

Current Account data, which incorporate merchandise trade statistics as well as data concerning trade in services and capital account movements, are available on a quarterly basis in Canada's balance of international payments (cat. no. 67-001).

HIGHUIGHUS

- Exports decreased marginally (-\$19 million) to \$11.2 billion and imports dropped by \$480 million to \$10.0 billion.
- Lower exports of machinery and equipment and crude petroleum were almost entirely
 offset by increases for automotive products.
- Widespread declines in imports, particularly for machinery and equipment and industrial goods and materials, were only slightly moderated by marginally higher imports of automotive products.
- Canada's trade surplus in March climbed to \$1.2 billion, the highest since September 1990.

Monthly Summary

Exports continued to fall, though far more slowly than in recent months, declining by \$19 million, to \$11.2 billion. Imports, on the other hand, dropped by \$480 million, to \$10.0 billion. The marginal decline in exports and substantial decrease in imports combined to generate an increase of \$461 million in the trade balance, bringing the surplus to \$1.2 billion in March, the highest since September 1990.

In spite of generally weaker demand in the United States, a turnaround in the automotive products sector shored up sagging exports. Increased exports of cars (\$507 million) offset significant declines in the machinery and equipment, energy products and forestry sectors.


Within machinery and equipment, the largest decline occurred in the television and telecommunication equipment component, which fell by \$155 million in March. Aircraft and other transportation equipment as well as industrial and agricultural machinery also registered decreased exports.

The largest contributor to the decline in energy products was a \$133 million drop in crude petroleum, largely as a result of diminishing prices.

On the imports side, significant reductions occurred within the machinery and equipment sector. Aircraft fell \$200 million, and drops were also observed in the other three broad groupings of machinery and equipment. Imports in this sector totalled \$3.2 billion, the lowest monthly level recorded since July 1988.

Marginal increases in automotive products moderated slightly the overall decline in imports. These increases, however, were not enough to reverse the declining trend, and automotive imports in March were lower than for any month (except February 1991) since November 1984.

Canada posted a trade surplus of \$1.6 billion with the United States in March, up significantly from the \$1.1 billion surplus registered in February. This was due to an increase of \$166 million in exports and a decline of \$427 million in imports. A surplus was also posted with non-O.E.C.D. countries. With the exception of Japan, deficits with all other major trading partners increased in March.







Short-Term Trend

Exports

The rate of decrease of exports seems to have stabilized in February, after seven months of accelerating decline.


- Contributing to this stability was the automotive products sector, which decreased by 4.2% in February. This was less than the 5.0% decline in January and almost two percentage points lower than the peak decline of 6.0% noted in November 1990.
- Crude petroleum exports have been falling since December (-8.5% in February). Most of the decline is attributable to price changes. Natural gas (-1.6%) and other energy products (-4.4%) also fell, contributing to an overall decline of 5.7% in the energy products sector.
- Forestry products (-0.6%) and industrial goods and materials (-2.6%) were the other two sectors which contributed to the overall decline.
- Machinery and equipment exports were up in February (0.9%), mostly because of increasing exports of aircraft and other transportation equipment. Industrial and agricultural machinery fell for the second month in a row (-1.0%).
- Decreasing for the sixth consecutive month, exports to the United States fell 2.5% in February, the fastest rate of decrease since the start of its decline.
 Exports to the United Kingdom, Japan and "Other O.E.C.D. countries" also showed declines in February.



Imports

Imports fell in February for the fifth month in a row, and at a faster pace than in recent months.

- Contributing to the decrease was a 10.9% reduction in imports of energy products. This followed a 9.1% decline in January and a drop of 5.0% in December 1990. Crude petroleum fell the most (-12.2%).
- Imports of automotive products, falling since last July, dropped another 1.9% in February. This was entirely as a result of decreased imports of parts (-4.5%).
- Machinery and equipment imports rose by 0.1%, because of a 6.3% increase in aircraft and other transportation equipment. Industrial and agricultural machinery continued to fall (-2.8% in February).
- Also exhibiting decreasing trends were industrial goods and materials (-3.3%) and other consumer goods (-1.0%).
- Imports from the United States declined for the ninth month in a row (-1.8% in February). The only increases observed were for imports from Japan (1.6%) and "Other E.E.C. countries" (1.4%).




Detailed Analysis by Products and Trading Partners

Trade by Products

Total exports remained virtually unchanged at \$11.2 billion, the lowest level of exports since January 1988. Exports have been falling since November 1990, but the decrease observed in March was much less than the drops which occurred in February (-\$460 million) and January (-\$280 million) of 1991.


Following growth of \$222 million in February, a decrease of \$301 million brought machinery and equipment exports to \$2.3 billion, their lowest level since September 1990. Other machinery and equipment accounted for the greatest drop, with television and telecommunication equipment alone falling by \$155 million. Declines were noted, as well, for aircraft and other transportation equipment (-\$104 million) and industrial and agricultural machinery (-\$37 million).

Exports of forestry products fell considerably, and at \$1.6 billion, were at their lowest level since April 1987.




Crude materials dropped \$177 million, mostly attributable to a decline in exports of crude petroleum (-\$133 million). Exports of crude petroleum have been falling since their peak of \$740 million in November 1990. The value recorded in March signals a return to previous values of exports which were observed before the onset of the Persian Gulf crisis last August. The recent decreases are primarily the result of falling prices, since volumes have changed only slightly.

These losses were almost entirely offset by increased exports of automotive products (\$409 million). However, the increase noted in March was not high




enough to permit recovery from declines which began in August 1990. In fact, exports of automotive products, at \$2.4 billion, were over 25 per cent lower than the level observed in March 1990. Parts alone, at \$552 million, were at their lowest export level since April 1983, reflecting lower demand and widespread plant closures in the United States.



Imports fell by \$480 million in March, following an even sharper drop of \$1 billion in February. At \$10.0 billion, imports have not been this depressed since July 1988.

Machinery and equipment imports fell the most (-\$443 million), decreasing to \$3.2 billion, with aircraft contributing most to the overall sector decline (-\$200 million) following large increases in January and February. Decreases were noted in all the other component series as well.

Widespread declines were also observed in all four commodity groupings within the industrial goods and




materials sector, which dropped by \$177 million to \$1.8 billion, lower than any monthly total since August 1987.

These decreases were partially offset by an increase of \$112 million in automotive products, with cars up by \$14 million, trucks by \$19 million, and parts by \$79 million. The gains, following substantial declines in February, did not approach the extremely high increases which occurred in January. With the exception of February, imports of automotive products, at \$2.2 billion, were lower than any monthly total since November 1984.

Trading Partners

Exports decreased to all major trading partners except the United States (\$166 million). Exports to Japan fell by \$77 million after having increased by over \$90 million in February. Smaller declines occurred in exports to the other principal trading areas. At \$198 million, exports to "Other O.E.C.D. countries" were at their lowest level since July 1989.

Imports from the United States fell for the second month in a row, dropping \$427 million in March, after tumbling by \$867 million in February. This decrease brought the level of imports from the United States to \$6.7 billion. Imports from Japan also fell (-\$80 million).




