
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

Preliminary Statement of Canadian International Trade (H.S. Based)

March 1990

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Note to Readers

The analysis of first quarter data, which usually appears with the March publication of data, will be presented with April publication, at the time of historical revisions and the linking of export series of American data.

This issue of the *Preliminary Statement of Canadian International Trade* is the last in which the base year for the trade price indexes, the trade volume indexes and the constant dollar trade values will be 1981. As of the June 15 release of the April 1990 *Preliminary*, the base year for these series will be 1986.

The April *Preliminary* will contain a technical note regarding the calculation of link factors to relate the 1981=100 series to the new 1986=100 series.

The historical 1981=100 series up to March 1990 will continue to be available on CANSIM. New matrices containing the 1986=100 series from January 1986 onward will be released on June 15. The descriptions and numbers for these new matrices are as follows:

HIGHLIGHTS

- Exports climbed 1.9% in March.
- Imports edged down 1.7% from February.
- The trade surplus totalled \$471 million in March.
- The short-term export trend continued to climb in February for the fifth consecutive month. The import trend rose marginally, after remaining flat in January and December.
- Exports of passenger vehicles soared by \$345 million, whereas exports of forestry products plunged \$110 million.
- The trade surplus with the United States totalled \$995 million, an increase of \$152 million over the preceding month.

Monthly Summary


Strong sales to the United States pushed total exports to \$11.9 billion in March, an increase of 1.9% over the previous month. This is the third consecutive monthly increase this year. Preliminary data indicate that growth in the American economy continued at a moderate rate in the first quarter of 1990. Expenditure on durable goods and capital investment rebounded strongly from the fourth quarter of 1989. The strength in certain sectors of the American economy parallels an increase in exports to the United States of \$ 276 million in March.

Exports of automotive products registered the largest growth in March, increasing by more than \$600 million compared to February. Following temporary plant closures early in 1990, Canadian production is gradually expanding as inventory levels decline. Also, a recovery in American motor vehicle production in March resulted in a rise of close to \$150 million in Canadian automotive parts exports.


Wheat exports, which dropped off slightly in February, edged up to close to \$400 million in March.

Contrasting with the 5.3% increase in February, imports in March fell by 1.7%, to total \$11.4 billion. Imports from Japan and the E.E.C. showed the sharpest drops, whereas imports from the United States rose marginally.

With the exception of automotive product imports which posted an increase of over 13%, imports of most major commodity groupings were somewhat lower than those posted in February. The sharpest decreases occurred in imports of machinery and equipment (-5.5%), and crude petroleum (-23.5%). In February, Canadian imports of crude petroleum registered over \$500 million, their highest level since February 1982.



Thus, Canada's merchandise trade balance in March posted a \$471 million surplus, up \$418 million from February. The trade balances for February and January were \$53 million and \$575 million respectively. The increase in March is attributable to trade with the United States. Canada's merchandise trade surplus with the United States climbed from \$842 million in February to \$995 million in March.




Short-Term Trend

The short-term trend is a weighted moving average of thirteen terms, and it is therefore possible that the seasonally-adjusted series may not point in the same direction as the short-term trend. In addition, the trend for the last month is not presented and does not form part of the analysis since it frequently undergoes extensive change with the inclusion of data for the following month. (For further details on the methodology used to calculate the short-term trend, please refer to the January 1989 issue of this bulletin.)

Exports

The short-term trend for exports increased in February for the fifth consecutive month, climbing by 0.3%, the same rate as was posted in January 1990 and December 1989.

- The February trend for exports climbed for the United States (0.4%), Japan (0.6%) and "Other countries" (2.3%), but fell for the United Kingdom (-0.3%), "Other E.E.C. countries" (-2.4%) and "Other O.E.C.D. countries" (-2.6%).
- The trend for exports of machinery and equipment continued to be firm, rising by 3.1% in February compared to 3.3% in January. The trend for industrial machinery exports alone increased by 3.8%.




- Growth in the wheat export trend, which has been falling off steadily since September 1989, slipped from 8.2% in January to 6.6% in February.
- The trends for exports of woodpulp and lumber slipped by 2.0% and 1.9% respectively.

Imports

The short-term trend for imports rose moderately in February (0.2%), after remaining steady in January and December 1989.

