Estimates of the balance of payments on travel account between Canada and other countries for the period January to March inclusive are shown above for the years 1964-68. It should be noted that data for 1967 and 1968 are released as preliminary estimates subject to revision.

A deficit of \$131 million was shown in the balance of payments on travel account with all countries in the first quarter of 1968, some \$4 million more than the \$127 million deficit recorded in 1967. The rate of increase in the debit balance was less pronounced than last year. Receipts from all countries decreased by 2.5 per cent and payments increased by about one per cent.

During the period January to March 1968, United States visitors spent 2.9 per cent less in Canada compared with the same period in 1967. Canadian expenditures in the United States, on the other hand, increased by about 1.9 per cent over the first quarter of 1967. The deficit on travel account with the United States rose by \$5 million to a total of \$89 million.

The balance of payments on travel account between Canada and overseas countries improved in the first quarter of 1968. The debit balance stood at \$42 million, a decrease of one million dollars compared with the period January - March 1967. Canadians spent less in overseas countries in the first quarter while estimated expenditures by overseas visitors in Canada remained unchanged at \$11 million.

Non-resident Vehicles Entering Canada

In March 1968, vehicles entering Canada from the United States numbered 719,400, an increase of 8.9 per cent over March 1967. Vehicles entering and leaving the same day increased by 9.6 per cent and those staying one or more nights by 5.3 per cent. These two categories combined registered an increase of 9 per cent; with the Yukon Territory showing a gain of 27.0 per cent, Alberta 25.5 per cent, and Quebec 19.2 per cent compared with March 1967.

Cumulative data for the first quarter of 1968 show vehicle entries totalled 1,943,100, some 259,200 more than in the same period of 1967. Vehicles entering and leaving the same day amounted to 1,552,700 and those staying one or more nights accounted for 244,200, a combined gain of 16 per cent. Trucks used commercially numbered 146,200, up 8.9 per cent over January - March 1967.

Non-immigrants Entering Canada by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

A substantial increase of 11,700 persons entering Canada by plane in March 1968 led to an aggregate gain of 13.1 per cent in the total number of visitors from the United States by plane, bus, rail, and boat. Plane travellers made up 56 per cent of the 98,400 visitors in March 1968 compared with 50 per cent in the same month of 1967. The number of visitors from the United States entering through ports in Quebec by the above means of transportation increased by 500 in March this year to about 23,900 persons. Visitors into Ontario and British Columbia showed increases of 6,500 and 2,600 in March 1968 when entries totalled 51,300 and 15,000 persons, respectively.

During the period January - March 1968, some 285,300 United States visitors entered Canada by plane, through bus, rail, and boat, a gain of 12.6 per cent over the same period of 1967. The number of plane and bus travellers from the United States increased by 24.0 and 6.2 per cent, respectively, while visitors by rail decreased by 17.5 per cent compared with the first quarter of 1967.

Canadian Vehicles Returning to Canada

A total of 852,800 Canadian vehicles returned from the United States in March 1968, a decrease of less than one per cent or 6,600. Vehicles leaving and returning on the same day declined by 5,600 and those staying one or more nights in the United States increased by 700. Canadian same day vehicles returning in Quebec and British Columbia increased by 6.0 and 16.6 per cent, respectively, while re-entries in Ontario decreased by 8.2 per cent. The number of vehicles staying one night or more in the United States increased in Quebec by 12.2 per cent, remained unchanged in Ontario, and decreased in British Columbia by 13.9 per cent compared with March 1967.

In the first quarter of 1968, Canadian vehicles returning from the United States numbered 2,251,000, one per cent less than January - March 1967. During the first quarter, Canadian vehicle re-entries outnumbered United States vehicle entries by about 16 per cent. The category trucks used commercially recorded an increase of 3.9 per cent while the other two classifications both registered decreases.

Residents of Canada Returning by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

Canadians returning from the United States by plane, through bus, rail, and boat totalled 149,-900 in March 1968, an increase of 11.5 per cent over the same month in 1967. The largest percentage increase was shown in the number of bus travellers, 22.4 per cent, and the greatest volume increase was realized by the plane category, 10,500 persons. Re-entries by plane, bus, rail, and boat in Ontario amounted to 84,600, an advance of 12,200. British Columbia recorded a total of 22,900, up 3,300 over March 1967, and Quebec reported re-entries totalling 31,600, a decrease of 400 persons.

During the period January to March 1968, a total of 405,400 residents returned from the United States by plane, through bus, rail, and boat, some 9.4 per cent more than January - March 1967. There were 42 per cent more Canadians returning from the United States by the above means of transportation than United States residents entering Canada in the first quarter of 1968.

Travel Between Canada and Overseas Countries

Data on the number of overseas visitors to Canada by country of residence normally obtained from the Department of Manpower and Immigration are not available at this time. When this information is received it will be published in subsequent reports.

In March 1968, some 36,000 Canadians returned direct from overseas countries, an increase of 3.1 per cent over March 1967. The number of residents returning at main airports advanced by 1,547 while Canadians re-entering at specified seaports decreased by 199 persons. Cumulative data for the period January to March 1968 show that 101,032 Canadians returned direct from overseas countries as compared with 99,160 re-entries in the first quarter of 1967.

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
