This Labour Market Bulletin provides an analysis of Labour Force Survey results for the province of Quebec and its regions.

OVERVIEW

Following the decline registered in the previous months, robust employment growth resumed in April in Quebec, according to the latest estimates of Statistics Canada's Labour Force Survey. In comparison to the data for March, 37,900 additional people were employed, amounting to a 0.9% growth rate, thanks to gains in full-time employment (+27,000) and in part-time employment (+10,900). Employees in the public and private sectors saw growth, while the number of self-employed workers declined. Employment growth, although slower, was also registered in Ontario (+0.6%) and in Canada as a whole (+0.6%).

From a yearly perspective, the number of employed people grew by 1.8% (+74,900 jobs), amounting to the strongest annual growth rate registered over the past 13 months. The increase in employment came primarily from part-time employment (+48,200 jobs or +6.2%) while full-time employment grew by 0.8% (+26,000 jobs). The three major age groups (15-24 year-olds, 25-54 year-olds and people aged 55 years and over) all benefited from the growth in employment.

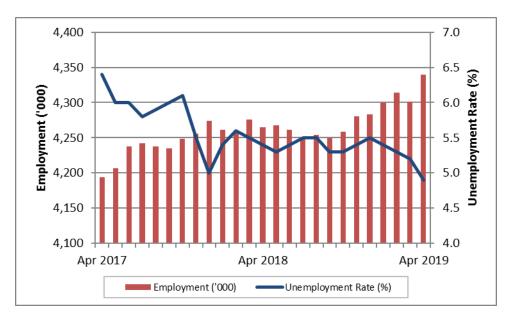

Thanks to the growth in employment, the number of unemployed people declined by 10,500 in comparison to March. Thus, the unemployment rate continued to fall, reaching 4.9%, its lowest monthly level since 1976, when Labour Force Survey data were first published. The participation rate rose by 0.4 percentage point in comparison to the previous month, settling at 64.9%. Finally, employment growth allowed the participation rate to gain half of a percentage point and reached 61.7%, which was also a historical peak. From a yearly perspective, a similar increase was seen in the employment rate (+0.5 percentage point).

EMPLOYMENT BY INDUSTRY

At the industry level, the goods-producing sector progressed slightly in comparison to March data (+500 jobs or +0.1%). Employment growth in construction, utilities and in agriculture offset the losses registered in manufacturing, as well as in forestry, fishing and mining. From a yearly perspective however, the goods-producing sector added 21,800 jobs (+2.6%). All industries in the sector showed growth in comparison to April 2018.

In the services sector, 37,500 jobs were added in comparison to the previous month, amounting to a growth of 1.1%. Industries with the highest growth include trade, public administration and other services. Only four industries saw employment declines, the most significant of which was seen in professional, technical and scientific services. In comparison to April 2018, the services sector added 53,100 jobs (+1.6%). Most industries saw employment increases, except accommodation and food services, as well as information, culture and recreation.

REGIONAL ANALYSIS

Taking into account seasonally unadjusted data, the province registered 55,200 additional jobs in comparison to the same period in the previous year. Overall, employment grew in the *Capitals* (the Capitale-Nationale and Outaouais regions) and in the *Intermediary Regions*, except in Chaudière-Appalaches. In the *Greater Montréal Region*, the overall picture is positive thanks to substantial growth in the Laurentides region and on the island of Montréal, despite employment declines in Montérégie, the Laval region and in Lanaudière. Among the *Resource Regions*, only Bas-Saint-Laurent saw a growth in employment, while employment in Abitibi-Témiscamingue remained stable.

The most significant declines in the unemployment rate were registered in the following regions: Laurentides (-2.1 percentage points, settling at 4.5%); Lanaudière (-1.8 percentage point, settling at 5.0%) and in Estrie (-1.6 percentage point, settling at 4.2%). Conversely, the Gaspésie—Îles-de-la-Madeleine region (+1.8 percentage point) posted the strongest increase in the unemployment rate, which reached 17.6%. The Chaudière-Appalaches region had the second highest increase in the unemployment rate (+0.8 percentage point), reaching 4.3%, which however remains at a very low historical level and below the provincial average (5.8%).