- Increases were registered in the trends for imports from the United Kingdom (1.7%), "Other E.E.C. countries" (1.1%), Japan (1.9%), "Other O.E.C.D. countries" (1.7%), and "Other countries" (0.2%). Conversely, there was a slight softening in the trend for imports from the United States (-0.2%).
- Energy products registered the sharpest growth in terms of trends, advancing by 5.5% over the preceding month. The comparable January figure was 6.1%. The increase for crude petroleum was 7.4% in February.
- The trend for automobile imports continued to edge up in February, rising by 1.4% from the January figure of 1.1%.
- The import trend in February which registered the greatest drop was automotive parts (-1.6%), down from the rate recorded in January (-3.2%).




Detailed Analysis by Commodities and Trading Partners

The use of American imports from Canada as a measure of Canadian exports to the United States has improved the coverage of Canadian exports on a customs basis. Prior to January 1990, balance of payment adjustments were used to reconcile statistics between Canada and the United States, thus eliminating differences at the total level. The use of American data beginning in January 1990 has eliminated the problem of undercoverage of Canadian exports within each commodity grouping. However, because of the change in methodology, caution should be exercised in interpreting the movements within certain individual export series between fourth quarter 1989 and first quarter 1990. A revision to total exports was made for the March publication of data; commodity detail will be available at the time of April publication.

Commodities

Following increases of \$59 million in February and \$120 million in January, exports rose by \$218 million in March. The following are the principal factors contributing to the movement in total exports in March.

Exports of automotive products climbed \$632 million in March, compared to an increase of \$281 million in February. Exports of passenger vehicles alone rose \$345 million. The turnaround in automotive exports coincides with the recovery in vehicle production and sales in the United States, as car manufacturers offered substantial discounts on the purchase of specific models. Also, a marked decline was noted in inventory levels, thus causing a drop in the ratio of stocks to sales. Exports of automotive parts gained almost \$150 million to total



\$880 million, while exports of trucks rose \$138 million to reach \$738 million.

Exports of machinery and equipment other than those listed in the commodity groupings registered \$1.3 billion, an increase of \$136 million compared to February. This growth was partly offset by decreases in exports of industrial and agricultural machinery (-\$44 million) and aircraft and other transportation equipment (-\$37 million).


Exports of wheat, which dropped sharply in February, gained \$55 million to reach a level of \$394 million. Wheat exports for the first quarter totalled \$1.1 billion, up \$376 million from the first quarter of 1989, when levels were down as the result of the 1988 drought.

Forestry product exports plunged by \$110 million. Exports of lumber, woodpulp and newsprint fell by \$35 million, \$32 million and \$43 million respectively.

The application of seasonal factors to series showing discontinuities will result in distorted rates of increase in the comparison of current to previous period's data. As such, the category "Unallocated adjustments" was revised to attenuate the discontinuity, resulting in a drop of almost half a billion dollars in March.

Imports totalled \$11.4 billion, down \$200 million, following the February increase of \$581 million. The movement in total imports is attributable to the following factors.

Imports of machinery and equipment slid by more than \$200 million. Decreases were registered in imports of industrial and agricultural machinery (-\$54 million), imports of office machines and equipment (-\$44 million) and machinery and equipment imports other than those listed in the commodity groupings (-\$140 million). In spite of these declines, imports of machinery and equip-



ment exceeded the \$3.5 billion level and accounted for over 31% of total imports.

Imports of crude petroleum dropped by \$123 million in March to total \$400 million, while February imports of crude petroleum had totalled \$523 million, a new high. In spite of the marked drop noted in March, crude petroleum imports remain above the 1989 mean by close to \$100 million.

Automotive product imports posted the largest increase, gaining \$331 million compared to February. Imports of passenger automobiles rose by \$188 million to total \$1.1 billion. Imports of automotive parts and trucks climbed by \$112 million and \$31 million respectively.

Trading Partners

Exports to the United States climbed by \$276 million to \$8.9 billion. For the first quarter of 1990, exports to the United States totalled \$26.2 billion, up 0.5% from


the \$26.1 billion level recorded in the fourth quarter of 1989.

Exports to the E.E.C. and Japan rose marginally by \$11 million and \$4 million respectively, whereas exports to "Other O.E.C.D. countries" and "Other countries" edged down \$44 million and \$29 million respectively.

Imports from the United States totalled \$7.9 billion, an increase of \$124 million over February. Imports for the first quarter of 1990 totalled \$23.2 billion, down \$414 million from the fourth quarter of 1989.

The increase in imports from the United States is more than offset by decreases in imports from Japan (-\$133 million), the E.E.C. (-\$106 million), "Other O.E.C.D. countries" (-\$53 million) and "Other countries" (-\$33 million).

Canada's merchandise trade surplus with the United States totalled \$995 million in March, an increase of \$152 million from the preceding month.




