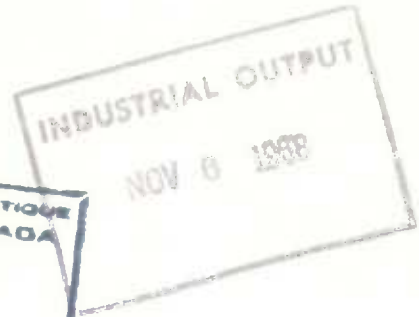
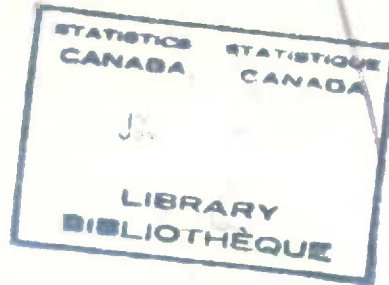

SECTION I. GENERAL SUMMARY

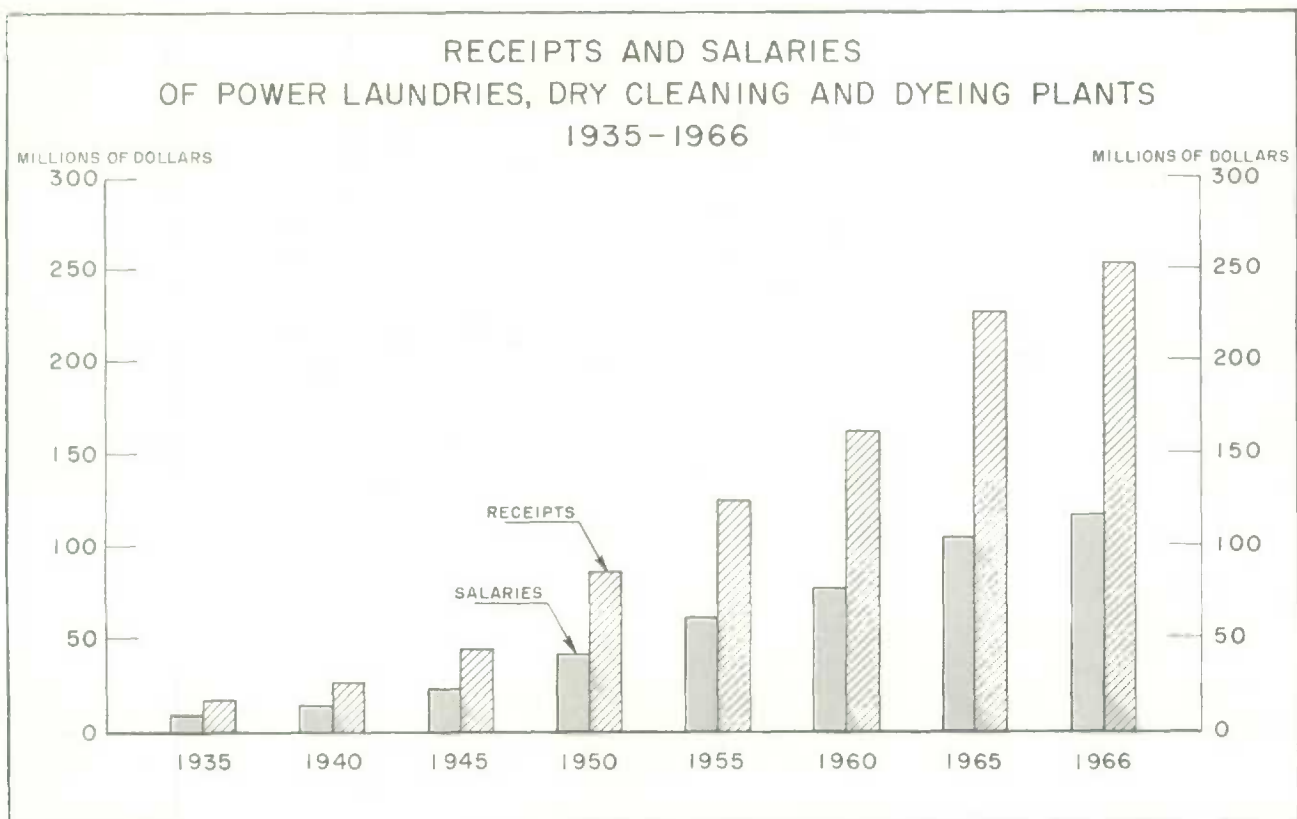
This report deals with the business activities of power operated laundries and dry cleaning and dyeing plants. Plants are classified as power laundries if the greater part of the revenue is derived from laundry work and as dry cleaners and dyers if the greater part is from dry cleaning and dyeing.

