ON TRAVELLER'S VEHICLE PERMITS

JANUARY, 1954

Foreign vehicles entering Canada on traveller's vehicle permits in January totalled 48,700, an increase of 3 per cent over the same month of last year. Traffic was heavier in Ontario, Manitoba and the Yukon and lighter in the other provinces.

NOTE: Traveller's vehicle permits are issued to foreign vehicles which remain in Canada longer than 48 hours or which travel beyond the jurisdiction of the port of entry. (Thus a motorist who intends to leave the country at a point other than that of entry must apply for a traveller's vehicle permit). Figures shown above refer almost exclusively to automobiles. They include a small number of taxis, motorcycles and bicycles, but exclude buses, trucks and other commercial vehicles. Data for current month are subject to revision. Entries into Canada via Newfoundland and Nova Scotia are by ship.
