

Note: Port administrative procedures used prior to March 1, 1967 appear to have resulted in an overstatement of vehicles staying one or more nights in Canada and a corresponding understatement of same day traffic.

#### Non-resident Vehicles Entering Canada

Incoming traffic from the United States shows irregular decreases during 1968 when comparisons are made with 1967 which was an outstanding year for travel to Canada. For this reason, figures for 1966 are now included in the main tables to permit a visual comparison of total entries within a three year period.

Non-resident vehicles entering Canada from the United States numbered 773,000 in November 1968, an increase of 6.8 per cent over the same month in 1967. The category staying one or more nights shows a gain of 12.7 per cent and the group entering and leaving the same day an advance of 6.0 per cent. The summary by province of entry shows increases in numbers for all provinces in both categories. The provinces of Quebec, Ontario, and British Columbia realized the largest increases in vehicles staying one or more nights, 5,100, 4,300, and 3,200, respectively compared with November 1967.

During the eleven month period of 1968, a total of 12,009,600 vehicles entered Canada from the United States, some 1.9 per cent lower than January-November 1967 but 10.4 per cent higher than the same interval in 1966. Vehicles staying one or more nights numbered 3.4 million, down 16.3 per cent, while those entering and leaving the same day amounted to 8.0 million, up 5.2 per cent compared with the eleven months of 1967. Trucks used commercially totalled 580,400 during the period January to November 1968.

#### Non-immigrants Entering Canada by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

In November 1968, visitors entering Canada from the United States by plane, bus, rail, and boat totalled 112,200, an increase of 2.8 per cent over the same month of 1967. The gain recorded can be traced to plane travel which shows an increase of 4,600 persons or 7.6 per cent. The other means of travel registered decreases in the number of entries. The bus category in November totalled 36,100 persons, a figure lower than 1967 by 2.2 per cent. Non-immigrants entering Canada by rail in November show decreases for the three year period. Boat travel was down in comparison with 1967 but remained unchanged at 2,000 entries compared with November 1966.

A total of 2,482,900 United States visitors entered Canada by the above means of transportation during January-November 1968, a number 26.8 per cent below the eleven month period of 1967 but 19.3 per cent above the number in 1966. The totals for the individual classifications show substantial decreases compared with 1967 but except for train these categories are higher than 1966. Compared with January-November 1966, increases were recorded for the numbers entering by plane (39.0 per cent), bus (21.6 per cent), and boat (3.4 per cent) while visitors by rail declined by 10.5 per cent.

#### Canadian Vehicles Returning to Canada

Canadian vehicles returning from the United States numbered 878,200 in November 1968, an increase of 13.6 per cent over the previous year. All three categories show increases in the number reentering; 11.1 per cent for vehicles staying one or more nights, 14.3 per cent for those entering and leaving the same day, and 11.9 per cent for trucks used commercially. Re-entries of vehicles staying one or more nights were higher in Ontario in November 1968 than in the previous year by about 5,800 and in Quebec by 4,400. The short-term traffic increased in Ontario, British Columbia, and New Brunswick by 22.1, 11.9, and 5.5 per cent, respectively.

Cumulative data for the eleven months of 1968 show an increase of 9.0 per cent in the number of vehicles returning to Canada. Of the 11.7 million re-entries, 8.5 million were classified as leaving and returning on the same day and 2.3 million as staying one or more nights in the United States. This represents increases of 6.5 per cent for the former category and 16.8 per cent for the latter group. During the period January - November 1968, a total of 792,800 commercial trucks re-entered Canada, an increase of 14.6 per cent or 101,000 vehicles compared with the same period of 1967.

#### Residents of Canada Returning by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

Canadians returning from visits to the United States by plane, bus, rail, and boat totalled 108,200 in November 1968, a figure 1.5 per cent higher than November 1967. The number of residents returning by plane and bus increased by 5.1 and 2.3 per cent while traffic by rail and boat decreased by 12.4 and 43.5 per cent, respectively. The decreases in re-entries by rail and boat represents in numbers 1,200 and 1,000 persons, respectively. In November 1968 provincial summaries show a decrease in all modes of travel for Quebec, an aggregate decline of 4,300 persons. Plane re-entries were higher in Ontario than in the previous November (4,300 persons) while the number returning by bus, rail, and boat decreased by 200, 700, and 800, respectively.

During the period January - November 1968, a total of 1,692,100 Canadians returned from the United States by the above means of transportation, an increase of 10.2 per cent over the same period of 1967. Residents re-entering by plane numbered 858,300, by bus 575,600, and by boat 132,500 persons, increases in each case. Re-entries by rail have declined over the three years presented, with a decrease of 7.9 per cent compared with 1967. A total of 125,700 residents returned by rail during the period January to November 1968.

#### Travel Between Canada and Overseas Countries

Data on the number of overseas visitors to Canada by country of residence normally obtained from the Department of Manpower and Immigration are not available at this time. When this information is received it will be published in subsequent reports.

In November 1968, Canadians returning direct from overseas countries numbered 25,821, an increase of 9.0 per cent over November 1967. Re-entries at major airports accounted for 24,836 travellers, leaving 637 persons returning at specified seaports and 348 re-entries at all other ports. While this represents an increase of 4,899 air travellers there were offsetting decreases of 1,513 and 1,253 in the numbers returning at seaports and all other ports. During the period January-November 1968, residents returning direct from overseas countries totalled 513,255, an increase of 22.0 per cent over the corresponding period of 1967. Most of the advance can be traced to Toronto airport where 91,288 more persons re-entered than in 1967. The number of Canadians returning direct at main seaports amounted to 11,168, down 34.0 per cent compared with January-November 1967.

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
