry cleaning and dyeing plants in 1964 amounted to \$110,049,974, an increase of 8.3 per cent over 1963. The ratio of operating expenses to receipts was 89.6 per cent, compared with 90.1 per cent for 1963. The average wages per employee increased by 5.4 per cent from \$2,813 in 1963 to \$2,964 in 1964. Changes from 1963 to 1964 in the ratios of the individual expense items to receipts may be examined in Table 14.
