

Note: Port administrative procedures used prior to March 1, 1967 appear to have resulted in an overstatement of vehicles staying one or more nights in Canada and a corresponding understatement of
same day traffic.

Non-resident Vehicles Entering Canada

The number of vehicles entering Canada from the United States totalled 1,013,100 in May 1968, a decrease of 37,700 or 3.6 per cent compared with May 1967. The decline may be traced to the category one or more nights where 72,700 or 24.1 per cent fewer entries were reported. Vehicles entering and leaving on the same day numbered 726,400, an advance of 4.6 per cent and trucks used commercially amounted to 57,900, some 5.9 per cent more than May 1967. During the period January to May 1968, a total of 3,755,200 vehicles entered Canada from the United States, an increase of 8.6 per cent over January - May 1967.

Gains were evident for all provinces except Quebec where 1967 data were affected by the first full month of Expo. In comparisons between May 1967 and 1968, Quebec shows a decrease of 42.0 per cent in vehicle entries (excepting commercial trucks), but when compared with May 1966 shows an increase of 50.3 per cent.

Non-immigrants Entering Canada by Plane, Through Bus, Rail and Boat

In May 1968, the number of visitors entering Canada from the United States decreased by 39.8 per cent or 135,100 persons. Compared with May 1967, all types of traffic registered decreases; travellers by plane 34.4 per cent, by bus 50.9 per cent, by rail 34.9 per cent, and by boat 1.3 per cent. A comparison with May 1966 shows increases for the categories plane, bus, and boat of 21.2, 47.3, and 22.0 per cent, respectively, and a decrease for rail of 11.2 per cent. During the five month period of 1968, entries by plane, bus, rail, and boat totalled 605,700, approximately 15.0 per cent less than James 1967 but some 21.8 per cent more than the same period of 1966.

The decrease in traffic by plane, bus, rail, and boat during May was shown mainly in Ontario and Quebec, down 15.4 and 76.2 per cent, respectively, while in British Columbia entries increased by 7.3 per cent compared with May 1967. In contrast with May 1966, visitors entering in Ontario advanced by 28.0 per cent and in Quebec by 13.5 per cent.

Canadian Vehicles Returning to Canada

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada in May 1968 numbered 1,023,900, some 6.0 per cent more than May 1967. The difference between Canadian vehicle re-entries and non-resident vehicle entries was less pronounced this month, with re-entries showing a margin of only one per cent. Resident vehicles leaving and returning on the same day advanced by 4.2 per cent and those staying one or more nights by 8.4 per cent. During the period January to May 1968, a total of 4,195,600 vehicles returned to Canada, an increase of 2.0 per cent over the same period in 1967.

In May 1968, most provinces showed increases in vehicles staying one or more nights, with Quebec recording an upward movement of 34.0 per cent while Ontario registered a decline of 3.3 per cent. The short-term traffic, vehicles leaving and returning the same day, followed a similar pattern by province, with an increase of 13.9 per cent in Quebec and a decrease of 3.5 per cent in Ontario.

Residents of Canada Returning by Plane, Through Bus, Rail and Boat

A total of 142,000 Canadians returned from the United States by plane, through bus, rail, and boat in May 1968, an increase of 11.0 per cent over the same month the previous year. The seasonal pattern changed in May when visitors from the United States outnumbered Canadian re-entries by 44.1 per cent. During the period January to May 1968, some 696,700 Canadians returned from the United States, 10.2 per cent more than in the same interval of 1967.

On a provincial basis, residents re-entering in May by plane, bus, rail, and boat in British Columbia, Quebec, and Ontario showed increases of 17.3, 13.0, and 10.9 per cent, respectively. The number of re-entries in New Brunswick and Manitoba declined by 38.8 and 16.4 per cent compared with May 1967.

Travel Between Canada and Overseas Countries

Data on the number of overseas visitors to Canada by country of residence normally obtained from the Department of Manpower and Immigration are not available at this time. When this information is received it will be published in subsequent reports.

Canadians returning direct from overseas countries numbered 34,984 in May 1968, some 909 persons or 2.5 per cent less than May 1967. Residents returning from overseas at major airports remained unchanged at about 34,100. Re-entries at specified seaports were only about one half the number recorded in May 1967. Canadians re-entering at all other ports declined by 34.1 per cent. In May 1968, Montreal airport recorded a decrease of 11.2 per cent while Toronto and Vancouver airports registered increases of 5.7 and 18.4 per cent, respectively. For the five month period January to May, 170,940 residents returned direct from overseas countries, a slight decline compared with 171,435 re-entries in January to May 1967.