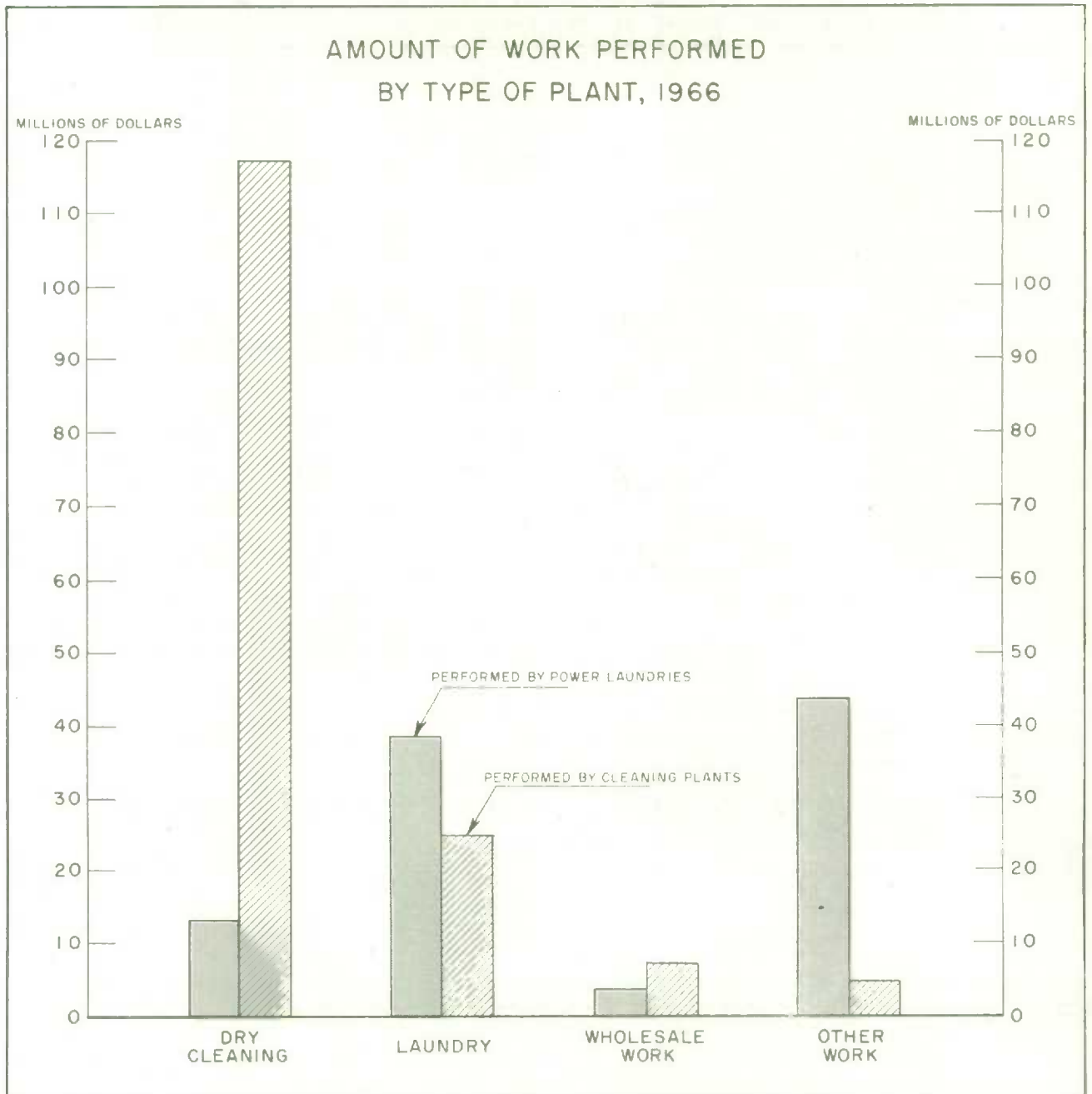
The combined operations of laundries and dry cleaning and dyeing plants increased by 11.8 per cent in 1966. Receipts reached \$253,311,429 compared with \$226,547,054 in 1965. There were 35,433 people employed on the average during 1966, versus 33,654 in 1965. Salaries and wages paid in 1966 were \$116,681,656, an increase of 11.6 per cent from the 1965 figure. Throughout this report, salaries and wages include those paid to working executives of incorporated companies but do not include salaries or withdrawals of proprietors of unincorporated businesses. The number of business locations increased by 222 plants to 2,470 in 1966

from 2,248 in 1965. The cost of materials and supplies used increased from \$22,650,779 to \$24,990,210.

In 1966, receipts from laundry totalled \$68,407,711, an increase from \$62,600,631 reported in 1965. Revenue from dry cleaning was \$136,281,625 for 1966, substantially higher when compared with \$122,461,047 for 1965.

Exclusive of the receipts for cleaning reported by power laundries which have no facilities for dry cleaning and receipts of cleaning plants using both petroleum and synthetic solvents, the combined revenue from dry cleaning work performed by power laundries and dry cleaning and dyeing plants was \$123,209,777. Of this amount \$46,131,647 was the receipts of 711 plants using petroleum solvents and \$77,078,130 was the receipts of 1,446 plants using synthetic solvents. As in the case of the previous year a significant shift during 1966 to synthetic solvents is evident.

