


Note: Port administrative procedures used prior to March 1, 1967 appear to have resulted in an overstatement of vehicles staying one or more nights in Canada and a corresponding understatement of
same day traffic.

### Non-resident Vehicles Entering Canada

In February 1968, some 624,600 vehicles entered Canada from the United States, a substantial increase of 27 per cent over February 1967. This increase in the volume of traffic may be attributed to the extra day in February this year. Vehicles staying one or more nights in Canada and those entering and leaving the same day totalled 577,100, some 28.7 per cent in excess of February 1967. In the first two months of 1968, non-resident vehicles numbered 1,223,500, up 19.6 per cent from the same period in 1967.

Most provinces showed increases in the number of vehicles (excluding commercial trucks) entering Canada in February 1968. Totals for Quebec, Manitoba, and Alberta show gains of 62.7, 58.6, and 56.7 per cent, respectively. Vehicles entering in Ontario formed 63 per cent of the total and registered an increase of 26.4 per cent over February 1967.

## Non-immigrants Entering Canada by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

Increases in plane and bus travellers in February 1968 led to an aggregate advance of 23.9 per cent in the number of visitors entering Canada from the United States by plane, bus, rail, and boat. Plane travel continues to increase accounting for some 35.2 per cent more visitors than February 1967, while travel by rail shows a trend of decline with 6 per cent less in February 1968. Entries in January and February 1968 totalled 186,900, an increase of 12.3 per cent over the same period in 1967.

In February 1968, United States visitors entering Ontario by plane, bus, rail, and boat numbered 51,400 compared with 37,300 in the same month in 1967. This increase represents 77 per cent of the aggregate gain in numbers. Ports in Quebec reported entries totalling about 24,000, some 10.1 per cent more than February 1967.

### Canadian Vehicles Returning to Canada

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada from the United States totalled 711,100 in February 1968, an increase of 5.6 per cent over the same month in 1967 and some 13.8 per cent more than the number of visiting vehicles entering Canada during the month. The categories staying one or more nights and leaving and returning the same day showed increases of 2.5 and 4.9 per cent, respectively. The decrease in the number of vehicles returning in January offset the increase recorded in February 1968 leaving a cumulative decrease of 1.2 per cent in contrast with January - February 1967.

In February 1968, Canadian vehicles staying one or more nights in the United States and returning in Ontario amounted to 30,900, a decrease of 23.9 per cent, while Quebec accounted for 24,400, an advance of 31.2 per cent over February 1967. Canadian vehicles leaving and returning on the same day in Ontario declined by 1.6 per cent to a total of 264,500 and in New Brunswick increased by 5.9 per cent to a total of 128,700.

### Residents of Canada Returning by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

An aggregate of 119,400 Canadians returned from the United States by plane, bus, rail, and boat in February 1968, some 14.7 per cent more than February 1967. This increase may be attributed to advances in plane and bus travel, 8,600 and 8,500 travellers, respectively. Canadians returning to Canada outnumbered visitors from the United States by 25.8 per cent. A total of 255,600 residents re-entered Canada in January and February 1968, an increase of 8.2 per cent over the same months in 1967.

On a provincial basis, ports in Ontario reported a significant increase of 24.9 per cent in the number of Canadians returning in February 1968 by the above means of transportation. Canadian re-entries through ports in Quebec declined by 2.2 per cent while residents returning in British Columbia increased by 9.2 per cent compared with February 1967.

### Travel Between Canada and Overseas Countries

Data on the number of overseas visitors to Canada by country of residence normally obtained from the Department of Manpower and Immigration are not available at this time. When this information is received it will be published in subsequent reports.

Residents of Canada returning direct from overseas countries numbered 29,488 in February 1968, some 8.7 per cent more than February 1967. This increase may be attributed solely to air travel which shows an advance of 9.8 per cent in the number of Canadians returning at major airports. Montreal airport recorded a decrease of 580 re-entries when 6,865 residents returned in February 1968. Toronto airport with the largest number of re-entries reported an increase of 1,840 persons. In the first two months of 1968, some 64,972 Canadians returned direct from overseas countries, an increase of 1.2 per cent over February 1967.
