

Review of International Travel

The format for the monthly publication on international travel in 1970 has been changed to provide the users with a more comprehensive coverage of the movements of travellers between Canada and other countries. Total numbers of United States visitors entering Canada and residents returning from the United States are presented by type of transportation and province of entry. This represents an extension in the area of automobile traffic where only numbers of vehicles were published in previous monthly reports. The number of pleasure craft and persons entering Canada are shown by intended length of stay and province of entry. Visitors and Canadians returning from overseas countries will be presented by province. Current trends in international travel and the analysis of monthly data will be highlighted in this review. A general description of definitions and the method of compiling data on international travel appear in the annual publication, "Travel Between Canada And Other Countries, 1967". (DBS Catalogue No. 66-201).

International travel between Canada and other countries increased generally during 1969. This growth was probably in part associated with the continued rise in levels of economic activity and personal incomes in the principal nations of the world in recent years. Although additional factors such as the increasing importance of chartered flights and other forms of cheaper travel through "package tours" promoted by tour operators also induced increased travel, with students, young people, and lower income groups travelling more than previously. Part of the higher level of travellers expenditures was undoubtedly a result of rising prices in many of the major tourist centres of the world.

Currency restrictions (\$130) imposed in 1966 on travel to other countries by residents of the United Kingdom were eased at the beginning of this year to allow each member of a family to spend up to \$780 per year. This action is expected to have an impact on the numbers and spending patterns of United Kingdom residents abroad during 1970.

Travel between Canada and the United States

The flow of travel between Canada and the United States in January 1970 was higher by 12 per cent than in the same month of the previous year. Visitors from the United States numbered 1.6 million, a 9 per cent increase, while Canadians returning totalled 2.0 million in January 1970, an increase of 14 per cent above last year.

Automobile continued to be the principle mode of transportation into Canada carrying 1.3 million or more than 85 per cent of the total United States travellers to Canada. Of these entries just under a quarter of a million remained for one or more nights in Canada, higher by 24 per cent over the same month a year earlier. Automobile traffic entering and leaving same day increased by 85,900 persons or was about 8 per cent higher than January 1969. The number of United States visitors entering Canada by plane in January 1970 totalled 78,700, an increase of 9 per cent above the same period last year.

Canadians re-entering from the United States by automobile formed over 80 per cent or 1.6 million of the total persons re-entering in January 1970. About 0.3 million of this number were long-term travellers, up 19 per cent from the same month last year. The largest numerical increase in Canadian re-entries was shown in the automobile traffic entering and leaving the same day, up 189,600 persons or 17 per cent above January 1969. Canadian residents re-entering from the United States by plane totalled 112,400, an increase of 13 per cent over the same month last year.

Travel Between Canada and Overseas Countries

Overseas visitors entering Canada in January 1970 numbered about 14,700, a gain of 25 per cent over the same period in 1969. The returns recorded increases in the numbers of visitors from most countries, especially the United Kingdom, Australia, France, Germany and Italy, when compared with January 1969. As noted above, the relaxing of currency restrictions imposed on residents of the United Kingdom travelling abroad may have an impact on the volume of United Kingdom residents travelling to Canada during 1970, although the full impact of these may not be apparent until later in the year.

Canadian residents returning direct from overseas countries numbered 79,600 in January 1970, an increase of 81 per cent over the same month in 1969. A very high proportion of the number returning in January represented travellers by air when about three quarters of the total re-entries occurred at Montreal and Toronto airports.
