


## INTRODUCTION

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics has prepared this publication from annual financial reports of 51 tuberculosis sanatoria. Excluded are institutions administered by the Government of Canada and tuberculosis units that form part of other hospitals, as well as one sanatorium in Quebec for which separate financial data were not available for 1957 and 1958.

For each sanatorium financial data refer to the fiscal year of which the greater part fell in the calendar year 1958, whereas patient-days relate to the calendar year 1958.

## OPERATING REVENUE

Government agencies contributed 92.4 per cent, altogether over 28 million dollars, to the operation of sanatoria. This comprises grants, payments through Workmen's Compensation Boards, and payments for the care of Indians, Eskimos, veterans, and indigent patients. Patients, through direct payment or hospital-care plans, contributed 1.7 per cent. The remaining 6 per cent came from donations, from the sale of Christmas seals, and from other sources.

## OPERATING EXPENDITURE

Public sanatoria reported a total operating expenditure of 30.4 million dollars. Adjustment for one sanatorium for which data were not available would bring the total to about 30.8 million dollars. This was the lowest yearly expenditure since 1953. It had dropped by 5.5 per cent since 1957. The decrease amounts to 7.9 per cent after adjustment by application of the Consumer Price Index. This reduction was concomitant with a 12.5 per cent decrease of patient-days of care given during the year. In the several provinces, expenditure decreased only where the patient-days had diminished by 8.8 per cent or more, namely in Newfoundland, Quebec, Ontario, Saskatchewan, and British Columbia. The other five provinces, where patient-days had decreased by 0.5 to 8.5 per cent, actually reported increased operating expenditure.

Salaries constituted 58.9 per cent of operating expenditures. In the Atlantic Provinces, Quebec, and Manitoba, the proportion of salaries was below, and in Ontario, Saskatchewan, Alberta, and British Columbia above the Canadian average. The share of food amounted to 14.5 per cent, ranging from 9.3 per cent in British Columbia to over 21 per cent in Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, and Newfoundland. These data comprise the cost of patient care in public sanatoria only. Reported expenditure excludes the cost for 9 per cent of reported patient-days, which were spent

## INTRODUCTION

Le Bureau fédéral de la statistique a rédigé la présente publication à partir des rapports financiers (annuels) de 51 sanatoriums pour tuberculeux, à l'exclusion des institutions dirigés par le Gouvernement du Canada, des quartiers pour tuberculeux d'autres hôpitaux et d'un sanatorium du Québec dont on ne connaît pas les données pour 1957 et 1958.

Les données financières de chaque sanatorium concernent l'exercice financier dont la plus grande partie tombe dans l'année civile 1958, alors que, pour les jours-malades, les chiffres ont toujours trait à l'année civile 1957.

## RECETTES DE GESTION

Les organismes gouvernementaux ont fourni plus de 28 millions de dollars (92.4 p. 100) aux sanatoriums, sous forme de subventions, d'indemnités versées par la Commission des accidents du travail et de paiements de soins accordés aux Indiens, Esquimaux, anciens combattants et indigents. La contribution des malades, — directe ou moyennant des caisses d'assurance-hospitalisation, — figuré pour 1.7 p. 100, tandis que le reste (6 p. 100) provenait de dons, de timbres de Noël et d'autres sources.

## FRAIS DE GESTION

Les sanatoriums publics ont déclaré des frais de gestion pour le montant de 30.4 millions de dollars, somme qui s'élève à environ 30.8 millions, si l'on tient compte d'un sanatorium dont les données sont inconnues. Le plus bas depuis 1953, ce chiffre marque, sur 1957, une réduction de 5.5 p. 100, voire de 7.9 après dégonflement par l'indice des prix à la consommation. Avec cette baisse, coïncide une réduction de 12.5 p. 100 des jours de soins donnés aux malades durant l'année. Dans les provinces, les frais ont décrû seulement là où les jours-malades ont diminué de 8.8 p. 100 ou plus, soit à Terre-Neuve, au Québec, en Ontario, en Saskatchewan et en Colombie-Britannique; les cinq autres provinces, — où la diminution des jours-malades s'est échelonnée de 0.5 à 8.5 p. 100, — ont, en fait, signalé une augmentation des frais de gestion.

