Saskatchewan - Summary of Retail Facts, Credit and Commodity Sales,

Size of Business, Operating Expenses

This bulletin presents some of the final results of the Census of Merchandising and Service Establishments, covering the retail trade in Saskatchewan during the year 1930. The data that are given in this report show, for the first time, the size of retail stores, grouped according to annual sales, and the proportion of credit business done in retail stores. The first comprehensive figures of operating expenses are also presented, and an initial effort has been made to analyze the commodity sales of merchandising establishments.

The completeness of the information which can be furnished for the retail trade is determined largely by the extent to which retail store operators keep accurate and detailed records of their activities. While every effort has been made to ensure that the figures which are given in the tables are representative, special note should be taken of the proportion of the total business which is conducted by those firms which were able to furnish the details requested in each case. For example, the extent to which stores have reported their sales by commodities ranges from almost 100 per cent in the case of department stores, to less than 10 per cent in the case of confectionery and delicatessen stores. The information on expenses and credit business is also more complete for some kinds of business than for others.

While this bulletin presents certain of the more significant results of the Census, space could not be found for a great deal more valuable and detailed information on retail trade. The complete results of the Census will be contained in the reports which are now being prepared for printing.

Note: Sales by commodities were not reported by all stores in each kind-of-business classification. The commodity coverage indicates the extent to which the sales reported in a given kind-of-business classification can be broken down by commodities and shows the degree to which the total sales of the stores included in the commodity breakdown are representative of the sales of all stores in the same kind-of-business classification. The percentage column shows the proportion which the sales of each commodity forms of the total sales of all stores in the same kind-of-business classification which reported their sales by commodities.
