

Non-Resident Vehicles Entering Canada

Entries of vehicles from the United States totalled 587,300 in January 1969, a decrease of 1.9 per cent compared with the same month in 1968. The largest group, entering and leaving same day, showed a decline of 4.2 per cent when 463,500 vehicles entered Canada. The category one or more nights registered a gain of 12.4 per cent with 75,200 entries in January. Trucks used commercially numbered 48,600, an increase of 300 vehicles over January 1968.

The summary by province of entry shows gains in the numbers of vehicles, both same day and one or more nights, entering Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Quebec, and the Yukon Territory. Ontario ports reported a total of 345,800 vehicles in January 1969, a decrease of 3.5 per cent. British Columbia recorded a decrease of 32.5 per cent when 24,300 vehicles entered that province.

Non-immigrants Entering Canada by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

A total of 110,400 visitors from the United States entered Canada by plane, bus, rail, and boat in January 1969, some 19.9 per cent more than the same month in 1968. The increase can be traced to plane entries which showed a gain of 34.5 per cent or 18,500 persons. The number of rail and boat entries increased by 1,300 and 200 travellers, respectively, while persons entering by bus were down in volume from January 1968.

In the first month of 1969, a total of 65,300 United States residents entered by the above transportation through ports in Ontario, 16,100 visitors more than in January 1968. Entries in Quebec decreased by about 100 to 24,800 while those in British Columbia increased by 14.8 per cent to a total of 12,400 persons.

Canadian Vehicles Returning to Canada

Canadian vehicles returning from the United States numbered 710,500 in January 1969, an increase of 3.4 per cent over the same month in 1968. The category leaving and returning same day showed a decrease of less than one per cent, while the group staying one or more nights in the United States recorded an increase of 13.4 per cent. The number of commercial trucks advanced 20.2 per cent to a total of 87,600 in January of this year.

On a provincial basis, Canadian vehicles staying one or more nights in the United States and returning in Ontario totalled 44,400, some 13,700 entries more than in the first month of 1968. Reentries in Quebec decreased by 3.5 per cent to 26,000 and in British Columbia by 15.7 per cent to 11,900 vehicles in January 1969. The volume of traffic leaving and returning the same day decreased in New Brunswick and British Columbia by 1,900 and 25,100 vehicles, respectively. The same day traffic increased in Ontario by 24,400 to a total of 277,400 vehicles.

Residents of Canada Returning by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

In January 1969, Canadian residents returning from the United States by plane, bus, rail, and boat totalled 152,800, an increase of 12.2 per cent over January 1968. Similar to the increase in non-immigrant entries from the United States, the bulk of the expansion can be traced to the plane traffic which increased by 14,000 re-entries or 16.3 per cent. Residents returning by bus advanced 7.3 per cent to 41,100 persons while those re-entering by rail declined by 2.6 per cent to a total of 11,300 compared with January 1968.

Ports in Ontario reported a total of 79,200 residents returning from the United States by the above means of transportation in comparison with 67,400 re-entries in January of the previous year. Canadians re-entering in Quebec numbered 39,000 and in British Columbia 22,200 persons in January 1969, increases of 5.1 per cent and 8.8 per cent, respectively, over the first month in 1968.

Canadians Returning Direct from Overseas Countries

In January 1969, a total of 44,080 residents returned direct to Canada following visits to overseas countries. This represents an increase of 8,596 persons or 24.2 per cent compared with the same month of 1968. Canadians re-entering at main airports totalled 43,585, about 23 per cent more than January 1968. Re-entries at Montreal airport numbered 8,470, down 32.8 per cent. At Toronto airport, there were 23,178 re-entries recorded, 63.5 per cent more residents returning direct than the previous January. Vancouver airport reported 6,128 Canadians returning by air, an increase of 26.4 per cent. Residents returning direct at specified seaports numbered 29 with most of the re-entries reported by the port of Halifax. Canadians returning at all other ports (mainly airports) amounted to 466 compared with 67 in January 1968.

Visitors Entering Canada from Overseas Countries

Overseas visitors entering Canada both direct and via the United States totalled 11,834 in January 1969, a gain of 31.6 per cent over the first month of 1968. Over 60 per cent of the visitors originated in Europe, a breakdown of which shows residents of the United Kingdom numbered 2,405, France 905 persons, and Germany 744 entries, increases of 18.1, 38.0, and 32.1 per cent, respectively, compared with January 1968. Visitors from countries in Asia amounted to 1,531 persons, 33.4 per cent more than the same month in 1968. A total of 490 residents of Japan were reported entering Canada in January 1969. Non-immigrants from countries in North America other than the United States accounted for 1,118 entries, with the largest numbers from Jamaica and Mexico, 238 and 223 residents, respectively.

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