La rémunération figure pour 58.9 p. 100 des dépenses. Dans les provinces atlantiques, au Québec et au Manitoba, le pourcentage de la rémunération est inférieur à la moyenne canadienne, alors que, en Ontario, en Saskatchewan, en Alberta et en Colombie-Britannique, il la surpasse. La part des vivres (14.5 p. 100) a varié de 9.3 p. 100 en Colombie-Britannique à plus de 21 p. 100 en Île-du-Prince-Édouard, en Nouvelle-Écosse et à Terre-Neuve. Ces données ne comprennent le coût des soins aux malades que dans les seuls sanatoriums publics. Les dépenses signées excluent le coût de 9 p. 100 des jours-malades

in tuberculosis units of hospitals and in federal sanatoria, as well as the cost of the care of tuberculars in mental institutions. It does, however, include the cost for those patients in sanatoria who were not tuberculous.

The total cost of the care of tuberculars in all Canadian hospitals is probably around 40 million dollars, 32 per cent above the reported figure.

#### COST PER PATIENT-DAY

Since a 5.6 per cent reduction in dollar expenditure was accompanied by a 14.5 per cent decrease in patient-days, the cost per patient-day rose by 8 per cent to \$9.22 for Canadian sanatoria since 1957. Three per cent may be accounted for by the general rise of commodity prices, the remainder by a relative increase in fixed costs because of fewer patients and probably by a true rise of the economic standard of patient care. The cost per patient-day varies greatly between provinces. Its range is \$8.00, and its standard deviation \$2.54. Only in British Columbia, where the Tranquille Sanatorium closed in September, the cost per patient-day decreased since 1957, the main factor being an 81 cent reduction in wages.

Salaries per patient-day were over \$10 in Alberta and British Columbia, \$6-\$8 in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Saskatchewan, \$5-\$6 in Newfoundland and Ontario, and under \$5 in Prince Edward Island, Manitoba, and Quebec.

Food costs per patient-day ranged from \$1.11 in Manitoba to \$2.45 in Nova Scotia; the Canadian average was \$1.34.

#### HISTORICAL

Total expenditure of sanatoria has declined since 1953 by about 6 per cent to 30.4 million dollars. In terms of constant dollars the decline was 13 per cent. If the factors of rising prices and of population growth are eliminated, the decline of expenditure since 1953 amounts to 25 per cent, from \$1.90 to \$1.43 per person in the general population (in constant dollars).

Le coût total des soins aux tuberculeux dans tous les hôpitaux canadiens atteint probablement les 40 millions de dollars, soit 32 p. 100 de plus que le total indiqué plus haut.

#### FRAIS DU JOUR-MALADE

La réduction de 5.6 p. 100 des dépenses, dans les sanatoriums du Canada, s'étant accompagnée d'une diminution de 14.5 p. 100 des jours-malades, le coût du jour-malade s'est élevé de 8 p. 100 sur 1957, pour atteindre \$9.22. Compte tenu de 3 p. 100 pour la hausse générale des marchandises, le reste de la hausse est dû à une augmentation relative du coût fixe, par suite de la diminution des malades et, probablement, à un accroissement réel de la cherté des soins aux malades. Le coût du jour-malade varie grandement selon les provinces, puisque l'étendue de variation se fixe à \$8 et l'écart type, à \$2.54. Par suite, surtout, d'une baisse de 81 sous de la rémunération, le coût du jour-malade, depuis 1957, n'a descendu qu'en Colombie-Britannique où le sanatorium Tranquille a fermé ses portes en septembre.

La rémunération, par jour-malade, s'est établie à plus de \$10 en Alberta et en Colombie-Britannique, de \$6 à \$8 au Nouveau-Brunswick, en Nouvelle-Écosse et en Saskatchewan, de \$5 à \$6 à Terre-Neuve et en Ontario et à moins de \$5 en Île-du-Prince-Édouard, au Manitoba et au Québec.

Le coût des vivres, par jour-malade, s'est échelonné de \$1.11 au Manitoba à \$2.45 en Nouvelle-Écosse; la moyenne était de \$1.34 pour tout le Canada.

#### CHRONOLOGIE

Les dépenses totales des sanatoriums ont diminué, depuis 1953, d'environ 6 p. 100 pour totaliser 30.4 millions de dollars. En dollars constants, la diminution est de 13 p. 100. Si l'on élimine les facteurs hausse des prix et accroissement de la population, la réduction des dépenses, depuis 1953, s'établit à 25 p. 100, pour passer, en dollars constants, de \$1.90 à \$1.43 par Canadien.