Note: The receipts shown in this table do not agree with receipts shown in Table 3 because the receipts of plants using both types of solvents and the receipts of power laundries that have cleaning work done by cleaning plants are omitted. The percentage distribution of receipts between petroleum using plants and synthetic using plants does not add to 100% because the receipts of plants using both types of solvents are included in the total on which the distribution is calculated.

SECTION II. POWER LAUNDRIES

The 363 power laundries operating in 1966 reported receipts totalling \$99,421,169, an increase of 10.9 per cent over the 1965 total of \$89,689,808, reported by 352 plants. Average receipts per plant at \$273,888 were 7.5 per cent above the 1965 figure. Receipts per capita increased by 8.5 per cent, to \$4.97 from \$4.58 for 1965, while the number of plants per 100,000 population remained the same at 1.8. Among the provinces, only Nova Scotia showed a decrease in receipts (9.6 per cent). All other regions reported an increase in receipts. The largest increase was 28.2 per cent for New Brunswick, followed by 17.2 per cent for Manitoba, and 16.2 per cent and 15.1 per cent for British Columbia and Quebec, respectively. The smallest improvement was recorded for Alberta at 0.7 per cent.

The number of persons employed in power laundries on the average was 14,054 for 1966 versus 13,767 for 1965. Salaries and wages for 1966 amounted to \$46,350,537, an increase from the figure of \$42,213,066 reported for 1965. The average salary or wage per employee was \$3,298 an increase of 7.2 per cent from the figure calculated for 1965.

Of their total revenue, power laundries obtained 38.8 per cent from laundry work (40.3 per cent in 1965), 13.4 per cent from cleaning (15.0 per cent), 42.5 per cent from rental services (39.6 per cent) and 1.6 per cent from all other services.

The classification of power laundries by size of receipts in Table 9 shows that 109 plants with an annual volume of \$200,000 or more accounted for 82.2 per cent of total receipts, 68 plants with a volume ranging from \$100,000 to \$199,999 accounted for 9.6 per cent, 65 plants with a volume ranging from \$50,000 to \$99,999 accounted for 5.0 per cent and the remaining plants with a volume of less than \$50,000 accounted for 3.2 per cent. It will be noted that there is little change in these ratios from year to year.

Operating expenses of power laundries amounted to \$92,327,094, an increase of 12.4 per cent from 1965. This represented 92.9 per cent of receipts of power laundries, compared with 91.6 per cent for the previous year.

SECTION III. DRY CLEANING AND DYEING PLANTS

The 1966 survey recorded 2,107 plants, 211 more than in 1965. Receipts totalled \$153,890,260 an increase of 12.4 per cent over the 1965 figure. The average receipts per plant increased by 1.2 per cent to \$73,038 from \$72,182. On a per capita basis, receipts averaged \$7.69, 9.9 per cent more than in 1965. There were 10.5 plants per 100,000 population, compared with 9.7 for the previous year.

Receipts increased in all provinces except Manitoba which recorded a decrease of 3.5 per cent. The largest provincial increase occurred in British Columbia, i.e., 20.5 per cent, followed by Quebec with 16.5 per cent, Nova Scotia with 13.7 per cent, and Alberta and Saskatchewan with 13.4 per cent and 13.1% respectively. The smallest increase was reported in Prince Edward Island at 4.2 per cent.

Receipts by source, expressed as percentages of the total were as follows: dry cleaning 76.2 per cent, laundry 16.1 per cent, wholesale laundry and dry cleaning 4.6 per cent, rental services 0.5 per cent, all other receipts 2.6 per cent. In 1965 these percentages were quite similar, i.e., 76.2 per cent,

16.2 per cent, 4.2 per cent, 0.5 per cent and 2.9 per cent, respectively.

Of the 2,107 dry cleaning and dyeing plants operating in 1966, 373 plants whose volume of business was \$100,000 or more obtained 51.1 per cent of total receipts, 638 plants whose volume ranged from \$50,000 to \$99,999 obtained 28.7 per cent and 510 plants whose volume ranged from \$30,000 to \$49,999 obtained 13.1 per cent. The remaining 7.1 per cent of total revenue was obtained by 586 plants with a volume of business of less than \$30,000 in 1966.

The number of people employed on the average during 1966 was 21,379, compared with 19,887 employed in 1965. Operating expenses of dry cleaning and dyeing plants in 1966 amounted to \$137,832,748 an increase of 12.5 per cent over 1965. The ratio of operating expenses to receipts was 89.6 per cent, compared with 89.5 per cent for 1965. The average wage per employee increased by 4.9 per cent from \$3,137 in 1965 to \$3,290 in 1966. Changes from 1965 to 1966 in the ratios of the individual expense items to receipts may be examined in Table 14.
