

Review of International Travel

During the first quarter of 1970 preliminary estimates of travel expenditures reveal that Canada remained in a deficit position on travel account with all countries, (Refer to table 15, page 23). Foreign visitors spent an estimated \$107 million in Canada, made up of \$91 million from United States travellers and \$16 million from overseas visitors; total receipts advanced by 19 per cent above 1969. Canadians made payments of \$299 million in travel expenditures abroad, \$213 million in the United States and \$86 million in overseas countries; total payments advanced by 15 per cent above the comparable period for 1969. The net result of these transactions was a deficit of \$192 million on travel account between Canada and all countries, increasing the deficit by \$22 million above the first quarter of 1969. The fact that Easter fell in the first quarter this year was expected to have an impact on travel patterns and partly explains the higher travel expenditures over the same period last year; in 1969 Easter fell in the second quarter of the year.

It appears that any increase in payments by Canadians to the United States have been largely offset by expenditures by United States travellers in Canada; the deficit between Canada and the United States advanced slightly rising by \$2 million. Payments to overseas countries by Canadian residents increased faster than receipts from abroad and the total deficit between Canada and overseas countries advanced by \$20 million above last year. It is evident that the increase in the deficit can be chiefly attributed to increased travel by Canadian residents to overseas countries. The increasing importance of charter flights and special excursions abroad tend to induce increased travel, particularly with students, young people and lower income groups travelling more than in the past.

Travel between Canada and the United States

During the first quarter of 1970 cumulative statistics show that the number of United States visitors to Canada increased by 9 per cent, while Canadian residents returning from trips to the United States were 8 per cent above the first quarter for 1969. In March 1970, visitors entering Canada from the United States numbered 1,956,600 while Canadians returning totalled 2,714,100 representing increases of 11.5 and 8.3 per cent respectively above the same month a year earlier.

United States travellers to Canada by automobile, some 1,711,500 persons was 13.1 per cent above March 1969. About 371,100 of these entries remained one or more nights, up 37.3 per cent above last year, short-term travellers at 1,340,400 increased by about 8 per cent above March 1969. United States travellers entering Canada by non-automobile transportation totalled 245,000 an increase of 1.4 per cent above last year. Plane travel attracted some 31.5 per cent of this total, carrying 77,100 United States travellers to Canada, up some 2 per cent from last year.

In March 1970, some 2,284,000 or 84 per cent of the total Canadians returning from the United States re-entered by automobile, 9.4 per cent above last year. Of these re-entries 544,800 remained one or more nights in the United States an increase of 44.8 per cent above the same month last year. Short-term traffic, 1,739,200 travellers, increased by 1.6 per cent above March 1969. Canadians returning from the United States by non-automobile transportation numbered 430,100, up 2.6 per cent from the comparable period of a year earlier. Plane travel attracted 28.5 per cent of this total when some 122,400 Canadians returned by plane, a decrease of 2.5 per cent from March 1969.

Travel between Canada and Overseas Countries

Overseas visitors entering Canada during the first quarter of 1970 increased by some 34 per cent, while Canadian residents returning direct from overseas countries were 49 per cent above the first quarter of 1969. During March 1970, about 22,800 overseas visitors entered Canada, an increase of 37.2 per cent above the same month a year earlier. Commencing March 2, 1970 Israel reduced its foreign travel allowance from \$375 to \$250 per resident per trip, but the effect of this control measure may not be evident until subsequent months. Province of entry data for March 1970 shows the following distribution of overseas visitors entering through provincial ports: Atlantic Provinces, 3 per cent; Quebec, 40; Ontario, 41; the Prairie Provinces, 3; and British Columbia, 13 per cent.

Canadian residents returning direct from Overseas countries in March 1970, numbered 70,300 an increase of 31.1 per cent above the same month last year. With the opening of "Expo 70" in Osaka, Japan on March 13, 1970 Canadian visits to that area are likely to be stimulated but the full impact will not be known until later in the year. The majority of Canadians, some 85 per cent, re-entered at the major airports of Montreal, Toronto and Vancouver.
