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Statement outlining results, risks, and significant changes in operations, personnel, and programs

Introduction

This quarterly report has been prepared by management as required by section 65.1 of the *Financial Administration Act* and in the form and manner prescribed by the Treasury Board, and it should be read in conjunction with the Main Estimates and Supplementary Estimates. This quarterly report has not been subject to an external audit or review.

The Office of the Auditor General has one program activity: legislative auditing. The Office conducts independent audits and studies that provide objective information, advice, and assurance to Parliament, government, and Canadians.

Mandate


The Auditor General is an Officer of Parliament, who is independent from the government and reports directly to Parliament. The duties are set out in the *Auditor General Act*, the *Financial Administration Act*, and other acts and orders-in-council. These duties relate to legislative auditing and, in certain cases, to monitoring of federal departments and agencies, Crown corporations, territorial governments, and other entities.

Basis of presentation

This quarterly report has been prepared by management using an expenditure basis of accounting. The accompanying Statement of Authorities includes the Office's spending authorities granted by Parliament and those used by the Office consistent with the Main Estimates and Supplementary Estimates for the 2012–13 fiscal year. This quarterly report provides financial information on the use of spending authorities. The Office uses the full accrual method of accounting to prepare and present its annual financial statements that are part of the departmental performance reporting process. However, the spending authorities voted by Parliament are on an expenditure basis.

Highlights of quarterly and year-to-date results

There are no significant changes to authorities available and used to report in the quarter ended 31 December 2012.



Risks and uncertainties

There are no significant risks and uncertainties to report.

Budget 2012 implementation

The Office is on track to achieve planned reductions of \$6.7 million by fiscal year 2014–15. This will be accomplished through efficiency measures and reductions that align resources to its core mandate.

Significant changes in operations, personnel, and programs

On 11 January 2013, the Commissioner of the Environment and Sustainable Development, Scott Vaughan, announced that he had accepted the position of President of the International Institute for Sustainable Development. He is expected to leave the Office on 2 April 2013. A search for a new Commissioner will be undertaken in early 2013.
