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

#### MAY 1970

Special Note Regarding Comparability of 1968 to 1970 Estimates with Previous Years

The data obtained in the 1968 to 1970 Surveys of Household Facilities and Equipment were weighted up to estimates of total households based on projections from the 1966 Census count of households. The projections of total households used for weighting the surveys carried out from 1962 to 1967, inclusive, were based on 1961 Census counts. Data from the 1968 to 1970 surveys are, therefore, not fully comparable with the originally published data from 1962 to 1967. To provide greater comparability with 1967, estimates derived from the 1967 survey were revised to the 1966 Census base and were published in Appendix "A" of the 1968 report.

Revised estimates of total households for the years 1962 to 1966 and of the data from the 1966 survey have been prepared and are available on request.

#### I. INTRODUCTION

This report presents statistics derived from the latest in the series of annual sample surveys on household facilities and equipment. The survey was carried out in conjunction with the May 1970 Labour Force Survey; about 30,000 households, chosen by area sampling methods in about 450 areas, were included in the sample.

There were several changes from 1969 in the content of the survey questionnaire. Questions on floor polishers, lawn mowers and outboard motors, last used in 1968, were included again this year. The 1969 questions on vacuum cleaners and sewing machines were not used in the 1970 survey.

#### II. CONTENTS OF THE TABLES

The tables in this report contain data for Canada as a whole and, except for Tables 1, 5, 6, 8 and 10, the provinces. Following is a summary by broad groupings of the characteristics covered in the tables:

#### **III. OTHER DATA AVAILABLE**

In addition to the published statistics, there are other data available. Following is a list of unpublished material which can be obtained on request:

#### A. Canada as a whole

## IV. COVERAGE

The sample for this survey is designed to represent all households in Canada with certain exceptions. Excluded are: households in the Yukon and Northwest Territories; households on Indian reserves; institutional households; military camps; other collective-type households such as those living in hotels, large lodging houses, clubs, logging and construction camps; certain private households living in trailers, in summer cottages, on boats, etc.

#### V. DEFINITIONS

<u>Dwelling</u>. - A dwelling is defined as a structurally separate set of living premises with private entrance from outside the building, or from a common hallway or stairway inside.

<u>Household</u>. – A person or a group of persons occupying one dwelling unit is defined as a "household". The number of households will therefore be equal to the number of occupied dwellings.

<u>Single detached dwelling</u>. — This type of dwelling is commonly called a single house, i.e., a house containing one dwelling unit and completely separated on all sides from any other building or structure.

Single attached dwelling. - Each half of a semi-detached (or double) house, and each section of a row or terrace is defined as a "single attached" dwelling.

Apartment or flat. - This type of dwelling includes:

- (i) dwelling units in apartment blocks or apartment hotels;
- (ii) suites in duplexes or triplexes, i.e., where the division between dwelling units is horizontal;
- (iii) suites in structurally converted houses;
- (iv) living quarters located above, or in the rear of stores, restuarants, garages, or other business premises;
  - (\*) janitors' quarters in schools, churches, warehouses, etc.; and
- (vi) private quarters for employees in hospitals or other types of institutions.

<u>Rooms</u>. — In determining the number of rooms in a dwelling, only those rooms used or suitable for living purposes, including rooms occupied by servants, lodgers, or members of lodging families, are counted. The following are not counted as rooms: bathrooms, pantries, halls, clothes closets, and rooms used solely for business purposes. Summer kitchens, sunrooms, rooms in basements or attics are not counted unless they are finished off and suitable for living quarters throughout the year. "Kitchenettes" are counted if the normal kitchen functions are carried out therein and if they contain, as a minimum, cooking facilities (such as a stove or range) and a sink or tub.

<u>Bedrooms</u>. - Included as "bedrooms" are all rooms designed and furnished as bedrooms, and used as such, even though the use may be occasional as in the case of a "spare" bedroom. Bed-sitting rooms, or other such rooms used for sleeping and living, are not included. In the case of all one-room dwelling's, such as bachelor apartments, and of many other small dwellings, no "bedroom" would be reported.

#### VI. RELIABILITY OF ESTIMATES

In estimates in this report are based on a sample of households and may differ from the figures that would have been obtained if a complete census had been taken using the same schedules, instructions and enumerators. In general, the smaller the size of the estimate the greater is the relative sampling variability. The sampling variability associated with estimates of less than 4,000 is appreciably larger than fifty per cent. In the tables, estimates which are less than 4,000 are replaced by an asterisk.

Differences from year to year in corresponding estimates are themselves subject to a variability which is dependent on the sizes of the estimates, their inherent variability, and the interdependence of the samples used. In the Survey of Household Facilities and Equipment the samples from year to year differ in the households enumerated and, in some cases, in the geographical areas included in the sample. The estimates as here published constitute the best 1970 estimates of the numbers of households and their characteristics. However, differences between successive years, especially for smaller provinces in matters where the change has been small, are subject to substantial sampling variation.

A factor which greatly increased the sampling variability on estimates of yearto-year change in the period 1963 to 1966 was the introduction of a new sample design. New samples of improved design were brought into use for Newfoundland, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and British Columbia between the 1965 and 1966 surveys. New samples had been introduced in Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Quebec between the 1964 and 1965 surveys, and in Alberta between the 1963 and 1964 surveys. Comparison of estimates for particular provinces and for Canada as a whole will be affected by the absence of interdependence of the respective samples between the years mentioned.

In addition to the sampling variability outlined above, the data obtained from either a sample or a census will differ from the actual data because of enumerator and respondent variations. The principal elements of this nature are as follows:

- 1. The enumerator may misinterpret the concepts and definitions despite careful instruction.
- 2. The enumerator may, by chance, phrase questions which influence the answers of the respondent.
- 3. The respondent may, by chance, phrase answers which influence the questions by the enumerator.
- 4. There may be deliberate mis-statement by either enumerator or respondent.

The non-sampling error is as prevalent in a complete count as in a sample, and, in some cases, may exceed the error introduced by sampling.
