

Non-resident Vehicles Entering Canada

In June 1969, vehicles entering Canada from the United States numbered 1,376,700 of which 871,000 entered and left on the same day, 448,300 stayed one or more nights, and 57,400 vehicles were trucks used commercially. This represents increases in all categories with an overall gain of about one per cent compared with June 1968.

For the first half of 1969, a total of 5,179,800 non-resident vehicles entered Canada, an advance of 57,800 or 1.1 per cent over the cumulative figure for 1968. The increase of 95,200 vehicles staying one or more nights was offset somewhat by a decrease of 41,500 vehicles entering and leaving on the same day. These two categories combined present increases of 9.9 per cent for Quebec, 8.2 per cent for British Columbia, and 2.4 per cent for New Brunswick while a decrease of 2.0 per cent was recorded for Ontario during the six month period.

Non-immigrants Entering Canada by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

Visitors entering Canada from the United States by the above means of transportation totalled 340,400 in June 1969, a number 3.7 per cent more than in June 1968. Arrivals by plane accounted for 124,600 and a gain of 11.7 per cent. Travellers by bus numbered 121,600, up 7.1 per cent, while visitors entering by rail accounted for 19,700, down 16.5 per cent. Compared with June last year, boat traffic decreased by 6.4 per cent to a total of 74,500 persons.

During January - June 1969, non-immigrant entries totalled 1,053,300, some 12.8 per cent more than in the same period of 1968. Increases were shown in all categories; plane 22.3 per cent, bus 7.6 per cent, rail 1.6 per cent, and boat 1.2 per cent. Visitors entering by plane, bus, rail, and boat numbered 597,860 in Ontario, 197,488 in Quebec, and 165,726 in British Columbia, increases of 15.6, 4.0, and 13.1 per cent, respectively.

Canadian Vehicles Returning to Canada

Resident vehicles returning from the United States amounted to 1,262,000 in June 1969, an increase of 9.4 per cent over the same month in 1968. Canadian vehicles leaving and returning the same day increased by 9.3 per cent to 947,800 and those staying one or more nights advanced by 4.4 per cent to a total of 224,400. Almost 90,000 trucks used commercially returned to Canada in June 1969.

Cumulative data show that 5,848,700 Canadian vehicles returned from the United States of which 4,452,700 left and returned on the same day, 907,600 stayed one or more nights, and 488,400 were commercial trucks. Increases in all categories led to a total increase of 9.3 per cent over the period of January to June 1968. About 2.7 million vehicles returned in Ontario, one million re-entered in both Quebec and New Brunswick, and 0.8 million in British Columbia in the first six months of 1969.

Residents of Canada Returning by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

Canadians returning from the United States by plane, bus, rail, and boat numbered 234,400 in June 1969, an increase of 36.3 per cent over June 1968. Substantial advances were shown in plane and bus traffic of 64.7 and 27.0 per cent, while rail and boat traffic recorded decreases of 12.9 and 7.5 per cent, respectively.

During the first six months of the year, 1,058,700 residents returned to Canada by the above means of transportation. The aggregate increase of 189,900 or 21.9 per cent was attributed to the plane and bus categories which increased 31.6 and 14.7 per cent over the period January to June, 1968. Re-entries by plane, bus, rail, and boat in Ontario accounted for 589,838, in Quebec 244,880, and in British Columbia 143,590, advances of 23.3, 27.6, and 5.0 per cent, respectively.

Canadians Returning Direct from Overseas Countries

In June 1969, a total of 64,583 Canadians returned direct from overseas countries, 17,087 persons or 36.0 per cent more than during the same month in 1968. Increases were shown at all major airports except Halifax. The largest advance (6,800) was at Montreal airport where 17,550 residents returned in June followed by Toronto airport with an increase of 3,279 to a total of 25,685 re-entries.

During the period January-June 1969, residents returning direct from overseas countries numbered 288,051, a cumulative increase of 31.9 per cent over 1968. Toronto airport recorded reentries of 122,050, up 33.0 per cent. Montreal airport with a total of 84,674 registered an increase of 36.5 per cent and Vancouver with 33,301 re-entries showed an advance of 19.6 per cent over the first six months of 1968. Canadians returning direct at specified seaports amounted to 3,346 and at all other ports 3,894 persons.

Estimates of the balance of payments on travel account between Canada and other countries for the period January to June inclusive are shown above for the years 1965-69. It should be noted that data for 1968 and 1969 are released as preliminary estimates subject to revision.

In the first half of 1969, travel receipts from all countries amounted to \$350 million, an increase of \$36 million over 1968. Travel payments totalled \$606 million, some \$139 million more than a revised figure of \$467 million for the first six months of 1968. The sharp increase in payments was partially attributed to the strike of Air Canada employees in April and May which resulted in a much higher proportion of transportation fares going to foreign carriers during the second quarter. The balance between receipts and payments therefore widened to \$256 million, a deficit which is \$103 million more than the one in 1968.

An estimated \$307 million was received from United States visitors in Canada during January to June 1969, an increase of \$34 million over 1968. Canadians, on the other hand, made payments of \$449 million in the United States, 30.1 per cent more than the previous year. The Air Canada strike, higher spending, and greater numbers of Canadian travellers all contributed to the advance in payments and the increase of \$70 million in the debit balance with the United States.

Similarly, payments to overseas countries rose faster than receipts leaving a deficit of \$114 million in 1969, some \$33 million more than the first half of 1968. Travel receipts stood at \$43 million and travel payments at \$157 million for the January to June period of the year. The transportation item and the increase in the number of Canadian travellers returning were factors also affecting payments to overseas countries.
